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Government Board Will Investigate Basin Reclamation

Possibility of government participation in the 1,750,000-acre Columbia basin irrigation project in Eastern Washington is seen in the announcement of appointment of a board of engineers to represent the federal reclamation service in investigation of the report made by the Columbia basin survey commission appointed by the state of Washington.

The engineer board appointed by the reclamation service consists of D. C. Henry, Portland, well known reclamation engineer; A. H. Munn and C. T. Pease, the last two being engineers connected with the Denver office of the reclamation service.

Members of the board will assemble in Portland next week to go over the report recently submitted in detail by the Washington commission. Such field examinations as are necessary will then be made.

Should the board desire further investigation it is likely the state of Washington will be asked to add to the survey appropriation already made. Should the report be approved it will go with the further report of the engineer board first to the reclamation service, then to the secretary of the interior, who has asked for it. Henry some time ago was appointed by the reclamation service to cooperate with the Washington commission and has advised with it, but is not responsible for its report.

Warden Says Fall Salmon Run Nears Season's High Tide

The fall run of silverside salmon should be in full swing in the Columbia river next week, according to advice brought to Portland this morning by W. A. Mack, deputy fish warden, who has just returned from several weeks on the coast.

Salmon have been delayed in their Columbia river run this fall, because of the late season when the fish were in the water, according to Mack, who says:

"At Alsea, Yaquina and Tillamook the runs of silverside salmon were the heaviest on record. The canner at Alsea got all the salmon it could handle at 2 cents a pound. There are some chinook in the run this year, but a larger run of these fish is expected in December."

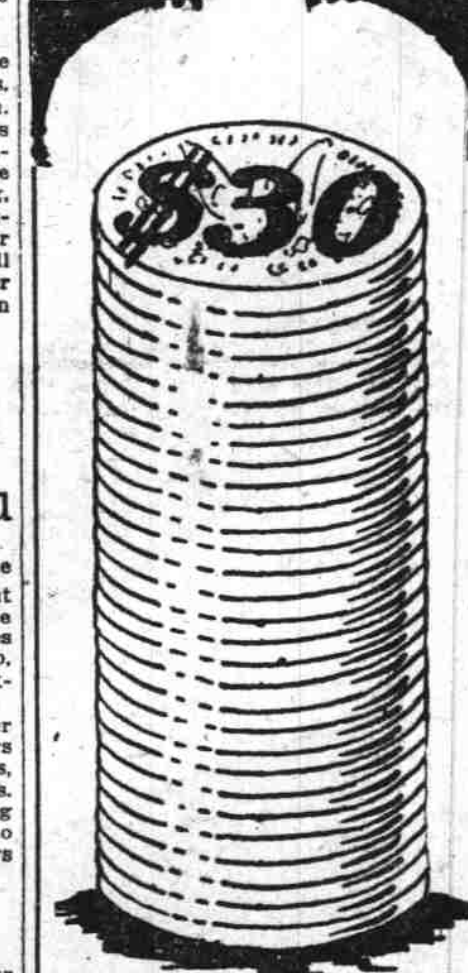
