

# SIX MEN AND ONE WOMAN ARE ADDED TO HALL OF FAME

Mark Twain, Eads, Patrick Henry, Dr. Morton, St. Gaudens, Roger Williams, Alice Palmer, Named

New York, Nov. 6.—(U. P.)—The names of six men and one woman were added to the American hall of fame in an election announced tonight by the senate of the New York university. The seven additions are: Samuel Langhorne Clemens, author; James Buchanan Eads, engineer; Patrick Henry, statesman; William Thomas Gregory Morton, physician; Augustus Saint Gaudens, sculptor; Roger Williams, theologian, and Alice Freeman Palmer, educator.

The electorate to the hall of fame consists of 26 men and six women. It included 27 college presidents; 18 historians and history teachers; 11 scientists; 11 authors and editors; 15 men and women of public affairs; and 12 national or state justices.

The election was the fifth subsequent event since the hall of fame was inaugurated at the university. Prior to this election, 20 men and six women had been entered in the hall. Bronze tablets to 26 of them will be unveiled at the university's hall of fame in May, 1921. Thirty-seven tablets have been unveiled previously.

The list of names submitted in the election included 177 men and 27 women. Among the unsuccessful candidates were Charles Goodyear, Cyrus Hall McCormick, Henry M. Stanley, John Paul Jones, Nathaniel Greene, George Rogers Clark, Philip Henry Sheridan, William M. Everts, Samuel Adams, Grover Cleveland, John Jay, John C. Calhoun, William Penn, Stephen Girard, Edwin Thomas Booth, John Quincy Adams, Joseph Jefferson, Theodore Thomas, James McNeill Whistler, Louisa May Alcott, Alice Carey, Helen Hunt Jackson, Susan B. Anthony, Lucy Stone, Elizabeth Cady Stanton, Martha Washington, Harriet Hosmer, Pechontas Rolfe.

conventionalist. He tells a good story and enjoys hearing one. He knows life in its every aspect and will probably go along better with the members of the senate and house than any president in recent years, because he knows how to handle congressmen. He was just a bit disturbed by the overwhelming size of the Republican majority in both houses. He wondered if they wouldn't be too unwieldy. But, on the other hand, it was suggested promptly by others who have been gossiping with him about it that a large majority in the house will furnish exactly the challenge to leadership which is necessary. They readily will admit that a change had happened in the last two years of the Republican congress that the leadership was unimpaired and strong and that with full responsibility for all branches of the government in the hands of the Republicans the latter will be compelled to develop leadership. Oscar Underwood showed what could be done to help the Democrats had a large majority in the house, and there will arise someone on the Republican side to attempt the same thing, though the legislative problems are infinitely more complex than they ever have been.

**METHODICAL WORKER**  
The new president-elect will be a methodical worker. He takes things calmly. He will do one thing at a time and attempt everything at once. Just as he was leaving his home I asked him the other day if he was happy.  
"Happy?" he said. "Well, I should rather say, just pleased, if one can make that distinction. It's a big job."  
"Yes," I suggested. "But the opportunity to do a service is there."  
"True," said the president-elect. "That is what really makes me happy—the chance to serve."

We chatted about the overwhelming majority and the meaning of it. The president-elect pleased beyond measure that he has behind him at the start such a great body of opinion. He will interpret it in his own way, from time to time, but it is not amiss to state right here now that the campaign is over, that some would appreciate more than Warren Harding himself a frank and free expression by the newspapers of the country of their ideas on foreign policy. The suggestion has been made again and again, for instance, that the league issue was confused with domestic questions and that Republican newspapers which refused to be led into the Democratic camp on the league question during the campaign, will speak their views fully now that the campaign is over. The president-elect would appreciate that more than anything else just now.

**TOPKA**—(U. N. S.)—Senator Capper of Kansas is not a candidate for appointment to the cabinet of President-elect Harding, despite rumors that he will be offered the post of secretary of agriculture. He issued a statement late today declaring that he would not accept it even though offered.

**LONDON**—(U. N. S.)—The electrical workers in Berlin have gone on strike and the city is without electric lights and street railway service.

**WASHINGTON**—(U. N. S.)—

Twenty-five hundred open-top freight cars were released from the coal-carrying service by the interstate commerce commission today for other purposes by increasing the minimum side depths of coal cars from 25 to 42 inches.

**WASHINGTON**—(U. P.)—No change in the command of either the Atlantic or Pacific fleets is contemplated at present, according to secretary of the Navy Daniels today.

**KANSAS CITY**—(U. N. S.)—The federal grand jury today indicted

76 alleged bootleggers as the opening shot in a wholesale cleanup of illicit liquor dealing.

**SAN ANTONIO, TEXAS**—(U. N. S.)—Confirmed reports from Mexico City today announced that the rebel chief, Pedro Zarrora has surrendered to the government and will be deported.

**SAN ANTONIO, TEXAS**—(U. N. S.)—Permits for the establishment of an aerial passenger and mail line from El Paso, Texas, to Chihuahua City have been approved, according to official dispatches received here today.

total receipts of only \$5,770,108.51 for the biennium ending September 30, 1920. "The volume of business handled during the last biennial period, as shown by the receipts of the biennium, exceeds the receipts of any preceding biennial period by more than \$19,000,000, or approximately 92 per cent," the report says. "The same conditions exist as to the disbursements which, during the past biennial period exceeded the disbursements of any preceding biennial period by over \$22,000,000, or approximately 105 per cent."

**COMMENDS EMPLOYEES**  
"This large volume of business, exceeding with a few exceptions that of any bank of the state, has been transacted with a force consisting of one deputy, one bookkeeper, one receipt clerk, one stenographer and a portion of the time of another stenographer, and I heartily commend these employees for their high efficiency, as well as their strict honesty."

State taxes in the sum of \$6,672,402.37 were collected from the various counties during the biennium, the report shows, there being still due the state \$2,678,917.60 at the close of business September 30.

The road bonded indebtedness of the state increased from \$5,040,000 on October 1, 1918 to \$18,243,750 on October 1, 1920, according to the report.

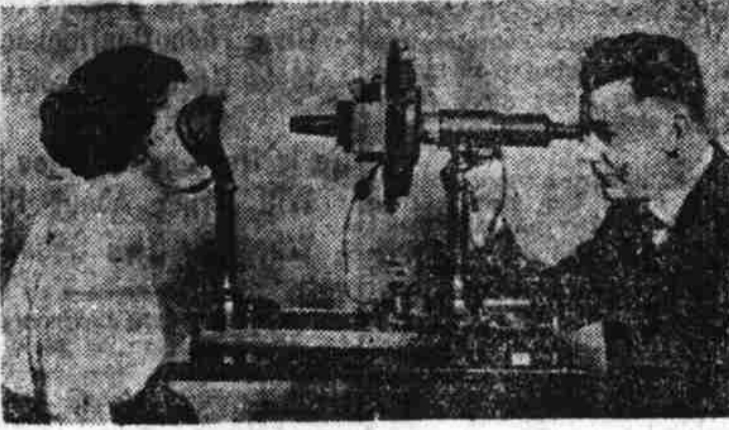

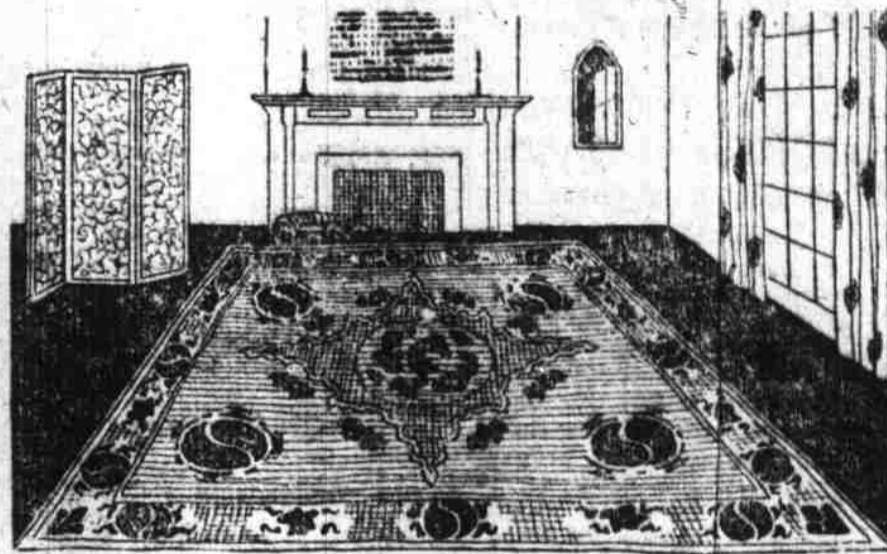

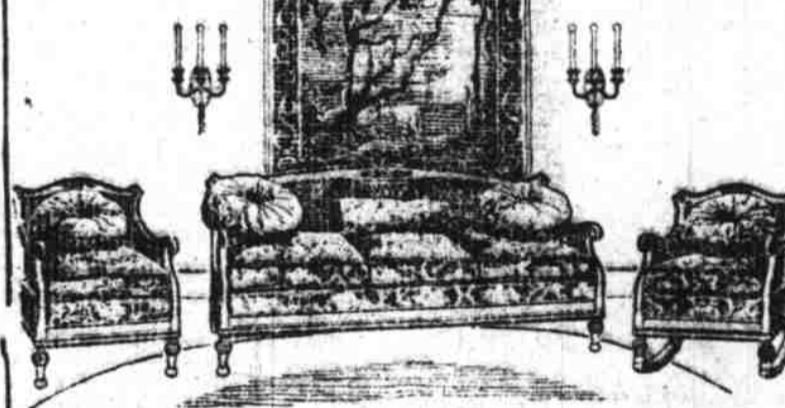
