Drive to Begin Armistice Day Will Seek to Put Membership in Local Chapter to 50,000.

Participation in the drive by ex-service women and the Red Cross and army nursing corps and yeomanettes is planned and they are being organized by Miss Marjorie MacEwan. A committee composed of Merle G. Campbell, James R. Bain and Cassius R. Peck has been appointed by the Portland post of the American Legion to arrange for the part which that organization is to play in the campaign.

Half of the funds sought by the Red Cross through annual memberships will be used in Multnomah county to carry on the work by the organization among disabled soldiers and their families and in public health and hygiene. Through this campaign it is sought to raise \$75,000. The other half will go to the national organization for European relief and the disaster emergency fund.

Mrs. E. L. Thompson, president of the Opera association, outlined the plans and purposes of the association and told of the complimentary presentation of "Martha" last year to the 5000 high school students of the city who crowded the Auditorium. She announced the forthcoming presentation of "Forces of Destiny" Friday and Saturday, December 3 and 4, at the Auditorium.

E. L. Mills, editor of the Pacific Coast Christian Advocate, pointed out that musical development is one of the finest evidences of an enlightened civilization and cited the splendid accomplishments of the West along artistic lines.

3 SPECIAL TRAINS WILL BRING STOCK BOOSTERS TO FAIR

"P-I Special" to Bring Seattle Delegation—Others Are to Come From Oregon Points.

At least three special trains, bearing boosters for the livestock industry and for the Pacific International stock show, will come to Portland during the stock show week, November 13-20, according to messages received by General Manager O. M. Plummer, in charge of the approaching event.

A telegram received recently from B. N. Hutchinson of Seattle gives assurance that an excursion train of many Pullmans, to be known as the "P-I Special" will be dispatched by the Seattle Post-Intelligencer from Seattle on Monday night, November 15, picking up additional coaches from way points en route, and delivering an enthusiastic delegation of farmers, breeders, business men and bankers in Portland on Tuesday morning, November 16.

Hutchinson, who is editor of the Post-Intelligencer weekly farm journal, states that this paper has completed all arrangements, and is now signing up excursionists from all points in Western Washington. The special will be parked on tracks provided by the stock show manager, near the big stock show pavilion at North Portland, and will remain for three days, providing sleeping accommodations for the excursionists, who will take in the daily auctions of purebred cattle, the stock show in general and the night horse shows in the big tan bark arena.

Hundreds of fine purebreds have been sent to the stock show this year from Western Washington points, and fancy gaited horses and harness animals from Seattle, Tacoma and Spokane will also figure prominently in the horse show events, so that interest is very keen and the excursionists will enthusiastically back the entries from their section.

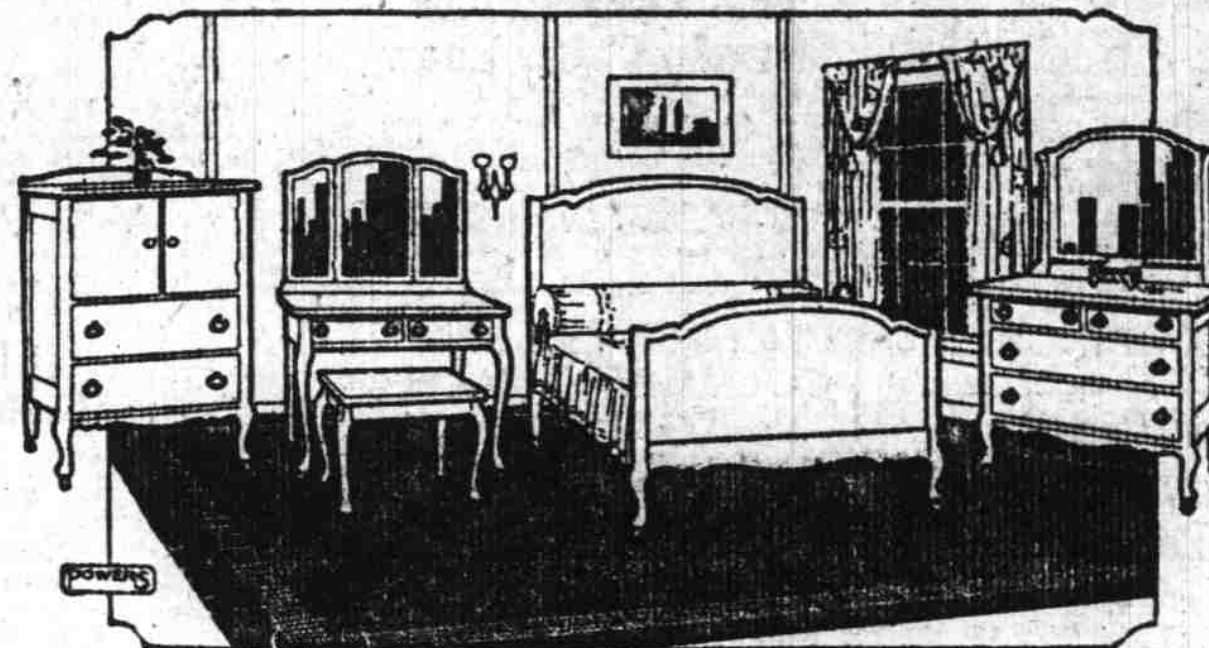
Another special train will be dispatched from Marshfield, carrying business men, bankers, dairymen, cheese manufacturers and others interested in the livestock industry. In a message received yesterday from L. J. Simpson of North Bend, assurance of this special train is given, and Simpson says the excursionists will come from all Coos county points. The train will carry huge banners on either side, advertising the stock show and the Coos country. An outstanding consignment of prize-winning Coos pure breeds will come to the stock show to compete for ribbons and premium money also.

That the Tillamook country also will send a special train is now assured, according to a message from Rollie W. Watson, who says a trainload of dairy cattle exhibits that will carry off the usual Tillamook honors will precede the excursion train, and that a sufficient number of Tillamook county boosters to fill a long string of Pullmans is being signed up for the Tillamook special.
