

FOREIGN MARKETS TO BE ADVISED OF ADVANTAGES HERE

Commerce Club to Extend Scope
Of Its Operations and to Boost
Oregon's Great Possibilities.

The Foreign Commerce club, which has now reached a membership of 111 of the largest exporting firms of Portland and vicinity, has decided to make the organization state-wide in its scope and will invite all exporting interests in Oregon to cooperate in presenting to foreign markets the potentialities of this region as a supply point for many lines of commerce.

The board of directors at a meeting Friday decided to open permanent quarters on the first floor of the Oregon building, to serve as a clearing house for export interests. The headquarters will be opened Monday, of next week, and the permanent secretary will be Robert O. Case, formerly a financial writer.

The headquarters will be in proximity to the attractive display of Oregon products. It is proposed to entertain skippermen when they come into this port, and to impress upon them the opportunities for development of the exporting of Oregon products.

Sacramento, Cal., Nov. 6.—(U. P.)—Police here today are hunting for Emmett Leisure of Portland, who is alleged to have deserted his bride of two weeks. Police are caring for the girl, who is 16 years old.

She told the police she had been living in the Salvation Army rescue home in Portland when she met Leisure, who was at the home to repair a window. They eloped, were married and came to Sacramento.

The Salvation Army rescue home Saturday denied any knowledge of one of its inmates ever having eloped with an Emmett Leisure. While two of the girls escaped within the last year, both of them are now in close touch with the institution.

Alleged Cruelty to Washington Insane To Be Investigated

Tacoma, Nov. 6.—(I. N. S.)—Forced to stand in line stripped to the skin while attendants jabbed a needle into their backs to obtain fluid extracts from their spinal columns for diagnostic purposes, is a treatment of patients at the Washington state hospital for the insane at Steilacoom, according to a report made by an investigating committee to the Pierce County Bar association today. The bar association has named a committee to take up the matter with the next session of the legislature.

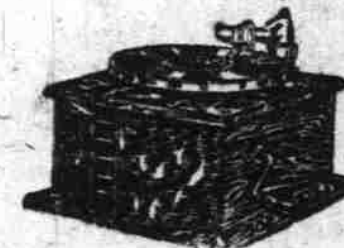

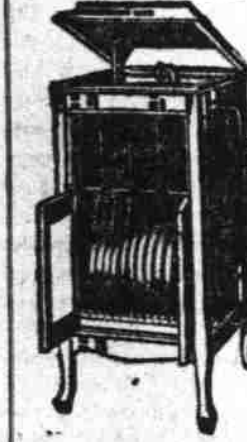

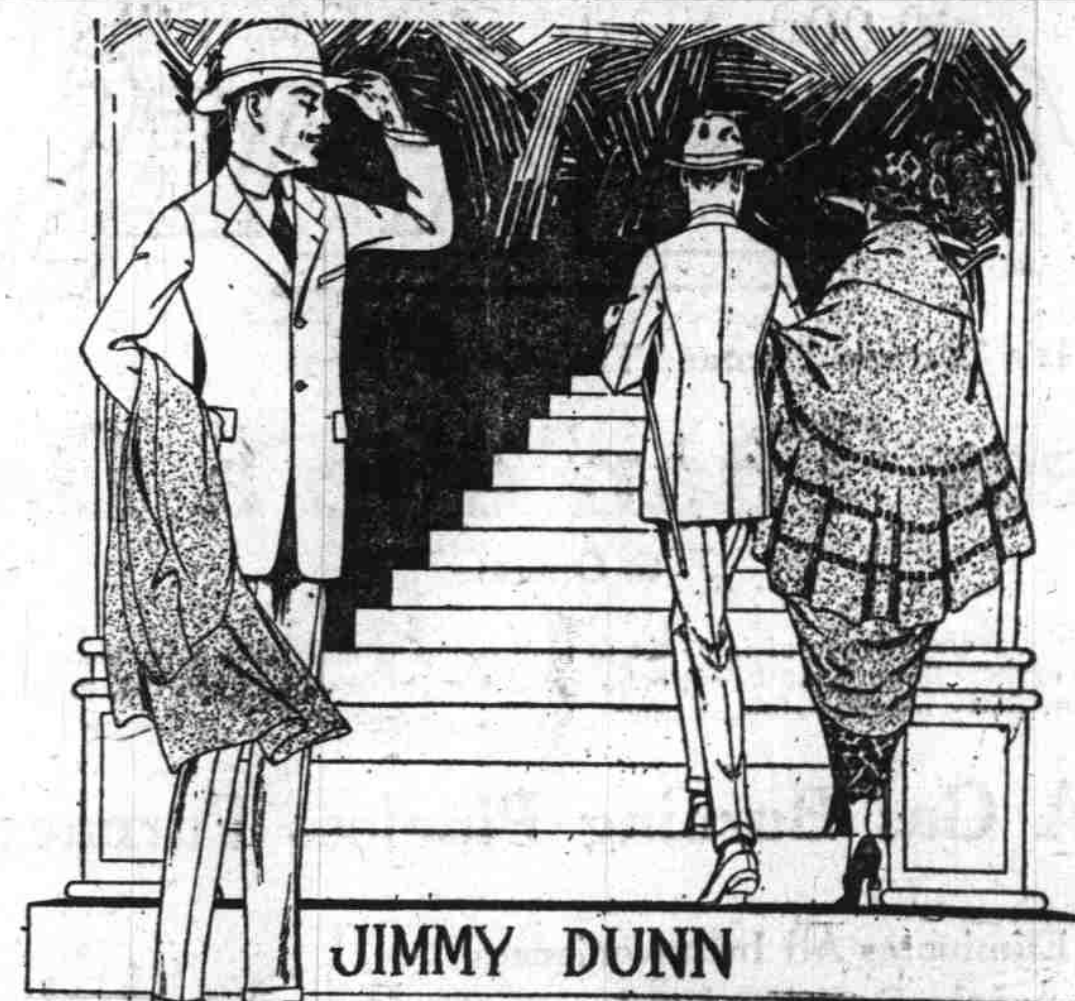
