Kroise Held for Perjury - Trouble now faces Abraham Kroise, a Hollander, as a result of an investigation made by V. Tomlinson, naturalization examiner. Since that time Tomlinson hunted up Kroise's questionnaire. After reading it he found evidence to the contrary, so he reported-his findings to the grand jury. Kroise is now held for trial on a charge of per-jury under \$1000 bonds.






