BUDGET OF EXPENDITURES FOR THE YEAR 1921 SUBMITTED BY THE COUNCIL

The following is a tentative budget of expenditures to be incurred by the City of Portland during the fiscal year ending November 30, 1921, which has been prepared by the Council, and will be considered at a public meeting to be held in the Council Chamber in the City Hall on November 15, 1920, at 2 o'clock P. M.

The Public Auditor has been a drain on the General Fund during the past on account of the necessity of holding patriotic meetings which were necessary for the good and welfare of the community. It is hoped that during the coming year it will pay operating expenses.

The cost of operating the Women's Detention is uncertain. It is believed by those that have given the matter a careful study that the house can be kept and that a great deal have given the matter a careful study through its influence, but it is an institution that should be under state control and the expense of its operation borne by the State of Oregon.

The cost of conducting the affairs of the City has been reduced to a considerable extent under that it will be during the present year, as will be seen by the following statement. The cost of living is practically the same as it was when the 1920 Budget was prepared and salaries and wages cannot be reduced under existing conditions. The City is paying less today for personal service in many of its departments than is paid by private individuals and corporations for like service.

GENERAL FUND—To provide for the payment of the general expenses of the City, except as otherwise provided, including maintenance and repair of sewers and paved streets, including the 3 mill levy authorized November 2, 1920. \$5,432,000

FUND FOR PLAYGROUNDS AND PARKS—To provide for the purchase, equipment and improvement of playgrounds and parks. 62,400

FIREMEN'S RELIEF AND PENSION FUND—For the benefit of firemen and their families, pursuant to the provisions of the Charter of the City of Portland, as amended June 2, 1913. 31,200

POLICEMEN'S RELIEF AND PENSION FUND—For the benefit of policemen and their families, pursuant to the provisions of the Charter of the City of Portland, as amended November 5, 1918. 81,200

BONDED INDEBTEDNESS INTEREST FUND—To meet interest on bonded indebtedness, water, dock and crematory bonds. 444,400

MOTION PICTURE COMPANY—To provide for the purchase, payment or redemption of bonded indebtedness, payable from general taxation, including \$1,250,000 of water bonds, and excepting all other water bonds, docks and crematory bonds. 124,800
