

FIVE ARE INJURED, TWO MISSING IN \$750,000 BLAZE

Sacramento, Cal., Nov. 13.—(U. P.)—Five persons were injured and loss estimated at \$750,000 sustained when fire of undetermined origin early today completely destroyed the department store of C. P. Nathan & Sons and damaged the clothing store of Pickett-Atterbury.

Only heavy rains of the last few days which had dampened roofs of surrounding buildings prevented a large part of the business district from being destroyed. Fire Chief Moore called upon citizens to help the firemen combat the flames.

Drainage Proposed Of Great Acreage

Salem, Nov. 13.—A move for the drainage of the white lands in the Willamette valley was started at a meeting of the Salem Commercial club, Wednesday night, and is expected to result in an appeal to the forthcoming state legislature for an appropriation to enlist other clubs of valley towns in the movement, which, it is claimed, will bring thousands of acres of non-productive lands into a high state of cultivation.

Bicycle Thief Caught After Merry Chase

Eugene, Nov. 13.—A nifty piece of bicycle stealing resulted in landing William Blasted in jail for a 30 day period. J. T. Miller left his wheel in front of the Presbyterian church for a few minutes, returning in time to see it disappearing around a corner, headed for the rural districts. A deputy sheriff was put on the trail in a small car, but the thief hit such a pace that he had passed Goshen a mile or two before the officer ran him down.

Yakima, Wash., Nov. 13.—Physicians at the autopsy over the body of Mrs. E. M. Cook, who died suddenly at White Swan, Sunday, found that 13 of her ribs were broken. Her husband, lodged in the county jail, said the injuries were due to a fall with a horse she was riding. Neighbors and friends say they resulted from a brutal beating by the enraged husband.

New York, Nov. 13.—(I. N. S.)—After having been expelled from the Peekskill Military academy, Melville F. Taylor, 19, was awarded \$10,000 damages by a jury in the Brooklyn court. The school authorities had charged that Taylor, who was a cadet major and had been awarded the school medal for good conduct, was disorderly in a Peekskill moving picture theatre.

RIOTING FELLOWS YUCATAN WALKOUT; 'RED' PLOT IS BARED

By Ralph H. Turner Mexico City, Nov. 13.—(U. P.)—A general strike attended by serious disorders has been declared throughout the province of Yucatan according to official dispatches received by the war office today from Merida.

Railway employees, dock workers and power plant operatives were said to have gone out in sympathy with the striking stevedores in Vera Cruz. The situation was described as "extremely critical." Pitches battles occurred in Vera Cruz when foreign ship companies attempted to employ strikebreakers. The strikers attacked them, carrying red flags and shouting "viva la Soviet!"

STRIKEBREAKERS REPORTED KILLED; TROUBLE SPREADS

Vera Cruz, Nov. 13.—(U. P.)—The general strike called in sympathy with striking stevedores in this port was spreading along the entire Gulf coast, according to advices received here today.

The walkout spread throughout Yucatan. Ten strikebreakers who attempted to take the places of stevedores in Progresso, Yucatan, were reported to have been killed by strikers. Practically all workers in Tampico, state of Tamaulipas, quit their jobs at 1 o'clock yesterday afternoon and paraded the streets, singing revolutionary songs.

Strikers attempted to blow up the customs-house here yesterday. Owing to defective mechanism the bomb failed to explode. All business houses in the city have again been closed and troops have been called out to preserve order.

TOM MOONEY CASE WAS A FRAME-UP, SAYS POLICEMAN

San Francisco, Nov. 13.—(I. N. S.)—The San Francisco Call Friday printed a sensational story to the effect that Draper Hand, a police officer, had told Mayor James Rolph that the prosecution of the Mooney bomb cases here was a gigantic frameup. Following publication of the story Mayor Rolph admitted that Hand, "of his own volition, at his own request," had made such a statement.

Mayor Rolph declined to discuss Hand's story in detail, but said that it was told to him substantially as it appeared in the Call. "Hand came to me and requested that I hear his story, and I did so. What action is to be taken I cannot say." Tom Mooney and Warren K. Billings were sent to prison for life upon conviction of having been connected with the 1916 preparedness day parade. Hand was one of the officers active in handling the witnesses.

The chief feature of the story told Mayor Rolph by Hand was that Frank X. Ozman, an Oregon cattleman, who identified the Mooney party as debarking from an automobile at the scene of the explosion, had never seen the automobile until after the explosion, when he memorized its number in order to testify regarding it.

That other witnesses were coached by Hand in the testimony they were to give, he further alleged, including John McDonald. Captain of Detectives Duncan Matheson, who was Hand's superior during the bomb explosion investigation, declined to discuss the statement made by Hand to the mayor. "I know nothing about it," he declared.

One Is Indicted in S. F. Booze Scandal

San Francisco, Nov. 13.—(I. N. S.)—The special federal grand jury investigating activities of the bootleggers, late today returned one indictment. The name was placed on secret file but deputy marshals hurried forth, leading to the belief that an early arrest would be made.
