ROCKWOOD SCHOOL BUDGET COMING UP

A special meeting of the Rockwood school district will be held Thursday to consider the budget and other matters. Among the subjects for consideration to be presented will be the employment of a third teacher. The school is now out of debt, well built and furnished and the attendance increasing.

Road Improvement In Southeast Part Of City Requested A delegation headed by Marvin K. Hedge, representing the Mopnit Scout improvement committee for the territory east of Eighty-second street southeast and within the city limits, has petitioned the county commissioners for extensive road work in that district. They will be given a hearing in the course of the preparation of the budget for 1921.

The petitioners ask the commissioners to include in this budget sufficient funds for the construction of a hard surface roadway 18 feet in width on Ninety-second street southeast, from Forty-fifth avenue southeast to the Estacada carline, approximately 25 blocks in length; also the Gilbert road from its intersection of Foster road and Eighty-third street southeast to the Portland city limits in conformity with the city grades.
