

PROSECUTOR SAYS HE WOULD MOVE TO FREE MOONEY

San Francisco, Nov. 17.—(U. P.)—District Attorney Matthew Brady of San Francisco declared today that if the courts should order a new trial for Thomas Mooney, now serving life in the state penitentiary, as a result of the preparedness parade bomb explosion here in 1918, he probably would move that the case be dismissed and Mooney be freed. Brady made the statement in answer to a letter he received earlier in the day from Mooney, appealing for a new trial. The district attorney declared he did not believe Mooney had received a fair trial and that he had been convicted on evidence which was questionable. Discussing his reasons for a probable decision to dismiss the case, Brady declared that in a new trial he would not be able to use Frank C. Oxman, "Oregon cattleman," who was the star witness against Mooney, because of alleged doubts cast on Oxman's testimony. Oxman already has been tried once for perjury in connection with the case. Brady declared he could not use Detective Draper Hand as a witness because of Hand's alleged statement to Mayor Ralph in which Hand is said to have declared that he aided in "framing" evidence against Mooney. The other important witnesses against Mooney were women. Brady said he would not use them because he doubted the accuracy of their testimony. Under such circumstances, Brady said, there would be no material witnesses left to testify for the prosecution.

Gold Hill's 'Plant Wizard,' E. M. Smith, Dies at Age of 80

Gold Hill, Or., Nov. 17.—E. M. Smith, aged 80, pioneer settler and botanist, died suddenly at his home on the Pacific highway near here Monday night. He came to this country with some of the first settlers, carving out a homestead on Sardinia creek where he raised a large family. He married Mrs. Char-traw-Messner, five years ago, uniting two old families. Smith was considered an agricultural wizard, having improved many vegetables and originated several species. He successfully demonstrated the advisability of cultivation of grains for the department of agriculture, more than doubling yields of wheat, oats, rye and barley. He never attempted to profit from his botanical efforts, giving away the result of years of careful labor and working patiently simply for the love of developing new varieties of plant life.

Bonus System as Wage Substitute To Be Considered

Proposed readjustment of wage scales in logging camps and lumber mills of the northwest occupied the attention of the board of governors of the Loyal Legion of Loggers and Lumbermen at their forenoon session in the assembly room of the Portland hotel today. No organized opposition to the existing scale of the legion developed at the meeting and employers present did not look with favor upon radical changes in wages or working conditions. A committee was appointed to investigate a proposed bonus system to supplement existing wage scales. The Loyal Legion strongly favors the employment of American citizens in the mills and logging camps and resolutions were adopted at Tuesday's meeting calling on congress to restrict immigration. The board consists of 34 delegates from the 13 Loyal Legion districts in the four northwestern states, representation being equally divided between employers and employees. Sessions will continue this afternoon and Thursday.

F. HULSWIT KILLED IN AUTO PLUNGE

Centralia, Nov. 17.—Driving his automobile over a 60-foot embankment on the Pacific highway six miles south of Vader, Christian Frederick Hulswit, salesman for the Emco Products company of Michigan, sustained injuries which resulted in his death. Mrs. Hulswit, who was making the trip from Portland to Seattle by train, was apprised of the accident and left the train at Vader but her husband had passed away before she reached him. The body will be sent to South Bend, Indiana. An only child of Mr. and Mrs. Hulswit, an infant, died two weeks ago.

Hood River Boy Receives Another Medal for Bravery

University of Washington, Seattle, Nov. 17.—Dave Spaulding of Hood River, Or., received his third medal for bravery in the world war today when he was presented with the Navy Cross, sent by Josephus Daniels, secretary of the navy, with a letter of commendation. Spaulding has already received the American Distinguished Service cross and the Croix de Guerre. The citation accompanying the Navy Cross stated: "He returned to the front line, encouraging his men after being sent to the rear with a severe wound, in the advance of Bourges, France, on June 6, 1918." Spaulding is the sophomore representative on the student board of control here and a student in the college of business administration. He is a member of Sigma Xi.

NEW YORK STOCKS BREAK AT CLOSE

New York, Nov. 17.—(U. P.)—Stocks on the New York exchange again broke violently late today and at the close some issues were off from 10 to 20 points. Many industrial shares made new low levels. Baldwin Locomotive sagged under 96, for a loss of five points. United States Steel at 80½ was down more than two points. Great blocks of stocks were dumped on the market for whatever they would bring.

Personal Effects Of Olive Thomas to Be Sold at Auction

New York, Nov. 17.—(U. P.)—The personal property of Olive Thomas, film star, who died from poisoning in Paris, will be sold at public auction here Monday. The articles, which are now on exhibition, include jewelry, furs, automobiles and wearing apparel. Among the jewelry is a bracelet containing 204 diamonds and three sapphires, a necklace with 103 diamonds, a gold cigarette case set with emeralds and brilliants, another of gold and platinum, a necklace of 500 pearls, another of 100 pearls and a platinum bracelet set with 38 diamonds weighing half a karat each. The furs include practically every known variety. Among the wearing apparel are several imported gowns.

L. T. Merwin Named Vice President of Northwestern Co.

L. T. Merwin, who has acted as general manager of the Northwestern Electric company since the resignation of G. C. Pierce in July, has been appointed general manager and vice president of the company, according to announcement made Tuesday by Herbert Fleishacker of San Francisco, president of the organization. Merwin joined the staff of the Northwestern in 1912 and was soon afterward made superintendent of operation. In 1916 he became general superintendent of construction, operation and maintenance and continued in this capacity until appointed acting general manager upon the resignation of Pierce. Prior to entering the service of the Northwestern Electric company Merwin was superintendent of the Nevada-California Power company. Expansion of the business in Oregon must be preceded by a more friendly attitude on the part of the public service commission toward public service corporations, according to President Fleishacker. Increased cost of operation makes it impossible for the concern to

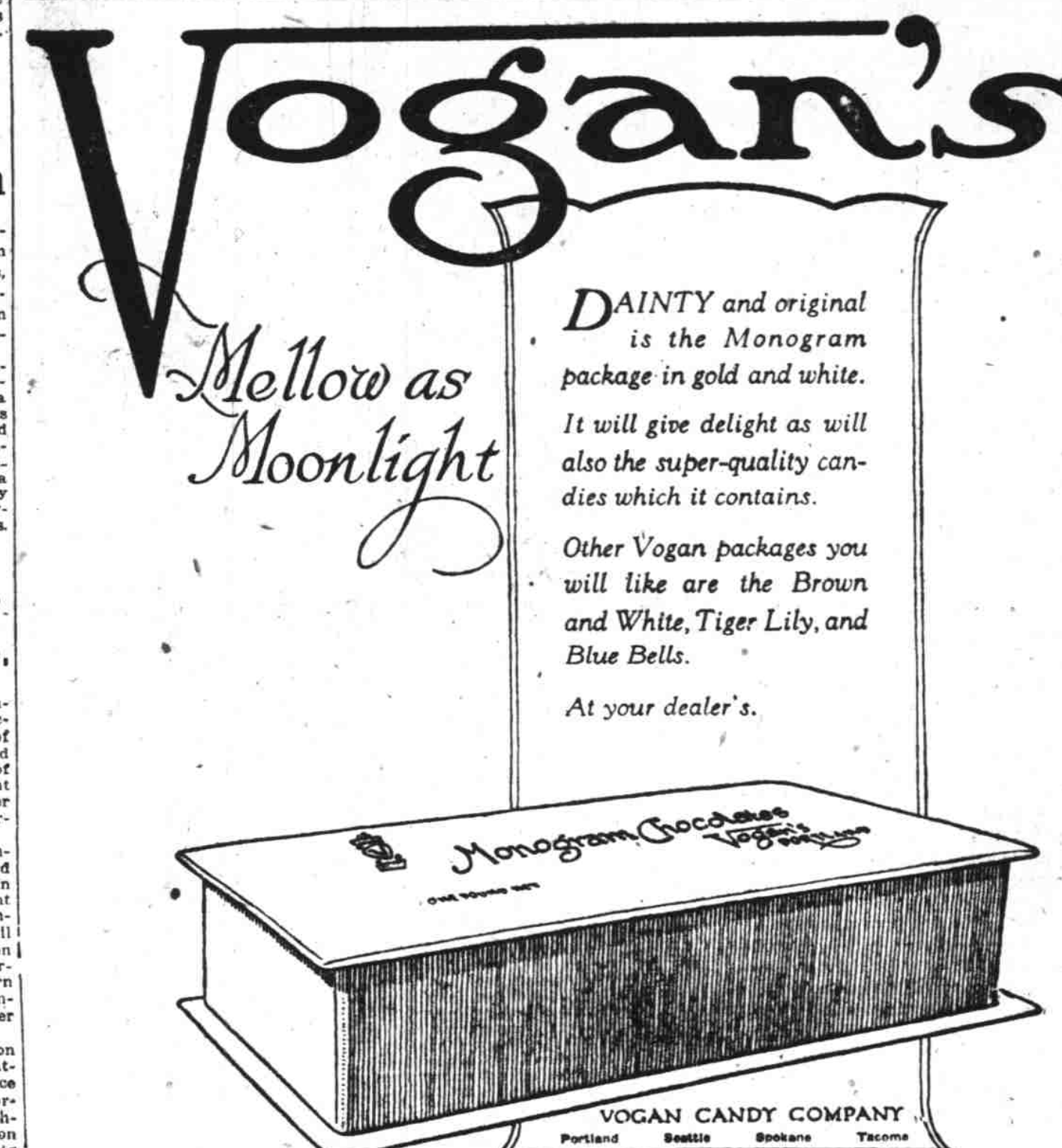
operate at a profit under existing rates and conditions, he stated. "It is not possible to manufacture electrical power, steam heat or gas as cheaply as in the past," said Fleishacker, "and Portland has reached a point where there is no power available for future industrial growth." Fleishacker will return to San Francisco Thursday.
