

ALLEGED STOLEN CLOTHING FOUND; SEARCH CONTINUES

Lee Wygant and Frank Jacobson, who are alleged to have carried on spectacular store robberies at Sheridan and Ballston, are in Portland today in custody of officers, and six suits of clothing have been recovered while search warrants were issued for further search for 15 suits still missing but believed to be in Portland.

H. C. Smith, manager of the Miller Mercantile company's store at Sheridan, Yamhill county, is here to assist the constable's office in the search and to identify such goods as may be located.

The first robbery of the store at Sheridan occurred on Sunday night, November 7. Watchmen were placed in the store, and later in the night or early the next morning the robbers returned for more goods. They got inside the store before the watchman halted them, when they made a dash for the outside through a plate glass door. Several shots were fired at them, but they made their escape without being hit.

Wygant is alleged to have then proceeded to Ballston, five miles from Sheridan, where he is alleged to have robbed another store and made his escape. The goods secured are alleged to have all been brought to Portland and disposed of, except one lot that was recovered in Silverton, where they had been sold by a man who gave his name as Jack Holt. Smith estimates the losses from the Miller Mercantile company's store at Sheridan to be between \$700 and \$1000.

MRS. C. W. ENGLE GRANTED HER DIVORCE BY TAZWELL

C. W. Engle, aged 78, and Susan Engle, aged 79, who were married in Portland September 1, 1909, are no longer husband and wife. Presiding Judge Tazwell this morning issued the divorce decree in favor of Mrs. Engle, after he had given the testimony she had given before a referee at her home, as she is physically unable to appear in the court.

When Mrs. Engle, who was the widow of Reuben Engle, married her husband, she lived with him just two months. She says immediately after their marriage he found she had a 120-acre farm as part of her inheritance upon her selling it so he could use the money. She said she refused, as her first husband, as his dying wish, told her she was to keep the farm intact so long as she lived and it was then to go to their children. After that the trouble of the Engles developed.

CIRCUIT COURT DISPOSES OF MORE CITY APPEAL CASES

Three more appeals from the judgment of the municipal court were disposed of by the Multnomah county circuit court Friday. Hearing of these appeal cases will be a daily matter until disposition is made of the entire accumulation.

In the municipal court, James Cardas, 55 North Sixth street, was fined \$100 and given 10 days in jail for selling grape juice and cider with too high alcoholic content. Circuit Judge Gatens reduced the fine to \$75.

G. Glendoeff, 41 Third street, was given a sentence of 10 and 10 days for a similar offense when he was before the municipal court. He also got a reduction to a fine of \$75.

R. J. Rickett, 34 North Fourth street, was fined \$100 in the municipal court for swearing at police officers who inspected his place. The case was dismissed by Judge Gatens, who held that policemen themselves sometimes swore and should not be so sensitive.

J. J. RICKETT IS ACCUSED OF COMMITTING THEFT

J. J. Rickett, charged with larceny, was taken to the county jail today after having been arrested at the Rainier hotel by Deputy Constables Gloss and Watkins. His bail was fixed at \$500, which he had not been able to raise at noon. He is charged with having stolen two trunks of clothing and other articles from relatives. He took his wife's automobile and traveled to a point seven miles beyond Pendleton, where the car was burned and it is said he then telegraphed his wife regarding the situation and she went to him. When they returned to Portland the arrest was made.

BEDFORD NEAL IS GIVEN SENTENCE TO PENITENTIARY

Bedford Neal, 62 years old, was sentenced by Circuit Judge Stapleton today to an indeterminate term of not more than 10 years in the state penitentiary, he having been convicted of misusing an 8-year-old girl he had pretended to adopt.

Before sentence was imposed, Neal admitted to the court that he had been in previous trouble of a similar character. He had taken a 10-year-old girl under his charge in Illinois and was charged and convicted of a like offense. He said he had served eight years and four months in the Illinois state penitentiary when he was paroled and he was still under parole when he got into the trouble in Portland.

BENEFICIARY UNDER WILL SEEKS BEQUEST PAYMENT

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CARRIED PISTOL BUT DID NOT KNOW LAW VIOLATED

Raffie Seriani, a watchman at a machinery yard, pleaded guilty to carrying a pistol without a permit before Presiding Judge Tazwell Thursday, and was sentenced to three months in the county jail and then paroled to a neighbor who explained that he thought all watchmen had the right to carry firearms. That he hadn't made use of the gun was evidenced by the fact that a man had attacked him and shot him in the face and that when he was taken to the hospital the gun he carried was found in his pocket undischarged.

Former Conductor Sentenced

Cornelius Heltman, 20 years old, who was a conductor on the local street car lines, and who was found guilty of contributing to the delinquency of minors by a jury in the court of domestic relations, was sentenced Friday afternoon by Judge Kanizer to 60 days in the county jail and to pay a fine of \$250.

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Five Years for Cripple

Edward Cople appeared before Presiding Judge Tazwell Saturday forenoon and pleaded guilty to a statutory crime. He was sentenced to five years in the state penitentiary.

Sick Man Robbed By New Friend; Loot Includes \$81

H. Goba made a new "friend" Friday and took him up to his room at 20 North Ninth street, where the two imbibed freely of a mixture of cider and bay rum. Presently Goba developed a pain in his side. He lay on the bed and his friend suggested a plaster to relieve the pain. Goba consented and the new friend searched the sick man's pocket for money to buy the plaster. After the friend had been gone a reasonable length of time and failed to return, Goba grew suspicious and searched his pockets to learn if he had been robbed. Two watches, \$60 in currency and \$21 in silver was all the friend required to purchase a 25-cent plaster.

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
