This will be the first block of a series of such bonds, he stated, the amount depending on the financial position of the farmer and market price of wheat. The executive committee of the board of directors of the Wheat Growers' association met today.

"The money will be on hand to loan to the farmers within two weeks," said Mr. Robinson today. The bonds will carry 8 per cent interest and be short time. We already have offered to underwrite the bonds. There will be no trouble in their disposition.

The Lincoln Trust company of Spokane has agreed to act as trustee for the \$500,000 bends to be issued by the Washington Wheat Growers' association, according to A. C. Adams, secretary-treasurer of the association.
