

JUDGE GRIFFIN URGES NEW TRIAL FOR TOM MOONEY

Declares Witnesses in Hearing Following Preparedness Day Explosion Are Discredited.

San Francisco, Nov. 20.—There is only one indictment in my court against Thomas J. Mooney, and that is for murder in connection with the Preparedness day bomb explosion, which occurred July 23, 1916. I most certainly think he should be given a new trial," said Superior Judge Frank A. Griffin in an interview given to Universal Service today.

"I have thought all along that Mooney should be given a new trial, and my stand has not been changed since I wrote my letter to Governor William D. Stephens, November 19, 1919, in which I explained my stand fully.

"By this letter I urged the governor to act on behalf of Mooney, so that a new trial could be held, but the only action he can take would be to pardon him.

"It was my belief at the time, and it is still my opinion, that there were only four witnesses connected with the Mooney Preparedness day murders, in which 10 persons were killed and 50 others were more or less seriously injured. One of these witnesses was a perjurer and two others have been discredited since their testimony was given."

Judge Griffin characterized John McDonald, one of the witnesses, as a perjurer, and Mrs. Nellie Edeau and her daughter Sadie as discredited witnesses.

"To my mind, Frank C. Oxman, the Oregon cattleman, was by far the most important witness in the case; but recent developments, especially the statements made by Policeman Draper Hand, cast doubts on the veracity of his testimony," continued the judge.

"No action has as yet been taken by Governor Stephens in the matter, as far as I am aware. What District Attorney Brady's intentions are in the Mooney case I do not know. I have already made myself clear on the subject, and the next step must come from the governor's office."

Dr. Lovejoy Makes New Move in Legal Spat With Hubby

Dr. Esther Pohl-Lovejoy has returned from Roseburg, where she has been fighting the erection of a tuberculosis sanitarium on the North Umpqua river and has filed an injunction suit against its promoters, her husband, George A. Lovejoy and Dr. V. L. Ruter. Another injunction suit is being prepared, with five plaintiffs, consisting of the state board of health, the city of Roseburg, which obtains its water supply from the North Umpqua river, Douglas county, Douglas County Light & Power company and Dr. Lovejoy.

Principal objection to the sanitarium lies in the danger it would impart to the health of Roseburg citizens through the contamination of its water supply. Defendants in the case maintain that proper sewerage system will insure sanitation and will prevent pollution of the water supply, and insist that Dr. Lovejoy's objection is largely a selfish one, based upon the depreciation in value it will give her adjoining property.

Ruter is the inventor of an electric-therapy method of tuberculosis treatment, of which orthodox physicians are skeptical. It is said, and Dr. Lovejoy, as president of the International Association of Women Physicians, has said she does not wish her place in the medical profession imperiled through any connection of her name with an institution of this sort.

Dallas, Nov. 20.—More than 100 teachers of Polk county are attending the annual teachers' institute in this city.

C., to assume the duties incident to his appointment by the president as one of the seven commissioners on the United States shipping board. Friends of the law, of transportation, lumber and civic affairs, came by to grasp his hand and wish him success in an enterprise that enlarges his career and constitutes national recognition of his achievements in commerce and shipping.

Federal Control of Railroads Requested

Washington, Nov. 20.—(U. S.)—In a statement issued today Ernest O. P. Ames, president of the Pacific Coast Operative League today made a plea for a return of the railroads to government operations. He declared that one of the most serious problems facing the West at this time was high freight rates and said that sentiment was growing among the farmers and workmen in favor of government ownership of railroads.

Sometime ago Elder got leave of absence for two weeks on the strength of a nervous breakdown, and went to his home at Altoona, Pa.

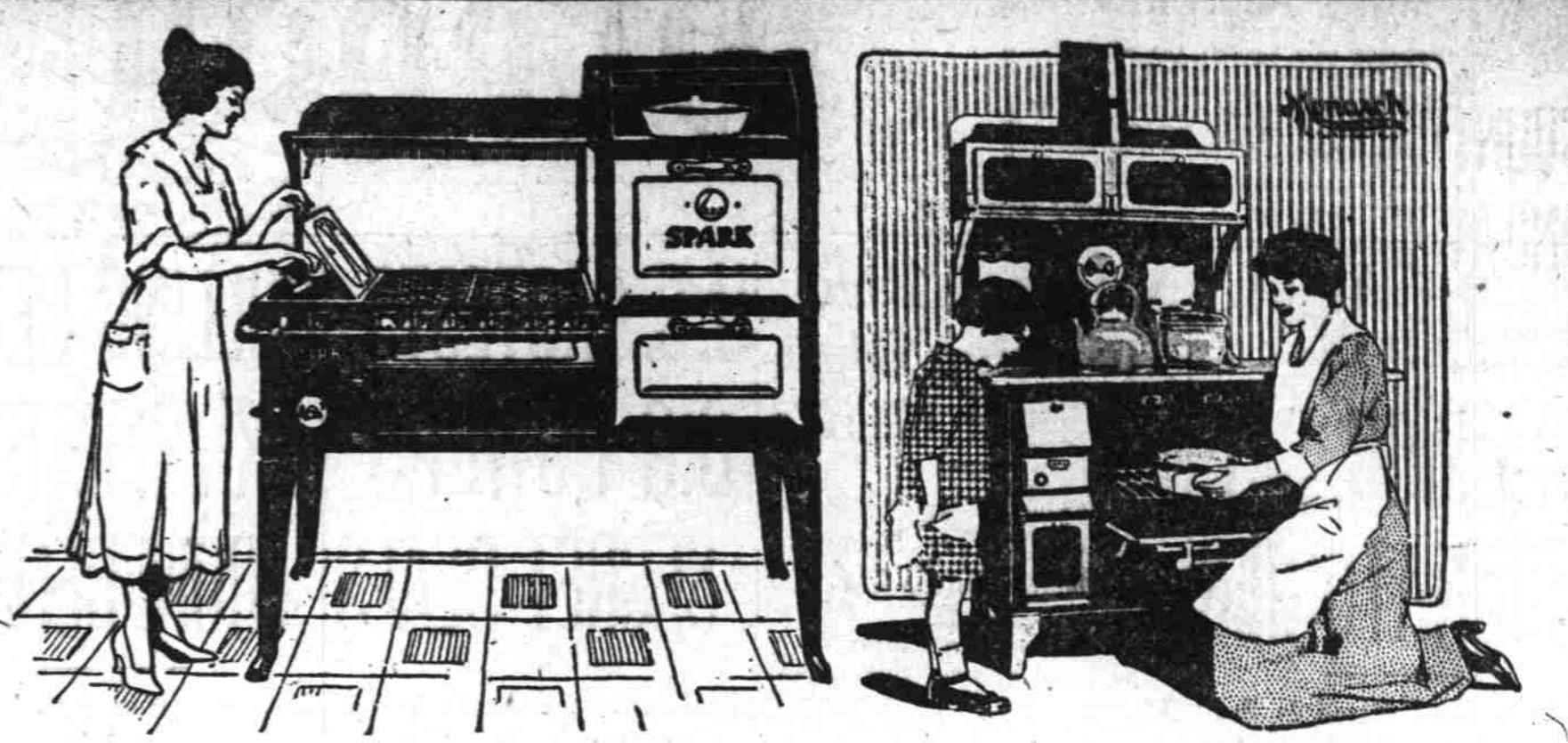

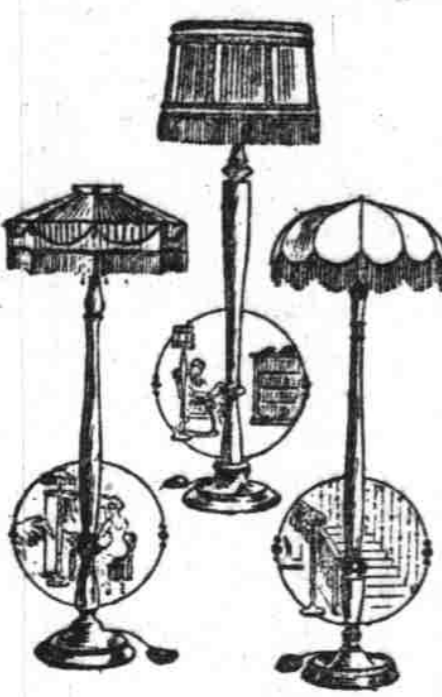

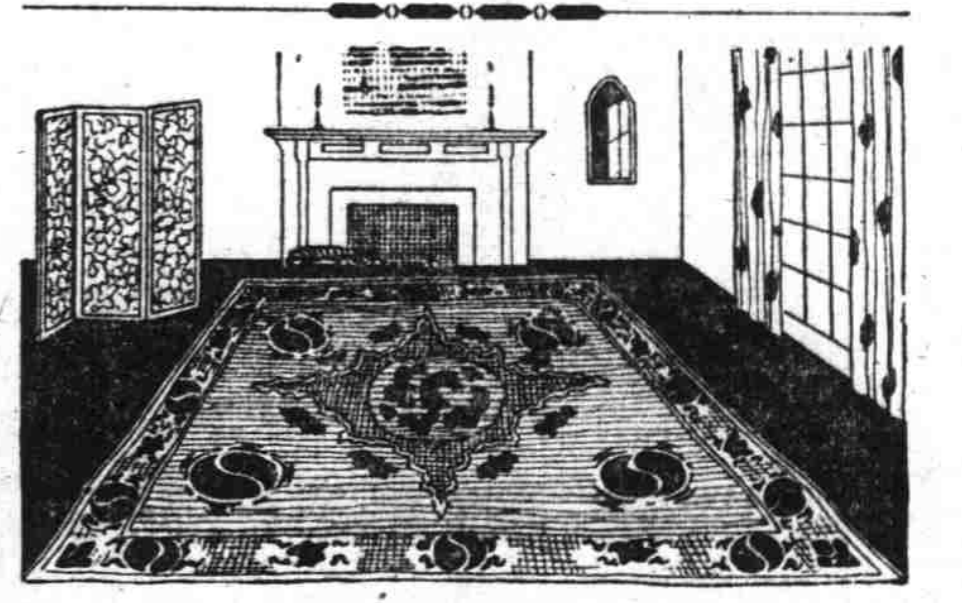
