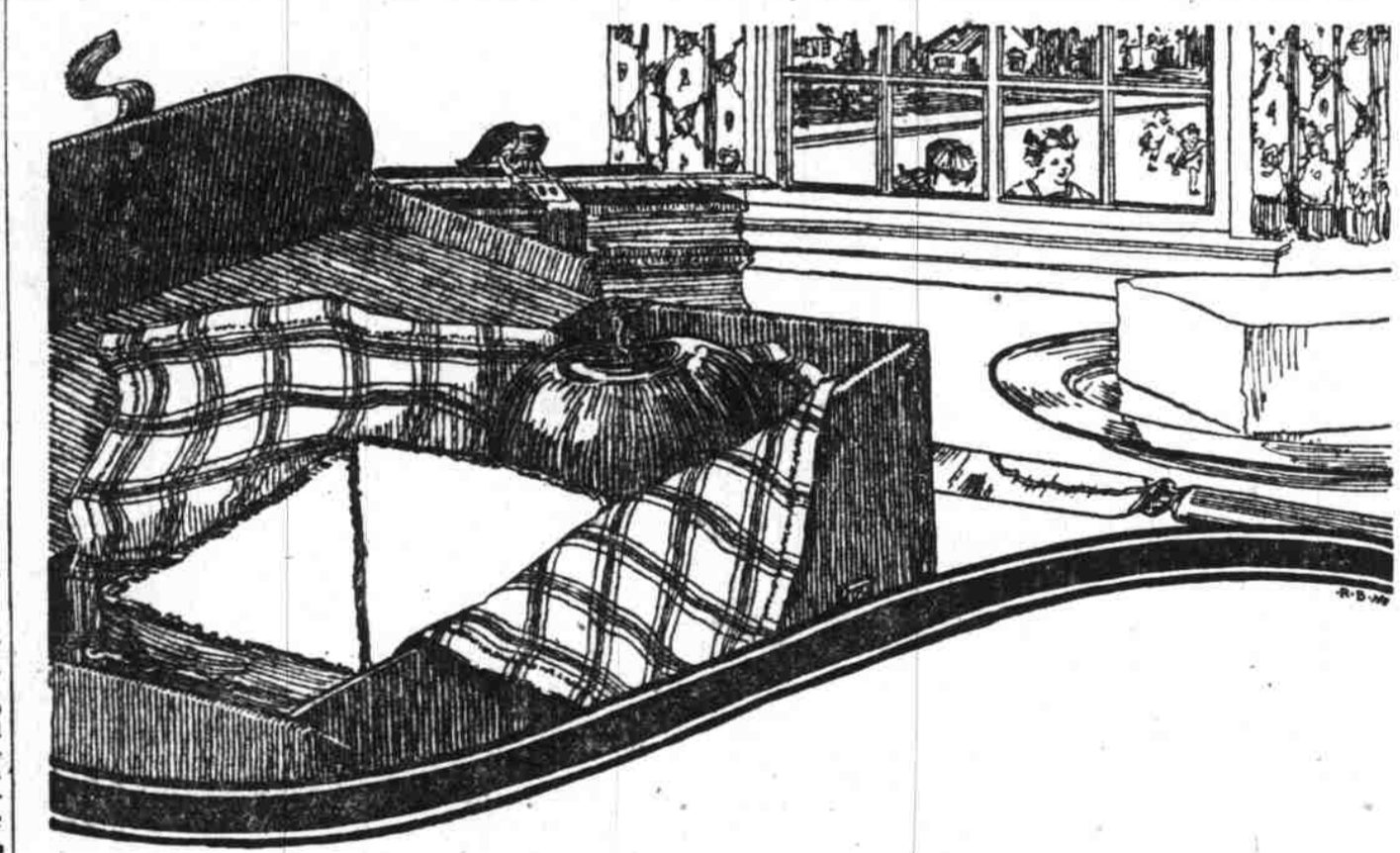
Ontario Farmers Will Produce New Feed for Cattle

Ontario, Or., Nov. 20.—The farmers in this vicinity have completed an organization and plans for grinding alfalfa into meal for stock feed, and will begin operations in a few days with a mill that will grind 30 tons per day. This meal will be mixed with grain and molasses, the result being a feed unexcelled as a "finisher" in fattening stock. The farmers are doing this as a protection against a lack of market for hay in the stack, and they say they can realize a better price for hay by converting it into meal. The mill is located on the O. S. L. Ry. Co. right of way south of Ontario, and the machinery is on hand and building erected.
