

BILL AUTHORIZING SOVIET DEAL SURE, STATES VANDERLIP

London, Nov. 22.—"A bill authorizing the resumption of American trade with Russia is assured of passing in the Republican congress, if necessary over President Wilson's veto. It is absurd to think that I would undertake such a gigantic undertaking, and that the capitalist group behind me, which includes E. L. Doheny, the oil magnate, would be interested unless it has assurance of favorable action by the American government."

Thus Washington Vanderlip, whose activities have been watched by several countries, answered the criticism of his trade territorial concessions. In an interview today at the Carlton hotel, he was quietly amused over the suspecting attitude of the majority of the British.

BIGGEST DEAL OF HISTORY
Vanderlip, who is acting in behalf of purely Pacific coast capital, declared he would show authentic contracts when he arrived in America, covering enormous projects, in which the Vanderlip syndicate will act as fiscal agents, and that trade undoubtedly—barring unforeseen obstacles—will begin early in the new year.

U. S. Note Demands All Nationals Get Rights in Orient

Washington, Nov. 22.—The American note to Great Britain on the subject of treatment to be accorded citizens of this country in their commercial activities in Mesopotamia was forwarded Sunday. The text of it will probably be made public within a few days.

The note is in reply to one from Great Britain. The correspondence was begun after it was reported Great Britain and France had reached an agreement whereby they acquired a virtual monopoly of rich oil and other resources in Mesopotamia and other areas of Asia Minor.

The state department has made it clear this government would insist on equal rights for all nationals in mandate territories, as well as those over which the correspondence arose.

McCormack Won't Sing in England; Sorry for Irish

London, Nov. 22.—John McCormack, world known Irish tenor, is proud of his new American citizenship.

Also, though he did it most politely and diplomatically, he has firmly announced that if the only way he can win British applause is to praise Great Britain's methods in Ireland, he is prepared to struggle along making a living out of his warbling without being popular in England.

On his arrival here from Australia, McCormack announced the abandonment of his English tour because of opposition to him in England. In making the announcement, the singer said: "I am proud that I became an American citizen. I have never regretted the step. It is untrue that I took out my naturalization papers during the war, as I did not take any action until June, 1919."

"I wish also to state that if popularity in this country can only be gained by my expression of admiration for the way the government is conducting affairs in Ireland, I must do without that popularity."

Candidates Settle Hermiston Tie Vote

Hermiston, Nov. 22.—The tie vote for city recorder between J. D. Watson and C. W. Kellogg has been settled by the candidates, Watson taking the first year of the term and Kellogg the second. Watson was appointed by the city council to fill the unexpired term of Mrs. Mabel Jensen, resigned, who has acted as recorder since the death of her husband last August. J. W. Campbell was appointed councilman to fill Watson's unexpired term.

Tuscania Victim's Memory Is Honored

Elgin, Or., Nov. 22.—A military funeral was held Saturday for Corporal Terry Tuttle, who lost his life in 1918 when the Tuscania was sunk by a submarine off the coast of Ireland. The body was washed ashore and buried by surviving comrades in Ireland until removal for shipment to Elgin. The funeral was in charge of the local American Legion post. Corporal Tuttle was a brother of Lee Tuttle, former editor of the Elgin Recorder. His father was for many years publisher of the local paper.

Travelers Report Southern Oregon Highway Passable

Roseburg, Nov. 22.—Gravel work on the road between Roseburg and Willou has practically rebuilt eight miles of the roughest traveling on the Pacific highway and motorists are making the run in good time and with comparatively little trouble, even after hard rains.

One spot is giving trouble near Yoncalla, where a dirt fill at the end of the pavement has been soft. Crushed rock is putting this bit in safe condition and road men believe that winter travel will be continuous at all points on the Pacific highway both north and south from Roseburg.

Reports that roads in Southern Oregon are impassable are called erroneous and many people who had been warned to ship their cars through from California by either boat or train have passed through the city northward with little criticism of the going at any point.

REDS PROTEST TO GREAT BRITAIN

Moscow, Nov. 18, Via Wireless to Berlin, Nov. 22.—George Tchitcherine, people's commissioner for foreign affairs in the soviet government, today addressed a sharp note to the British government through Earl Curzon, the British foreign secretary, warning Great Britain not to occupy Batum on the Black sea.

The note says, in effect, that information has reached the soviet government that the British intend to occupy Batum and that the soviet government wishes to convey warning in advance that it will regard such an act as one of aggression against the new state of Azerbaijan. If Great Britain attempts to occupy Batum, continues the note, soviet Russia will "take all necessary steps."

HELD AID TO REVOLT
The note states further the soviet government would regard a move towards British occupation of Batum as evidence of aid to the revolt.

dense that the British government does not intend to let Russian workers labor in peace, but will continue to incite counter-revolutionary plots.

Hope was expressed by the soviet government that the British government does not contemplate any hostile acts, but if it does, says the comment, "the outcome will rest altogether upon the British government."

The International News Service correspondent interviewed a number of high soviet officials today and all agreed that active counter-revolutionary movements against Russia are now practically a dead issue. Soviet officials expressed the belief that General Petlura and General Balachovich can easily be disposed of unless they are openly aided by the Poles. But even if Poland gave aid, said the officials, the outcome would not necessarily be disastrous for the Moscow government.

BRITAIN IS ONLY CLOUD
The only real cloud upon the horizon, officials declare, is the report that the British intend to occupy Batum. If such a situation arises, say the Bolshevik officials, "it will incite such a conflagration in the Caucasus and Near East that would make the British hesitate about repeating it in the future."

Soviet Russia has a close treaty of alliance with the new state of Azerbaijan and one of the clauses was an offer of protection by Moscow.

Brother-in-Law of Wilson Asks Chance To Answer Charge

Washington, Nov. 22.—Richard Willber Bolling, brother-in-law of President Wilson and treasurer of the Shipping board, demanded today that he be permitted to take the witness stand and defend himself against the charge made by Frederick Sands that he participated in a \$40,000 bribery fund used to influence Shipping board contracts.

"I am anxious to have this matter cleared up and will gladly give all the evidence I can to the Walsh committee," said Bolling.

"The charge made by Sands that I borrowed \$1000 from him about the time this fund was instituted is a lie and is on a par with his other testimony. He never made a loan of any sort to me," continued the president's brother-in-law. "As a matter of fact Sands still owes me \$900 on a \$15,000 house which I built for him in 1916 when I was in the contracting business. Only two weeks ago he notified me he was unable to pay the balance."
