Stills Sold to Aid the Poor—When a big copper still was captured near St. Johns last year, it was taken to the sheriff's office in Vancouver, where it remained until recently. When the federal officers came around they took an ax and made a few holes in the still. As the case has been disposed of, there was no need keeping this still and a number of other ones, so they were hammered down and given to the Salvation Army, which sold them for the copper contained in them.

Business on Increase—Gross receipts of the state corporation department for the fiscal year from July 1, 1919, to June 30, 1920, inclusive, were \$307,064.51, while the gross receipts from July 1, 1918, to June 30, 1919, aggregated \$222,176.51, according to a report just filed by T. B. Handley, state corporation commissioner. The increase in receipts for the year totaled \$84,888, when compared with those of the previous 12 months.

Farmers Buy Much Wire—Fifteen farmers living in the vicinity of Heppner recently pooled their order for wire fencing, which was placed directly to the factory in Pittsburg, Pa., and the carload was shipped to Heppner direct and unloaded in that city. Owing to the size of the order and the directness with which the wire was bought, the farmers made a saving of nearly \$3000. In the shipment were 43 miles of woven wire and 37 miles of barbed wire.

Portland Savings Ninth—Portland is the ninth city in the United States in the amount of its postal savings deposits, which aggregate \$1,706,675. New York is first and next in rank are Brooklyn, Chicago, Detroit, Boston, Pittsburgh, Philadelphia and Newark. Astoria has deposits of \$261,817, with many much larger cities, including New Orleans and Dallas, Texas, trailing behind. Aberdeen, Wash., has \$434,152, and Raymond, \$121,502.

Apple Market Swamped—It will be news to the orchardists of Oregon that the prospect for Northwestern fruit in England is from bright. Shipments of barreled apples are already swamping England. Because of the serious strike situation, thousands of boxes of pears and barrels of apples have rotted and have been dumped, it is said.

Portland Man Appointed—Willis S. Moore, until recently engaged in the practice of law, with offices in the Green building, has been appointed assistant attorney general by H. Van Winkle, attorney general. Mr. Moore has been active in legal affairs in Oregon for some time, and is well known to the lawyers of the state. He has already assumed his new duties.

Oregon Flour to Spain—Spain will receive a full cargo of Oregon flour when the Admiral line steamer, *Washington*, docks at Cadiz. The cereal has been sent by the Portland Flouring Mills company and is the first shipment of its kind ever sent from here to the Spanish port. It is likewise the first cargo from the Willamette river to go to that section of Europe.

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Mazama President Starts Campaign to Aid National Parks

In an effort to prevent the passage of national legislation affecting the preservation of the national parks this winter, A. B. Williams, president of the Mazamas, has requested each member to write a personal letter to his congressmen.

The Mazama hope to secure the passage of the bill removing the national parks and monuments from the authority of the new water power commission, and to defeat the irrigation bill intended to create a reservoir in the Falls River basin of Yellowstone park and to dam Yellowstone lake.

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
