

OREGON EN ROUTE TO PASADENA AGGIES PRAISED FOR SHOWING

Six Elevens Undeclared In Football

NEW YORK, Nov. 22.—Six eastern football elevens remain in the select unbeaten circle as the most brilliant football season in the history of the sport draws near a close.

Princeton, Harvard, Penn State, Pittsburg, Boston college and Stevens comprise the select and a least four of this number will remain undefeated when the season closes. The Crimson, the Tiger and Stevens have closed their seasons. Penn State and Pittsburg will have it out on Thanksgiving day.

NO RECOGNIZED CHAMP
Football fans in Pennsylvania regard the Pitt-Penn State game as a championship affair, but it is practically certain that no eastern team will be recognized as champion of this section.

Princeton supporters are claiming the big third title for the Tigers, following Harvard's failure to defeat Yale by a score as large as the Orange and Black ran up against the Blue. But the 14-14 tie against the Tiger and the Crimson stands in the way. The schedule of this closing week of the season offers several games of importance in addition to the engagement between the Panthers and State at Pittsburgh. The annual battle between Cornell and Penn at Philadelphia on Turkey day will attract plenty of attention, for Penn demonstrated against Columbia that she is not "shot to pieces."

In the Middle West, where Ohio State has clinched the Big Ten title, two games still remain to be played that promise plenty of action. Notre Dame's fast gridder will meet the Michigan Aggies at East Lansing on Thanksgiving and Washington State will tackle Nebraska at Lincoln the same day.

The only big game of the dying season, however, will be the Army-Navy battle at the Polo grounds next Saturday. This game will undoubtedly be witnessed by a record crowd, and although the Army will go into the contest a favorite to win, football followers are looking for a hotly contested game.

"BIG TEN" CONFERENCE SEASON FULL OF THRILLS

Chicago, Nov. 22.—The collegiate football season in the West ended Saturday with thrills to spare.

In a finish that was dramatic enough to suit the most satisfied enthusiast, Ohio made a last minute rally that brought to that state another honor—the "Big Ten" conference championship—by defeating Illinois 7 to 0 in a battle that is memorable in conference annals.

HAVE GREAT PUNCH

The two elevens had fought each other to a standstill at Champaign and the last moments of the game saw them scoreless with the ball in the center of the field. One minute and a few seconds remained, when, on the last down, H. Workman hurled 42 yards to Myers, who emerged over the line with the touchdown and victory. The referee's whistle ended the game with the goal kicked.

It was the fourth time during the season that Ohio has pulled a game out of the fire in the dying moments. In Wisconsin, Michigan, Chicago and Illinois all falling before that last moment punch. Nothing more could be asked in the way of tight battles than the games in the "Big Ten" conference this fall. Illinois won from Michigan by a missed goal. Wisconsin defeated both Minnesota and Chicago by a drop kick punting. Illinois defeated Chicago by the same margin, a field goal. One desperately fought contest after another has ended with a boot from the field or a timely pass returning one team or another a victor.

MINNESOTA YEAR POOR

Ohio's record for the season is little short of miraculous. Accomplished once or twice, it could be called lucky, but four games matched in the last minutes of play stills that cry. Ohio has that necessary resource, the training in following the ball, that takes advantage of an opponent's momentary weakness.

Wisconsin ends the season with one defeat against its record. Minnesota concluded the season with a straight defeat. The heartbreaking blow that was dealt by Michigan Saturday, when a place kick by Stettete upset its best effort of the year and took the historic "little brown jug" back to Ann Arbor. Iowa ended the season with three wins and two defeats marked on the record.

BOXING

NEW YORK, Nov. 22.—(U. S. S.)—The first of a series of championship boxing bouts will be held at Madison Square Garden Friday night, when Benny Leonard, lightweight champion, defends his title in a 15-round bout with Joe Weiling of Chicago. On December 14 Jack Dempsey and Bill Brennan will meet in a title contest, and Tex Rickard expects to put on Champions Johnny Kilbane, Pete Herman and Jack Britton in later bouts.

Notre Dame-Ohio Contest Would Settle Dispute

Chicago, Nov. 22.—(U. S. S.)—Football fans who dole on post-season debate are arguing today that Notre Dame and Ohio State university should meet in a struggle to decide the championship of the Middle West.

Neither Ohio nor Notre Dame has wasted defeat this season, and Ohio, by its sensational last-minute victory over Illinois Saturday, clearly regained the championship of the Western intercollegiate conference, the "Big Ten." Notre Dame has walked Purdue, Indiana and Northwestern, each a member of the "Big Ten," and in addition has triumphed over the powerful Nebraska and West Point elevens.

There seems little likelihood of a post-season game will be arranged, and no negotiations have been instituted, so far as is known, but only such a contest, many fans declare, can settle the question of Midwest supremacy.

Chase Will Fight Attempt to Get Him To Go to Windy City

Los Angeles, Cal., Nov. 22.—(U. S. S.)—H. Chase, now in this city, says he will fight an attempt to get him to Chicago in connection with the major league probe.

"My name has been brought up in connection with the scandal, but they haven't anything on me," said Chase. "I have some private reasons for not wanting to leave California at the present time. If it wasn't for these I would be glad to go back to Chicago and testify if they wanted me."

"John McGraw sent me a contract calling for \$60,000 a season. I sent him word that I would not play for that money and I received no answer from him. I still have the contract."

Chase says he is planning to go into business and that he has contracts to supply thousands of cords of wood to various California industries.

Walla Walla to Play Vancouver for Title

Walla Walla, Wash., Nov. 22.—Principal H. W. Jones of the Walla Walla high school announced Monday that he had completed arrangements with the management of the Vancouver, Wash., high school eleven to play a state championship game to be played at Walla Walla on Thanksgiving day.

By winning the Armistice day game against the Chehalis high school 58 to 0 Vancouver claims the championship of Western Washington, while Walla Walla claims the championship of the east side through a string of victories against Yakima, Pasco and Colfax, and the elimination of both the Lewis and Clark and the North Central high school elevens.

Spokane by the action of the state intercollegiate league, which, sitting at Spokane at the request of both schools, threw out as ineligible two North Central players and four Lewis and Clark men who have been used regularly all of the season. This action came as a result of a dispute between the two Spokane teams in which Walla Walla took no part.

Geddon Is Released By St. Louis Browns

Percy W. Lewis has donated a trophy which will go to the winner of the play-off. More than 30 already have signed the list and many more will be ready to play, according to present indications. Efforts will be made to start the schedule soon after the Thanksgiving holidays.

Iowa Wins Championship

Urbana, Ill., Nov. 22.—(U. S. S.)—Iowa for the second consecutive year won the western collegiate conference cross-country championship Saturday, scoring third, fourth, seventh, eighth and tenth.

California Wins Coast Grid Honors

THE Pacific Coast intercollegiate conference football season ended Saturday, California winning the championship by its victories over Washington State college, Oregon Agricultural college and Stanford. With the championship the Bears won the right to participate in the New Year's classic at Pasadena, despite the fact that the University of Southern California has been given partial recognition by the Pasadena officials.

FILE UP MANY POINTS

Andy Smith's machine piled up a total of 104 points in the three conference games played and had but seven points scored against it, the Oregon Aggies putting over a touchdown on the Bears after catching the Californians asleep on an old school boy football trick.

Stanford finished second in the conference race with two victories and one defeat. As the result of the tie contest between Oregon and O. A. C. Saturday, the Lemon-Yellow and W. S. C. tied for third place honors.

SPORT NOTES

Aberdeen, Wash., Nov. 22.—Indications point to one of the largest crowds that ever witnessed a football game here Thanksgiving day, when Aberdeen high school meets Montesano high to determine who will have second place in the Southwest Washington league. Incidentally the game will settle a tie played early in the season.

Columbia park's football team will play Albany college eleven Thanksgiving afternoon. "We had planned on playing Anaconda, Mont., on Thanksgiving day, arrangements having been completed some time ago. The Anaconda school was forced to call off the match, and it did not come with any sorrow on our part, for the players feel that they have had a strenuous enough time on Multnomah field during the last month and a half. They are all used up, as it were, and are in no condition to play another game."

OREGON DEPARTS FOR SOUTH WITHOUT CAPTAIN STEERS

University of Oregon, Eugene, Nov. 22.—The Oregon football eleven left Sunday afternoon for Pasadena, where they will play the University of Southern California Thanksgiving day.

"Bill" Steers, the whirlwind quarterback upon whom much of the Oregon strength depends, did not go. He was called to The Dalles because of the injury of his father in an auto wreck.

Latest reports indicate that Steers' father is feeling easy which probably means that Bill will be able to reach Pasadena in time for the contest.

Just before the departure of the team a rally was held at the depot. "Shy" Huntington said the chances for victory were not especially bright, but that the fighting spirits of the men, as shown in the Aggie battle, gave him confidence that they would never be forgotten, no matter how big the score against them.

The hope is against Oregon, the University of Southern California having beaten Stanford, which triumphed over Oregon, but hope does not count for much this year. It is the hope that a reaction resulting from the Washington and O. A. C. contests may not hit the team before Thursday.

The Williams star is thinking of entering West Point where he would be more than welcome.

McCormick Shows Speed In Workout

BOY MCCORMICK, the careless slugger of a year ago, has been transformed into Boy McCormick, a splendid boxer, a terrific and accurate hitter, and a superb blocker. McCormick is stepping about with the speed and agility of a lightweight. His blows are sent with a snap from short angles. His blocking, particularly that for the body, is almost as perfect as that of the late Joe Gains.

McCormick demonstrated these things in his last strenuous workout before a large crowd at the Olympic gymnasium Sunday afternoon. He was altogether a different McCormick from the one who fought and whipped Frank Farmer and Captain Bob Roper. His loss of weight has not only lightened and increased his speed, but seems to have given him more hitting power, as contradictory as that may appear.

FINISHES HARD WORK

McCormick went 14 rounds Sunday without let-up, and he appeared tireless at the end of the arduous workout. The feather-tooled and turtle-shelled Bert Taylor was taken on for five incessant rounds that had all the semblance of a real fight. Taylor was twice sent to the canvas. Fitzmorris, a husky first man, went two rounds that were scoreless for Fitzmorris. A lighter boy came on next for three rounds. The boy had

put in four previous rounds in bag-punching and rope-skiping.

Willie Meehan came in at 3 o'clock for 10 or more rounds of work. Rope-skiping and boxing were Willie's tid-bits. A fellow named Hurst went after Willie for two rounds, but after he had hurt Willie with a low blow he was taken out, and Harlan Bunker, a Jack-the-Giant-Killer sort of a chap, went in for three rounds. Bunker gave Willie a stiff trial. Harold Bird, a middleweight, was used to give Willie a taste of speed, and he kept the "phat" boy going all the time.

Meehan is tough and can assimilate much punishment, but his gymnasium work does not show him to be of McCormick's caliber. He is slow beside the flashy Irishman, and apparently does not hit as hard.

MASCOTT IN SHAPE

The Billy Mascott-Ray Rose bantamweight championship contest is creating considerable interest among the ring followers. Mascott, realizing that he has a hard battle on his hands, is in better shape than he has been for a good many months. Rose is not in Mascott's class as a boxer, but he is his terrific punches, depending largely on his right to stop his opponents.

Indications are that Milwaukee for the first time this season will draw a big crowd. The advance seat sale has been pretty heavy.
