

EUROPE REFUSES TO BUY AMERICAN HOGS; PRICE FALLS

Chicago, Nov. 23.—Europe is practically out of America's livestock market.
Germany and Italy are buying only 20 per cent as many hogs in this country as a year ago.
All countries in continental Europe, including Belgium, Scandinavia, Denmark and Switzerland are trading among themselves. Because of the foreign exchange situation they can't afford to do business in America.
This, in the main, is the reason for the sensational price declines Monday at practically every hog market in the United States.
One other important factor, but a lesser one, is the rushing to market of hogs by farmers who are being pressed by country banks to meet payments on loans.
Great Britain has purchased few hogs since July 1. What little North American business she has done has been in Canada. It is not likely that England will get back into the market until January or February.
The money market, according to bankers, packers, traders and market experts interviewed by the United News late Monday, is operating against export business.

By Minnie Bongardner of Wonder, construction of a reservoir on Water creek for the storage of water for irrigation purposes in Josephine county.
By D. F. Norton of Takilma, south fork Scott's gulch, for the irrigation of 25 acres in Josephine county.
By the Deer Creek Livestock company of La Grande, water from Lost creek for domestic use and the irrigation of 50 acres in Wallowa county.

Joan of Arc, Beaten By Breakers, Begins To Break to Pieces

Marshfield, Nov. 23.—Founded by a heavy sea, the steamer Joan of Arc, abandoned by the crew last week after striking on Rogue River reef, is in the breakers off Port Orford and has started to go to pieces.
One side of the vessel is breaking away and the hull is holding together apparently only because of the lumber in the hold. One of the masts was blown away during the high wind Sunday night, and the vessel was moved closer to the shore line. The steamer is now in the dashing breakers and all hope of salvaging her is gone.
It is only a matter of a few days until the steamer will be torn apart. Captain Michelson and several of his crew made two or three trips to the vessel and saved a few of their personal belongings and some of the things from the captain's cabin.

HOMES FLOODED BY HIGH SEA ON EASTERN COAST

Boston, Nov. 23.—(I. N. S.)—A northeast gale, accompanied by a cold drizzling rain, whipped by the New England coast today and carried havoc in its wake. The sea ran higher than at any time for months. Seacoast towns were inundated and cellars flooded.
At Winthrop the waves dashed over the seawall. Many persons were temporarily marooned in their homes.
At Nantasket the tide dashed over the new breakwater. Many small boats were thrown onto the side streets and cellars were flooded. A heavy wind interfered with telephone, telegraph and lighting systems all along the coast.
