

FARMERS AMONG THOSE WHO WILL DEMAND RELIEF

Washington, Nov. 24.—Indications are multiplying that a deluge of complaints will descend on congress when it meets December 6.
Farmers are loudly demanding relief from declining markets and restricted credits.
Their general dissatisfaction is shown by reports reaching the department of agriculture and other agencies. Associations of all kinds are meeting and protesting throughout the country, co-operative marketing organizations are springing up, agencies are being restricted and holding movements organized.
This dissatisfaction will find expression through senators and representatives from agricultural states who are now preparing to present a legislative program in response to the calls for help from their constituents.
Wheat and cotton are selling at lower prices than before the war. Corn and oats are cheaper than at any time in five years. Hogs touched \$10 in many markets Tuesday, a price which farmers declare is ruinous. Cattle are down. So is tobacco.
Farmers assert they are forced to sell at prices lower than the cost of production, that they cannot obtain credit properly to finance their operations, that food products are lower proportionately than manufactured articles and other raw materials, and that middlemen and speculators profit at their expense.
Agriculture will be ruined unless there is relief, the farmers assert, and in this they have the backing of many influential members of congress.
Farmers assert they are willing for the laws of supply and demand to operate. But they argue that restrictions and manipulations enrich others at their expense.

Mrs. Hamilton, talented little Frenchwoman, whom Hamilton rescued from peril in the war zone, manipulated the lights that flash the 100 slides upon the screen. Major Hamilton has delivered the lecture in the principal cities of the world. It is an intimate glimpse into Tibet, the land beyond the Himalaya mountains from India, an insight into the life, character and religious fanaticism of the people.

\$65,000 of Stock in Vegetable Oil Mills To Be Subscribed

Only \$65,000 worth of stock in the Portland Vegetable Oil Mills company remains unsubscribed, according to announcement made this morning by H. H. Ward, one of the directors of the company. The concern is capitalized at \$1,000,000 and proposes to erect a plant costing approximately \$400,000 at Linton for the manufacture of oil and various by products from coars.
Ward also announced that Allen R. Jobs, formerly president of the Jobs Milling company, has acquired a substantial interest in the company and will be associated with C. A. Fainton, president, in the management. Jobs will act as sales manager.

City Employees Will Be Paid for Time Lost While Sick

Nine employees in the waterworks department, 10 employees in the department of public works, three employees of the auditor's office and one employee of the bureau of parks will be paid sums ranging from \$25 to \$319, representing their respective salaries for the days lost from work due to illness, payment of which had heretofore been denied them.
An ordinance prepared by the sick committee authorizing the payment of these salaries, which has been held up for several months, was brought up for a final hearing by Commissioner Barbur of the committee Wednesday morning, and passed by a four-fifths vote, Bigelow voting against the bill, after a very heated discussion in the council chamber.

Four coaches were derailed and the track torn up for a distance of 50 feet. All passengers escaped injury. The engineer received slight injuries.

FORD OR ARMOUR? \$6 OR \$4.26 AS THE AVERAGE DAY PAY

Chicago, Nov. 24.—Whether Henry Ford's attitude toward labor today is more economically sound than J. Ogden Armour's—or the Chicago packers'—became a vigorously debated question late Tuesday at a wage-hearing before Federal Judge Samuel Aischuler. Two hundred thousand packing house employees are asking \$1 a day rise.

UNEMPLOYED GIRLS FLEECE, 'S CLAIM

A warrant for the arrest of Mrs. Florence Ridings, who operates an employment bureau in the Northwestern Bank building, on the charge of obtaining money under false pretenses, has been issued by District Attorney Walter Evans. Mrs. Ridings has gone south for her health, according to her daughter, having left several days ago, about the time the warrant was issued.

Complaints have long been received by the women's protective division, the Underwood Typewriter company, the better business bureau of the Portland Ad club, the Y. M. C. A. employment bureau and other agencies, from girls who claimed Mrs. Ridings charged them 10 per cent of a first month's salary before sending them to a place, that she sent them to places where no stenographers were wanted, of places she knew they were not qualified to fill, that she sent sometimes as many as 50 girls to a single place, taking from each a 10 per cent fee, that when the girls returned she did not refund their money, but "stalled them off," sending them to other places where no employment was to be had, being inaccessible to the girls when they came to see her, and finally giving them checks upon banks in which she had no account.

District Attorney Evans' complaint is based upon the charges made by four girls.

Committee Picks Albina Ave. Auto Camp Ground Site

A tract of 18 acres on Albina avenue, between Ainsworth avenue and Portland boulevard, was recommended as the site for a municipal tourist auto camp at a meeting of a committee representing the Chamber of Commerce, Portland Realty board and various civic clubs, in the office of the Realty board Tuesday night. The recommendation was submitted to Commissioner Pier this morning.

The site chosen was offered by the Ukase Investment company. The tract lies opposite Peninsula park and has a frontage of 1180 feet on Albina avenue. The ground is level and is wooded with second growth fir, vine maple and dogwood.

Brockway Returns From Scout Council Meeting at Spokane

James E. Brockway, Boy Scout executive, has returned from Spokane, where he attended a meeting of the Northwest members of the national council of Boy Scouts held in Spokane Saturday. There were present 27 representatives from Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana.

Dr. George J. Fisher of New York, assistant national Scout executive, who was the principal speaker, said in one of his addresses:
"The Scout organization is the only organization that has received the indorsement of the Jewish church, the Catholics and the Protestants. The Scout is asked to honor God, his country and to do a good turn daily."

A district committee of councilmen was organized, the object being to promote Scouting from the layman's standpoint. The Oregon members are C. C. Colt of Portland and Frederick Schmidt of Salem.

RUSSIA ASKS FOR 5000 ENGINEERS, SAYS VANDERLIP

London, Nov. 24.—Russian women have the most wonderful complexions in the world and the children are the picture of health, according to Washington D. Vanderlip, who has just returned from a trade trip to Russia, bringing back immense orders.

In discussion of his personal impressions of Moscow and Petrograd and their environs, Vanderlip declared Russia is bringing up the healthiest generations of girls and boys in the world. They are well fed, he says, and educated as well as is possible under existing conditions.

"Lenin gave me an order for 30,000,000 school books for immediate delivery," he said.

"Lenin has decreed that within the next five years all persons under 60 years of age must be able to read and write."

GOOD FOR FAT PERSONS
"The maintenance of an army of 4,000,000 well disciplined troops is an immense drain upon resources, but is cheerfully borne by the people, who are intensely patriotic. The army gets the first of everything and the hospitals and children have second call upon the food. After them come the civilians. I was listed for cabbage soup and black bread. I lost 20 pounds, but I feel better. Russia is a great sanitarium for fat people. The only trouble with the food is its sameness, but the people are healthy."

\$250,000 Worth of Champagne in Port

San Francisco, Nov. 24.—(I. N. S.)—The most valuable "treasure" cargo to arrive at this port since January 1, 1920, came in today on the French steamer Mount Berwyn from Marseilles. It consisted of \$250,000 worth of champagne, Vermouth, Cognac and Creme de Menthe. Sad to relate, it stopped here only for transshipment to far away Papeete in the South Seas.

POLICEMEN SCARCE

Moscow, he says, is orderly, but there is scarcely a policeman, and the city has doubled in population. The shops are reopening and the streets are crowded.

"I cannot say that the people are the happiest, but they are content to make their sacrifices in order to attain their own government," he continued. "They want the friendship of the outside world, especially of America."

"The government asks America to send 5000 engineers to Russia as soon as trade is reopened to rejuvenate the industries of the country. Russia's engineers have almost all been killed off by the war."

According to Vanderlip, the Russian peasant is happy. He has an allotment of land and pays for it with products with the exception of a small tax to the state.

"Lenin has freed Russia's millions," he said, "and is building up a new nation. England gave Lincoln, whom she cordially hated in Civil war time, a statue in the shadow of Westminster, and the same thing will happen in the case of Lenin 50 years from now."

Seattle Car Fares May Go Higher

Seattle, Nov. 24.—(I. N. S.)—With a deficit of \$11,372 a month under the present \$14 cent fare, Seattle's municipal street carfares are likely to be raised to three rides for a quarter, it was announced by Councilman R. H. Thomson today. The straight fare is 10 cents.
