Canada Elsewhere, the pressure is high, the highest readings being in Nebraska. Precipitation has occurred on the north Pacific coast, in Northwestern Montana and in the North Atlantic states, having been heaviest at Boston. Over the greater part of the country the weather is colder, the change having been greatest in Southern Montana. The temperature is generally above normal in the Northern states and below normal in the South.
Relative humidity at Portland: Noon yesterday, 58 per cent; 2 p. m., yesterday, 65 per cent; 5 a. m., today, 100 per cent.
Precipitation since January 1: Total, 32.19 inches; normal, 36.40 inches; deficiency, 4.21 inches.

Miss Cronquist was graduated from Lincoln high school and she has taken a leading part in Reed social circles since entering in September. The election of freshmen councilors completes the student legislative body at Reed, which consists of four seniors and two members from each of the lower classes.
