

CHAMBERLAIN FOR EARLY PEACE AND WORLD STABILITY

Senator Urges Democrats in Congress to Support Republicans and Refrain From Filibuster.

Atlantic City, N. J., Nov. 27.—United States Senator George E. Chamberlain of Oregon is resting here and takes his defeat in the recent election with grim stoicism. He urges Democrats in congress and out of it to support the Republican party in its policy to bring about an early peace and world stability and warns his Democratic colleagues to refrain from even an attempt at filibuster.

"The remarkable vote for Harding and Coolidge," said the senator, "seems to me to be not altogether an expression of confidence in them as individuals nor in the Republican party; it is not so much a personal or party victory as it is a protest against one man government, against a practical autocracy, as contrasted with a government of the people by the people and for the people as decided by the fathers of the republic and as voiced by Lincoln."

GIVES VIEWS ON VOTES

"Notwithstanding the solemn referendum asked for by the president, I am of the opinion that the league had little to do with the result. If the vote is analyzed it will be found that the Republican ticket received the votes of men and women of every conceivable shade of opinion on the league. Democrats as well as Republicans."

"The people wanted a change, and were willing to trust to the future and to the Republican party to solve the problems growing out of our international situation and the war."

"With this political upheaval, what is the duty of Democrats in congress and in the country?"

"In my opinion, the first step towards industrial and commercial stabilization, national as well as international, is the entrance by the United States into some sort of league or covenant of association, it matters not what it may be called, with the powers that have already joined or may hereafter join the league, and upon terms that are satisfactory to all."

"Why waste time?"

"Why waste time talking about the league when it has been demonstrated that the great powers will be satisfied to have the United States associated with them upon other terms than the league as it came over from Versailles?"

Senator Chamberlain said that in view of the crisis that confronts the American people with deflation, falling prices and industrial stagnation all imminent, the first duty of Democrats in congress is to help the Republicans to secure real peace.

Referring to the suggestion of an international association and other phases of the Republican peace program, he said: "If President Wilson is unwilling to aid in such a program let it be up to him and fix the responsibility for a world disturbance where it really belongs. Another duty of Democrats, he said, is to get down to business and eschew all attempts at filibuster."

"Business must get back where it should be," he said. "The world must be stabilized. Then," he said, "let congress meet, get through and adjourn."

G. O. P. WILL MAP LEGISLATIVE PLAN

Entire Program to Be Arranged Within Next Few Weeks, Senate Leaders Declare.

Washington, Nov. 27.—(U. P.)—Determined to give the people an administration of governmental efficiency, Republican leaders in congress plan to map out within the next few weeks the entire legislative program which they hope to enact after President-elect Harding's inauguration, March 4, it was announced today.

Following a conference today between Senator Lodge, Republican leader of the senate, and Senator Penrose, finance committee chairman, at Philadelphia, there will be a series of meetings of Republican leaders here which are expected to result in formulation of this program.

The general plan as tentatively worked out is:

1—Limit the short session beginning December 6 to appropriation measures.

2—Put all the major committees to work during the short session on the big problems the Republicans expect to solve when they take control.

3—Present bills covering these problems in rapid-fire order after the special session gets under way.

Harding will be conferred with and congressional leaders said every effort will be made to have the executive and legislative branches of the government cooperate to the fullest extent in working out changes as are deemed needed.

Among the problems on which committees will be put to work during the short session are these:

Tariff and tax revision; Immigration; high cost of living; reorganization of government departments; agricultural questions, and labor and railroads.

Congressional leaders said it would be impossible to make absolutely definite plans until they know more about Harding's plans with respect to peace and the proposed association of nations.

Many law makers favor immediate action on domestic questions, letting the association wait until home problems have been solved.

Referring to the suggestion of an international association and other phases of the Republican peace program, he said: "If President Wilson is unwilling to aid in such a program let it be up to him and fix the responsibility for a world disturbance where it really belongs. HARDING ONE OF EMPLOYER CLOQUE GOMPERS CLAIMS

Association at Marion Similar to Those That Would Halt Collective Bargaining, He Says.

Washington, Nov. 27.—(U. P.)—President-elect Harding is a member of a Marion, Ohio, Employers' association, similar to those working to destroy collective bargaining and bring about autocratic control of industry, Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, charged in an editorial in the issue of the Federationist, official publication of organized labor, made public today.

These employers' associations, which have been waiting years to set up an industrial oligarchy, according to Gompers, found the encouragement in the election results in general. Therefore, Gompers argued, fears may be expressed properly whether these employers will receive "official encouragement."

"MISTAKEN, SAYS GOMPERS"

"But if reaction considers the election as a mandate to destroy human freedom, it is mistaken and will discover its mistake," Gompers warns.

Gompers called attention to post-election editorials published by a well known daily financial newspaper of New York and by other newspapers. The financial newspaper's editorial, as quoted by Gompers, called for amendments to the Clayton act exempting the American Federation of Labor and unions generally from operation of the anti-trust law.

An editorial in the Hearst newspapers called for extension of the territory of the United States straight south to the Panama canal, Gompers said. These editorials and the issuance of several injunctions against strikers, he said, by Gompers as indicative of "what it may be assumed is the plan and the scheme of reaction."

GOMPERS WARNS REACTION

"However," Gompers warned, "it is one thing to plan and another to execute. The dream of a great oligarchy of employers long has been in the minds of those who now speak exultingly. They have long waited for a day in which the workers would be helpless and without organization of their own. Despite this hope, the workers have constantly increased their strength, constantly enlarged their organizations, constantly advanced the concepts of democracy in industry."

"This is not the hour for turning backward. This is not the hour for autocratic triumph. This is not the hour of destruction of progress, nor will that hour ever come."

"The political victory for reaction was not a mandate for destruction. The American people have not debauched their ideals nor destroyed their honor."

Police Surround Tree and "Peeping Tom" Is Captured

Peter Kavoc, a 17-year-old youth living at 555 Broadway, in passing the Martha Washington hotel, an exclusive Catholic young women's home at Thirteenth and Madison streets, about 10 o'clock Saturday night, observed that one of the occupants had neglected to draw the curtains of her room. Kavoc climbed a tree near the partly curtained window and comfortably lodged on a limb continued his observations until the light was turned out.

Observing another window on the fourth floor, Kavoc climbed higher to a level of the view, but was discovered by the young woman in the room. Calmly proceeding, that she would not apprise the peeper of his detection, the young woman got the police station on the telephone and had two policemen under the tree before the overly curious one realized he had been caught.

On command of the policemen to come down from his perch young Kavoc speeded to the top of the tree, from which he leaped to the roof of the hotel, where later he was captured, taken to the police station and locked up on a charge of disorderly conduct.

Blackis was released on \$250 cash bail to appear in court Monday morning.

Nickolas Liscon was spotted at Eleventh and Everett by Patrolman Turley late last night acting in a suspicious manner. When accosted by the policeman Liscon hastily took a pint bottle of what they believe was alcoholic stimulant from his pocket and dashed the bottle to pieces on the pavement. Thwarted in securing bootlegging evidence against Liscon, Patrolman Turley booked him on the charge of throwing glass on a public street, a violation of the traffic ordinance, and in lieu of bail he will remain in the city bastille over Sunday.

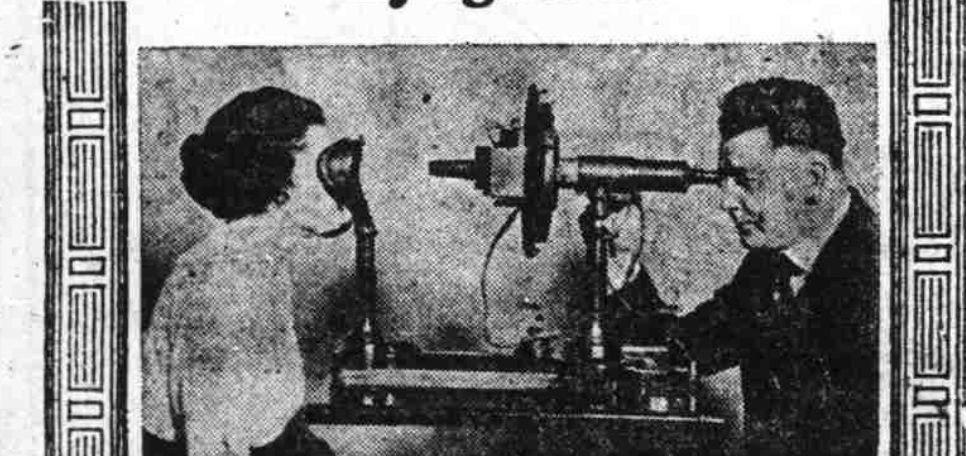
