On the bottom of the charts are a few rules for the prevention of accidents, such as looking both ways when crossing the street, refraining from stealing rides on the rear ends of wagons and automobiles, being careful with fire and avoiding the handling of dangerous weapons.

Beast With Bill Is Described to Couch Children

MENTION of the platypus, a curious little animal of Australia, in one of the letters received by Couch school children, by their Australian school friends, has brought forth a description of it by E. E. Brackney of Portland, who formerly resided in Australia. "The Ornithorhynchus Paradoxus, or, as commonly called, duckbill platypus," says Brackney, "is a link between the reptilian and bird family of animals, partaking of the characteristics of reptiles, birds and quadrupeds. "When full grown the platypus is two feet long and weighs several pounds. Its skin is covered with fine hair. A single skin is said to have sold for as much as 500 guineas, equal to about \$2825, normal exchange rates. When about 12 months old, the female lays two parchment-like shelled eggs, which she keeps warm with her body until they are hatched. During this time and the nursing period, the male nourishes his mate by furnishing her with food carried in little pockets which are located on the inside of his jaws. The duckbills eat shrimps, small sea fishes and other marine animals. "When first hatched the young look like stumpy little lizards with the bill of a duck. This is red at first, but gradually changes color until it becomes very black. At first the young have little pointed teeth, but after awhile these are replaced by saws extending around the margin of each jaw. "The platypus has a bill as long and wide as the head. The bill is more like that of the beaver than anything else. His fore legs are little fins or flappers similar to those of the seal. The hind ones are real legs, much like those of the opossum. "When the duckbill wants to make himself a home, he finds a high, dry bank along the river. Then he starts to burrow into the mud and slimes at the bottom of the stream until he reaches a point directly below the dry point, when he changes his course and gradually ascends the level of the tunnel until it is above the surface of the water. He then continues to burrow forward into the solid earth until a safe distance is reached away from the water, when he widens the tunnel out to suit his purpose, thus making a secure place for himself and future family. He approaches his den from the water and his habits are chiefly nocturnal. "The duckbill is almost extinct, only a few being found along the rivers in northern and eastern Queensland. They are shy and comparatively defenseless against their many enemies."
