

# FARMERS WILL PRESS CONGRESS FOR QUICK RELIEF

## Short Session, Which Opens Tomorrow, Also Faces Demands for Readjustment in Business.

Washington, Dec. 4.—Facing a legislative program that promises to keep it bustling until its life expires by constitutional limitation next March, the sixty-sixth congress will enter on its third and final session Monday.

Although the house Republican steering committee today decided to try to rush through the repeal of war legislation and a year's suspension of immigration, the general plan of leaders in both branches is to limit the session's activities to the necessary routine if possible. They face, however, demands for other legislation, which they admitted today they will have trouble denying.

### FARMERS MAKE DEMANDS

The farmers demand relief from present low prices and lack of markets, threatening in a thinly veiled fashion to put a third party in the field two or four years hence, if their demands are not granted.

Business demands readjustment of taxation and restoration of normal business conditions and of export trade.

Republican leaders intend to appease demands so far as possible by promises of speedy action after the new president and congress take office in March. It will be impossible, they predict today, to deal intelligently with these problems in the short session and at the same time give the necessary attention reducing government appropriations as they intend to.

### HARDING MAY TAKE SEAT

Estimates of more than \$4,000,000,000 are before congress for the expenses of government for the next fiscal year for ordinary purposes and these will be supplemented with large special demands. Republican leaders plan to slash nearly \$1,000,000,000 from the estimates if possible.

The probable appearance in his place in the senate of Senator Harding, president-elect, and the possibility that President Wilson may deliver his message in person on Tuesday were the only promises of dramatic events at the opening. Both houses will be called to order at noon. The two houses will exchange courtesies and will appoint a joint committee to notify the president that congress is in session. This probably will be the extent of the first day's business.

## Japanese Is Shot in Mysterious Attack By Two Strangers

S. Yamada, cook on the schooner *Maroon*, now in harbor, was accosted by two unidentified men at Japanese barber shop, 3 North Second street, at 7:45 Saturday night, one of them drawing a revolver and shooting him through the left arm above the elbow, the bullet entering the abdominal wall.

Yamada, whose English is rather confusing, informed the police that he had just emerged from the Japanese barber shop and had "beated himself on the sidewalk to cool off after a bath when accosted by the men who were unknown to him, but looked like Mexicans, he believed. He was ordered to "get inside," but before he could comply with the command one drew a gun and fired twice, only one bullet having effect. As the wounded man fell to the sidewalk the assailants fled.

Yamada was taken to St. Vincent's hospital where an examination disclosed his wounds to be of a serious nature. The police are working on the theory that Yamada was the victim of a case of mistaken identity.

## Woman Struck Down By Passing Motorist

Passing a streetcar on the left side, Earl Olson, 852 Woodworth avenue, struck and knocked down Mrs. H. F. Capell, 85 East Seventy-fifth street, Friday night at Twenty-sixth street and Regent drive. Olson told the police he had to pass to the left of the car because there was no room on the right. He said that he did not see Mrs. Capell, who was waiting for the streetcar, because an arc light temporarily blinded him. Mrs. Capell was taken to St. Vincent's hospital, where it is reported she has a bad scalp wound and bruises. Olson was not arrested.

## Chicago-New York Air Record Broken

Washington, Dec. 4.—All records for flying between Chicago and New York were broken today by the air mail service. J. T. Cristensen, leaving Chicago at 4:35 a. m. flew to Cleveland, 319 miles, at the rate of 117 miles an hour, and W. L. Smith flew from Cleveland to New York at the rate of 151 miles an hour, arriving there at 1:25 p. m.

Washington, Dec. 4.—As the chimes in the library of congress tomorrow start tolling off the longest piece in their repertoire—12 o'clock—Vice President Marshall, throwing away a half finished 5 cent cigar, will mount the rostrum of the senate and, peering down over his glasses, intone "The senate will be in order."

### AT THE SAME HOUR

The chimes performing as aforesaid, Speaker Gillette will mount the rostrum of the house, clear his throat and, tapping the marble with his gavel, enunciate, "The house will be in order."

And by both those signs and tokens the final and shortest session of the Sixty-sixth congress of the United States, one of the stormiest congresses in the country's history, will go sliding down the launching ways to wind up with a splash on March 4, 1921.

### ROLL CALL NEXT

After the vice president and the speaker and the chaplains have done their jobs, the sharp-voiced reading clerk of the senate will bawl for "Mr. Ashurst." The plaintive voiced reading clerk of the house will chant "Mr. Ackerman-an!" and the roll calls will be on. It's only in the senate that they "muster" the members when counting noses.

A goodly number of senators and representatives have already landed here, to find their house and apartment rent jumped on them, and their mail resembling the Republican tidal wave of the second instant. Both senate and house are straggling, almost limping back to duty.

SWALLOWTAILS THERE  
The flowing swallowtails affected by some Southern members would have a hard time of it in narrow corridors of congress these days, keeping out of fresh paint. And Senator Calder, who hails from Brooklyn, N. Y., would need the overshoes for which Brooklyn males are famous in order to reach his office, the way the colored boys are wetting down and mopping up the corridors with a fire and frenzied zeal.
