AMERICAN LEGION

Auxiliary Dance To Be Given for Benefit of Sick

IN ORDER to bring Christmas cheer and obtain funds to provide comforts for the veterans of the world war now in the hospitals in and around the city of Portland, the Women's Auxiliary will give its last dance before Christmas at the Hotel Multnomah next Friday evening. A large crowd is expected, as the entertainment committee of the auxiliary has spared no pains in making the evening an enjoyable and elaborate event. The public is cordially invited to attend, and the legionnaires in Portland should be out in full force and attend the dance. Mrs. Paul Bartholmy is chairman of the committee, and she will be assisted by the younger set of the auxiliary.

Edward J. Elvers, department adjutant; Harry N. Nelson, assistant department adjutant, and Frank J. Elvers, service officer for the Legion in Oregon, organized a post of the American Legion at Banks Wednesday, December 1. The party proceeded to Banks in company with Zenas A. Olson, adjutant of the Hillsboro post, who also addressed the Banks veterans. This will make the eighty-ninth post in this department.

The state office has received a supply of the pamphlets issued by the French government "for homeward bound Americans," and legionnaires outside of the city of Portland can obtain same by sending in their names and addresses with 2 cent stamp to cover postage. Those residing in Portland can obtain the pamphlets either from the recruiting station or the Portland post of the Legion, at Sixth and Pine streets, where its offices and club rooms are located.

Hillsboro post contemplates opening its new club rooms during the Christmas holidays with a smoker, dance and banquet, and has arranged for the officials from Portland to be present and give talks on the Legion.

Alton B. Coates, newly elected commander of the Alfred E. Babcock post of Albany, was a recent visitor at the state office and conferred with the department adjutant regarding the future activities of the Albany post.

Bulletin has been forwarded to the posts from the state office regarding the

convention of the Women's Auxiliary, to be held in Portland during the early part of March or April of next year, at which there are expected to be in the neighborhood of 150 women relatives of legionnaires from all sections of Oregon. Auxiliary units will be organized in each county in the state before the convention will be called. There are 23 auxiliary units in Oregon at the present time. The national convention of the Women's Auxiliary, the time and place to be selected by the national executive committee of the American Legion, is expected to be held just before the summer months of next year.

Outline of hospital program and forms for use of posts in getting data and information regarding the war veterans patients in hospitals in Oregon have been forwarded to the posts where hospitals are located and to the hospitalization committee of the Oregon department of the Legion located in various sections of the state.

At the recent meeting of the Springfield post, at Springfield, two important actions were taken, namely, the organization of a committee to care for the poor and sick of the community, and the purchasing of 11 instruments for the band. The band expects to have a membership of 20 under the leadership of Albert Perfect.

A three-act play, "A Turkish Maiden," will be staged by the Sunset post, at North Bend, some time during the Christmas holidays, and the Legion post will be assisted by members of the dramatic bureau of the American Legion.

The Rainier post, with headquarters at Rainier, Or., held an enjoyable and very successful dance at the city hall, November 27, with a record-breaking crowd in attendance.

Portland Post No. 1. A new constitution drawn up by a special committee will be presented to the members of the post and voted on at the next regular meeting, December 6. If the new constitution is adopted officers for the coming year will be nominated at this meeting but will not be elected until the January meeting. The constitution now used by Post No. 1 provides for the election of officers at the December meeting.

November was a profitable month financially for the post. One hundred and twenty-five veterans were admitted, who will be sworn in at the next meeting, making November the record month of the year.

The profits of the post from the lunch counter after its first month of operation were \$200. This lunch counter, located at the club rooms at headquarters, is reputed to be one of the neatest in

Portland. City Sanitary Inspector James Nya, who conducted a thorough examination of the lunch room and kitchen Thursday, pronounced it one of the best that he has seen.

C. V. Dredley, manager of the Dredley Airplane company, last week donated \$15.50 to Post No. 1, thus dividing a prize won by one of his machines in the stunt race on Armistice day. The other half of the prize went to the pilot of the machine.

Adjutant General George White, a member of Portland post, is writing a series of articles for The American Legion Weekly under the caption "Cradle Days in the Legion." White was one of the organizers of the legion in Paris at the close of the war.
