

MEREDITH FIGHTS M'NARY'S BILL TO ENLARGE PARK

Washington, Dec. 6.—(WASH.-INGTON BUREAU OF THE JOURNAL)—Secretary E. T. Meredith of the department of agriculture, in a supplemental report which he has forwarded to Chairman Sennott of the public lands committee of the house, renews his recommendation against passage of Senator McNary's bill for enlargement of Crater lake national park, but suggests an administrative arrangement may be made whereby the shore line of Diamond lake and other areas in the nearby national forest may be reserved for exclusive use of the national park service or its concessionaires under a long term permit.

RECREATIONAL VALUE

Secretary Meredith, whose department includes the forest service, says he is opposed to inclusion of forest lands in the park unless the area is of size and character suitable for administration. His department and the interior department are agreed that the proposed addition to Crater Lake park does not possess such features, he says, but that it does possess recreational features of high value which would increase the attractiveness of the park.

ACTION TERMED UNWISE

For this reason he thinks it unwise to include the lake within the boundaries of the park, suggesting as an alternative that recreational facilities for the benefit of park tourists around the lake be arranged by a cooperative agreement between the forest service and the national park service.

Meredith also says that the need of adding a strip one mile wide and over 27 miles long on the west side of the park for road purposes has been obviated by the construction of a new road to the west entrance, which will be made a first class highway.

REASONS GIVEN FOR

Washington, Nov. 20.—(WASHINGTON BUREAU OF THE JOURNAL)—Failure of the Southern Pacific company to exert itself to borrow on its own account, and lack of proof that it is unable to obtain the money for itself, were assigned by the interstate commerce commission as the reason for denying the railroad's application for a loan of \$5,028,000 under the transportation act.

The Southern Pacific application showed that it wanted \$1,400,000 for motive power and \$3,588,000 for cars, trolleys as follows:

Twenty-five freight locomotives, \$1-

\$85,500; two electric locomotives, \$85,000; 24 switch locomotives, \$396,800; total cost of \$2,880,000, half to be financed by the company.

Two thousand box cars, \$5,400,000; 1000 flat cars, \$2,400,000; 1000 stock cars, \$2,400,000; 500 automobile cars, \$1,655,000; 250 ballast cars, \$920,500; 65 caboose cars, \$227,100; a total of \$17,222,600, of which \$12,204,600 was proposed to furnish \$12,204,600 and asked \$3,588,000 from the government fund.
