WEATHEE CONDITIONS High pressure prevails in the Atlantic states and on the Middle and South Pacific slope. The remainder of the country is covered by twp great invertigeness areas, one central in the upper Massissippi valley and the other apparently cen-tral in northern Alberta. Precipitation has oc-curred on the north Pacific slope. In Nebrata and South Dakota, and in the lower Mislissippi valley and west Gulf states. The heaviest min-fall reported was 1.90 inches at New Orleans, Louisiana. The temperature is below notenal in the Southwest and in Northern Alberta, and is above normal over the remainder of the country. In the Mississippi Valley and Upper Lake, region the crease in temperature ranges from 20 degrees to more than 30 degrees. 


