

JUDGES COMPLETE THEIR TASK AT POULTRY SHOW

With the awards all placed the poultry show at The Auditorium took on several new colors today. The coops are now decorated with many colored ribbons, which seem to have had an effect upon the birds, for it now seems that the blue ribbon fowls crow or cackle the loudest. Clams are so large that many birds failed to get into the winning class, and their voices have a plaintive note. But the show is better than ever and from now on there will be no judges blocking the aisles.

The poultry show will be open tonight and Thursday and Friday evenings as long as the crowd wishes to stay. This will give many an opportunity to inspect Oregon's best who cannot get away from business in the daytime.

DECORATING BOOTHS
According to the judges the plan upon which the coops are placed for the convenience of the viewing public is the best they have ever seen. A prize is up for the best decorated coop and booth and this competition has brought out some very neat displays by firms exhibiting poultry supplies and feeds. The green bunting that incased the pillars and portions of the ceiling, along with the white walls of the basement, serves as a fitting setting for the wonderful birds on display.

In the opinion of Judge W. M. Coats this show equals the Madison Square show in New York city. The birds that are on display here have all been at one or more shows this fall and this is the "round-up" of the best in the country.

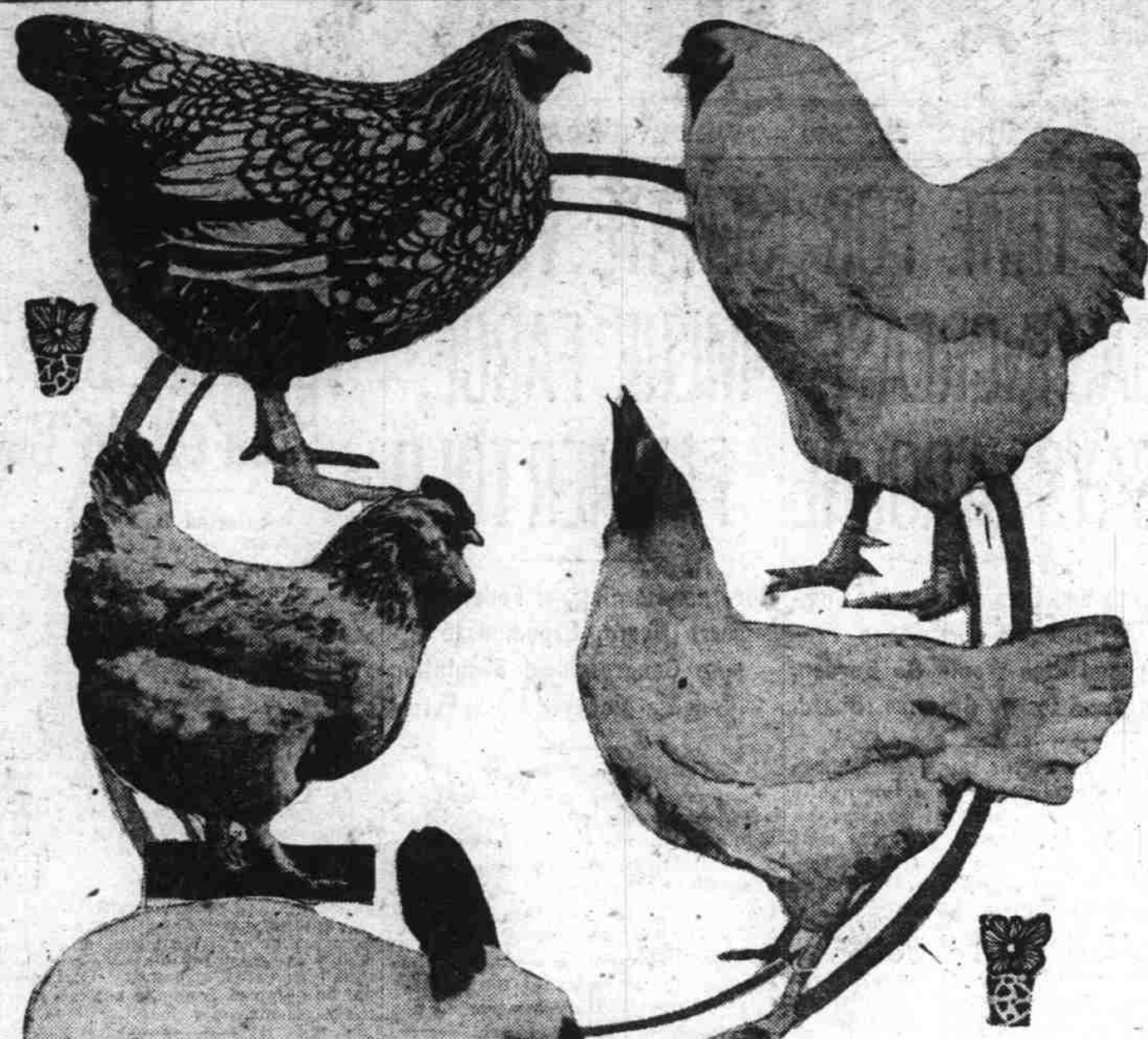

FEAR GREATER DISASTER

The fact that Senator Carter Glass of Virginia, a Democrat and former secretary of the treasury, as well as Senator George McLean, Republican, chairman of the senate committee on banking and currency, vigorously opposed the action of the senate, is proof of the non-partisan character of the opposition to the Gronna-Norris proposal. Officials fear that for a day or two the market might hold up if relief is promised by congress, but that when those who are holding their goods finally find out that they cannot expect financial aid, the bottom will drop still further and the revulsion of feeling will be even greater against those who raised false hopes.

As for the secretary of the treasury and the war finance corporation, the direction of congress that it be revived would be heeded if the resolution passes both houses. There is of course, a chance that a presidential veto may be interposed, as Houston's word with President Wilson is very potent.

However, even if the resolution should become law, the chance for relief still is dependent upon the personnel of the war finance corporation, the members of which are selected by the president. There are four members of the board besides the secretary of the treasury, and at present there are two vacancies. Supposing Wilson appointed two Democrats, would the senate confirm them for four-year terms, or would the senate feel that Warren Harding ought to have the chance to name these new members? Delay would, of course, nullify the purpose of the resolution, as it seems to be the universal opinion in executive quarters that the present emergency will come to an end after New Year.

Moreover, the regulations of the war finance corporation are made by the corporation itself. It can demand all sorts of security and practically decline to extend aid except as it pleases. Furthermore, the secretary of the treasury would be obliged to go into the open market and borrow money to give to the war finance corporation.

It is being whispered about the capitol that some of the men who voted for the resolution didn't expect anything to come of their action, but feared to antagonize the farmers back home.

ARMY BALLOONISTS ARE BELIEVED LOST

Rockaway Point, N. Y., Dec. 15.—(U. P.)—Somewhere among the wind-swept Adirondacks today there is a clumsy naval balloon with three navy officers isolated from civilization.

The huge aircraft, swept northward by the howling gales, is lost, officials at the navy air station here believe, either among the snow-clad hills in northern New York or along the Canadian border.

Reports that the balloon had fallen into Saranac lake, with its crew of three aboard, or had been dashed against the side of Fort Mountain by the high winds, were discredited by naval officials, who expressed great confidence in the ability of Lieutenant Walter Hinton, hero of the N. C. 4 trans-Atlantic flight, who was in command of the big gas bag.

HARDING ADAMANT
Some inkling of the seriousness with which members of the federal reserve board regarded the invasion of their prerogatives reached the senate Monday afternoon of an opinion.

Harding has indicated in his testimony before congress exactly how he views the proposal to extend further credits to the agricultural interests and the action of
