WEATHER CONDITIONS

The pressure is moderately low in Alaska and an important depression is apparently central north of the lake region. The western states are covered by a great high pressure area, the center of which is in Southern Idaho. Precipitation has occurred in the North Atlantic states and in Iowa and Western British Columbia. High winds prevail in the lake region and upper Mississippi valley, the highest velocity reported having been 48 miles an hour from the southwest at Buffalo, N. Y. Colder weather prevails over most of the country, the greatest change having been in Western Montana, but the temperature is still above normal over a large part of the country east of the Rockies.
Relative humidity at Portland: Noon yesterday, 88 per cent; 5 p. m. yesterday, 60 per cent; 5 a. m. today, 48 per cent.
Precipitation since January 1: Total, 36.58 inches; normal, 41.51 inches; deficiency, 4.93 inches.

Rate Rise Opposed—Protest against the proposed increase in telephone and gas rates is made in a resolution passed by the Montville Board of Trade and sent to the state public service commission. "On behalf of the people of this district we do protest said rise in rates because we believe the rates now in force are sufficient to make a paying investment for their stockholders, and for the further reason that the tendency on all commodities as well as labor, is downward," the resolution reads in part. The signatures of A. N. Searle, president, and William Thomas, secretary, are attached.

Chautauque Entertainers Dine—More than 60 members of the Ellison-White Chautauque organization met at the Benson hotel Tuesday night at a dinner in honor of a group of 40 entertainers who will spend the 1921 season on the New Zealand circuit. C. H. White, president of the Chautauque system, with his family, accompanied the members of the New Zealand party when they left for Vancouver, B. C., this morning, and will sail with them from that port Friday afternoon. The Ellison-White system has maintained a circuit in New Zealand during the last three seasons.

Wine Maker Held—Victor Botanie "thought" the law allowed each person 200 gallons of wine, provided he made it himself and did not sell it, according to the story told United States Commissioner Fraser, so Tuesday he was held to answer to the federal grand jury on a charge of violating the prohibition law. Botanie, who lives on a farm near Hilledale, was fined several months ago on a similar charge. According to his way of reasoning the law had changed between that date and now.

Porter Taken for Highway Robbery—Earl Allen, wanted at Pendleton on a charge of highway robbery, was arrested by Deputy Sheriff Christofferson and Schirmer Tuesday afternoon in the railroad yards at the union station. He is a negro porter. Three others alleged to have been connected with the same robbery in which Allen is said to be implicated have been arrested at Pendleton.
