

LOGGING CAMPS IN OREGON SANITARY, SESSION DISCLOSES

Logging camp sanitation was the principal theme of discussion at the opening session of the annual meeting of Oregon health officers at the Portland hotel this morning. T. Tharaldsen, physical director of the Loyal Legion of Loggers and Lumbermen, told of sanitation improvement along the lines of feeding, housing, personal cleanliness and disposal of waste in logging camps.

"The regulations of the Oregon board of health governing housing conditions in logging camps are the most modern of any state in the union," declared Tharaldsen, who also stated that within the last two years hundreds of shower baths have been installed in camps, which the men have been ready and eager to make use of.

IMPROVEMENTS NOTED

Recollections were stirred up among many of those present of past experiences in camps, while Tharaldsen related the practical impossibility of substituting steam heat for stoves, since the men felt they had to have a stove as a target for spitting and would not use campfires.

Tharaldsen told of camp improvements in the way of screening, sewerage, food containers, abolition of the roller towel and the substitution of drinking fountains for the common drinking cup.

W. B. Morse, ex-president of the board of health, gave the opening address, urging harmony and cooperation among the doctors and between the doctors and the public, simplification of methods and more uniform quarantine measures.

He read a message from Governor Olcott, now in the East, who was invited to attend the meeting, commending them upon their endeavors.

"To give us cleaner cities, better living conditions, to surround us with necessary sanitation and all those things which tend toward making happier, better and cleaner lives is a work worth while," said the governor.

THEMES ARE DISCUSSED

At the afternoon session, J. W. Hyde, county health officer of Washington county, spoke on "The Value and Force of Quarantine." John B. Anderson, commissioner of health of Washington, talked on "Intestate Cooperation in Preventing Spread of Communicable Diseases." Robert L. Benson of the University of Oregon, medical school, talked on "Epidemiology of Meningitis." N. E. Wayson of the United States public health service spoke on "Public Health Methods," and H. M. Grant, executive secretary of the Oregon Social Hygiene society, discussed "Education in Relation to Public Health."

Teacher, Former Student at O. A. C., Dies in The Dalles

The Dalles, Dec. 17.—Miss Erma Beals, assistant in the department of household arts of the faculty of The Dalles high school, died Thursday night at her home here as the result of a three weeks' illness from diphtheria.

Miss Beals was obliged to leave her work December 3, suffering supposedly from a throat infection. This week it developed into diphtheria and she was unable to withstand the shock of the powerful antitoxins administered. Her mother was with her at her bedside.

Miss Beals was 24 years old. She graduated from Oregon Agricultural college last June. The body is being sent to Corvallis, her home, for burial.

PLEA IN STEAM RATE CASE NEXT

The high cost of steam heating is the next problem to be taken up by the public service commission for Portland citizens after finishing with the gas and telephone hearings. The Northwestern Electric company's petition for increased rates for steam heat, filed with the public service commission at Salem last June, will be heard here by the commission December 29, according to notice sent the city council Thursday afternoon.

The Northwestern Electric company says the added cost of operation during the year closing and the prospective cost of operation for the new year justifies the claim for increased rates for serving steam to Portland buildings.

General Manager Merwin of the Northwestern Electric company said his company would likely suggest a specific rate, but would go before the commission with a request that that body fix a just and equitable increase in conformity with the company's increased expense of operation.

Highwaymen Steal Goods Off Freight

Milwaukee, Wis., Dec. 17.—(I. N. S.)—Wrecking of the Minneapolis Flyer of the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul railroad was narrowly averted today as a result of the robbery by six armed bandits of a Milwaukee freight train.

The bandits placed a stolen automobile across the tracks and the machine was struck by the flyer, which the bandits did not apparently know would pass ahead of the freight. The flyer stopped and blocked the freight. The robbers then overpowered the train crew and carried away \$7000 worth of merchandise in two motor trucks.

Execution Is Stayed; Gallows Torn Down

Chicago, Dec. 17.—(I. N. S.)—Workmen are tearing down the scaffold in the yard of the county jail today on which Gene Geary, noted gunman, was to have been hanged this morning. Geary escaped the gallows, for the present at least, when the supreme court granted a writ of supersedeas which will prolong his life at least until February. He had been in the death cell four hours when the writ was granted. Geary was convicted of the slaying of Harry Beckas, a saloon-keeper.

Mother and Sons' Supper

The annual mother and sons' reception and supper of the Y. M. C. A. will be held tonight in the association auditorium. Athletic stunts will be featured. Among the speakers will be H. W. Stone, J. C. Mehan and Willard House.

COUNTY GAVE AND TO MAN WHO HAD MONEY TO LOAN

The family of the late Joseph Stremel was given sustenance for a period of practically one year and to the extent of \$600.68 before it was discovered by county attaches that Stremel had money loaned out at interest. It appears he had made loans of his money to a church.

The county commissioners have been considering the justice of asking the administratrix of the Stremel estate, Hazel Bernice Gilbert, to make full allowance to Multnomah county for the funds furnished the Stremel family, and it was decided today to file a formal demand with the administratrix for the \$600.68.

TWO ARE ARRESTED ON ORDERS FROM PORTLAND

Erling W. Shermell was arrested in Sacramento, Thursday, and is being held for Sheriff Hurlbut, who will send a deputy sheriff to the California city for the prisoner. Shermell is charged with larceny of bales in connection with alleged collections for an electric concern of Portland.

Thomas M. Golden was arrested at Seattle on a charge of forgery alleged by the sheriff in Portland. Deputy Sheriff Kendal went to Seattle today to bring Golden to Portland to answer this charge.

WIFE'S PARENTS SUED BY HUSBAND FOR ALIENATION

C. W. Kellum, who married Ida Bundy June 1, 1919, and to whom was born one child, Irwin Chester Kellum, filed suit Thursday against J. A. and Pearl Bundy, parents of his wife. He seeks judgment for \$50,000, alleging that they have conspired to prejudice his wife against him and have induced her to abandon him and have harbored herself and the son in their own home, refusing to let Kellum see or talk with his wife.

VITULA PITTS' SUIT FOR \$10,000 DAMAGES BEGINS

The trial of the \$10,000 damage suit of Vitula Pitts against the Portland Railway, Light & Power company was begun today by a jury in Circuit Judge Tucker's court Friday forenoon. Mrs. Pitts was injured June 3, 1919, when a car in which she was riding was crashed into by another car on the Rose City Park at the bottom of the hill near Fifty-second street. She was partially paralyzed and appears in court unable to sit up.

\$50,000 Damages Asked

William B. Hall, who was a brakeman on the O. W. R. & N., on the run between La Grande and Huntington, Or., filed suit Friday against the company for personal injury damages, \$50,000, general damages, \$5 a day from the time of the accident, August 4, 1920, and \$150 for medical fees.

Man Found Insane

John Morrison Jr. was examined before Special Agent B. W. Cameron by Drs. William House and E. W. Morse Friday morning and was found to be insane, and ordered sent to the Eastern Oregon state hospital at Pendleton. Complaint was made against Morrison by Charles B. Welter, postoffice inspector, for sending obscene matter through the mails. He also advocated a system of communal marriages.

\$100,000 Suit Submitted

The suit for \$100,000 damages brought by Walter Davis, a Southern Pacific engineer, against Walker D. Hines, formerly director general of railroads and now agent for the conducting of litigation arising out of federal control, will be tried in Circuit Judge Edrie Stapleton's court today. Davis claims that a train collision in which he received permanent injuries near Oswego May 31, 1918, was caused by the unusual wording of train orders.

Court Grants Allowance

In connection with the administration of the estate of the late S. B. Huston, whose sudden death occurred in the federal courtroom a short time ago, Presiding Judge Taxwell of the circuit court Thursday ordered an allowance of \$300 a month to Mrs. Huston for her maintenance.

Gets \$100 Counter Claim

In a suit brought by Dr. H. D. Poore against Thomas D. Stoughton, an employee of the Ladd & Tilton bank, for damages resulting from the collision of their automobiles, a jury in Circuit Judge Kavanaugh's court Thursday gave a verdict to the defendant and allowed him a counter-claim of \$100.

Gresham Wants Gravel

The city of Gresham wants to purchase 125 cubic yards of gravel from the county gravel pit, one half mile east of Gresham, for use on the streets of that city. Application was made to the county commissioners Friday and was referred to the roadmaster.

Henry Myers Arrested

Henry Myers, wanted in Salt Lake City on a charge of non-support, was arrested in Portland Friday and is held pending the arrival of an officer from Utah. He will not resist extradition.

Melcher Trial Begins

The second trial of John Melcher, 21, on the charge of having committed a statutory offense against a girl of the St. Johns district began Friday before a jury in Circuit Judge Gatens court. The girl, it is alleged, was taken by Melcher into his automobile on a Saturday night and they traveled along the county highways, remaining out in the automobile until late Sunday evening.

Spruce Corporation To Pay \$4,000,000

The United States Spruce Production corporation has been called on by the chief of the aircraft service to make a payment of \$4,000,000 on its outstanding bonded indebtedness and it is understood by local officials of the corporation that this amount will be paid Saturday. Bonds outstanding against the Spruce Corporation total \$25,000,000.

Woman Novelist Is Arrested for Posing As Woman's Husband

Sioux City, Iowa, Dec. 17.—(I. N. S.)—Mrs. O. D. Church, wealthy novelist and member of a prominent Iowa family, was under arrest here today on charges of having posed as the husband of another woman, according to John D. Grakke, former publisher of the Astoria Budget, who spoke at a meeting of the Portland Realty board at noon today on "The Relative Value of Our Sexports."

Mrs. Church, who has published several novels under the name of "Clifton Revera" and "Revere Clifton," is also alleged to have "wedded" another woman in South Dakota in 1912, posing as her husband for several years. The woman's dual life was revealed when her "wife," Miss Dorothy Dunkelmann of Melvin, Iowa, complained to relatives that her "husband" was "acting queerly toward his brother," and was frequently wearing women's attire.

Investigation, followed by arrest, showed the "husband" to be a woman. Mrs. Church then confessed that her "brother" was her own husband. Church was then arrested. Both are charged with perjury and uttering a false instrument.

LENTS BURGLARS ROTTED BY COLLIE

Stealthy entrance of a burglar at the home of Mrs. E. Wimbles, 6555 Eighty-second avenue southeast, was not too quiet for a pet collie dog which routed the housebreaker and ended a series of home robberies in the Lents district early this morning.

Flying diaphans, tumbling chairs and a muffled shout awakened Mrs. Wimbles at 2 o'clock this morning. This was soon accompanied by excited barking of her dog. Hastening to the first floor, Mrs. Wimbles found her collie bristling at an open door on the back porch.

With the aid of a pocket key the burglar had gained entrance to the home. Evidently the entrance was so quiet that the dog was not awakened until the thief was within the house, crossed the porch and entered a vicious attack from the collie. During the melee a leather holster was torn from the burglar by the teeth of the dog. What other damage was done to the prowler could not be determined.

Detectors think the burglar who entered the Wimbles residence was one of a pair which committed two other robberies in Mount Scott district during the early morning hours. He was the son of Mr. S. B. Barker, a pioneer settler of the plains in 1847 and settled at Salem. Among those who survive are a brother, William J. Barker of Alir, Ore.; a sister, Mrs. E. L. Caldwell of Portland; two nephews, O. B. Caldwell and Harry Barker, and two nieces, Miss Mary Caldwell and Mrs. Bessie Harrison, all of Portland.

Mrs. Elizabeth Scott

Mrs. Elizabeth Scott, 71, died Wednesday at her home in Tigard. Mrs. Scott was a pioneer resident of Sherman county, coming to the Oregon country in 1876 via the Isthmus of Panama. She came to America from Ireland in 1874. Besides the widower the following children survive: A son, L. D. Scott, two daughters, Mrs. Ethel Bates and Mrs. Anne Rogers, all of Portland.

Mrs. Hannah Durham

Funeral services for Mrs. Hannah Gault Durham, widow of Richard L. Durham, whose death occurred recently at the home of her daughter in Newburg, Mass., were held this afternoon at Finley's chapel. The Rev. W. T. McElveen officiating. Burial was made in River-view cemetery. Mrs. Durham's son, Gilbert H. Durham, a Portland resident, was called East because of his mother's illness, accompanied the body to Portland.

Two Attorneys Make Claim on the County For One Man's Death

Two attorneys have made separate claims to the county commissioners for settlement for the death of Thomas J. Birchard, bridge tender, who was killed on the Burnside bridge October 3.

The commissioners today directed that notice be sent that the board will not deal with attorneys in the settlement of the claim, but will deal directly with the members of the family.

"This is not a case where any attorney's fees or percentages should be taken from the amount which is allowed," said Commissioner Holman. "Our whole purpose is to see that the injured shall get all that is coming to them."

Schoolma'ams Put Mashers to Rout; Sheriff Joins In

Grants Pass, Or., Dec. 17.—Mashers of this city were today routed by a water hose when two "would-be" attempted to "mash" two instructors of the local high school. The school teachers gave them a "heart-to-heart" talk in a few short, spicy words and reported the case to Sheriff Lewis. The boys promised the sheriff they would never again ask any girl they did not know to go for an automobile ride.

3 WOMEN TRY TO COMMIT SUICIDE

Apparently suffering from an unexplained depression, Mrs. E. Hyland, 9, took several poison tablets in what is thought to be an attempt to commit suicide in her room at the Hotel Portland at midnight Thursday.

Mrs. Hyland was rushed to the Good Samaritan hospital where authorities report she was in a serious condition this afternoon. Mrs. Hyland, who is employed as a stenographer in Seattle, came to Portland on a visit several days ago. Her brother, Ed Okerberg, a resident of Portland, met her Thursday night and attended a motion picture show. Okerberg told hospital authorities he was unable to explain his sister's action. Mrs. Hyland is said to be divorced from her husband.

For the second time in two weeks Dorothy Connor, 21, was taken to St. Vincent's hospital Thursday afternoon after attempting suicide by taking poison. She is reported to be out of danger. The first attempt was on the night before Thanksgiving, when she was taken to St. Vincent's under the name of Mrs. Fred Connor. Authorities report that they believe she was deserted by her husband and despondent because she was unable to find work.

Mrs. Billie Burke, 27, Netherlands hotel, a waitress in a downtown restaurant, took poison in the reading room at the Central library Thursday night. Authorities at St. Vincent's hospital report she was recovering today.

Committee Considers Plans to Develop the Harbor of N. Portland

The committee was appointed to prepare a report for the directors of the foreign trade department of the chamber. Chinese Is Sentenced

Portland Held Best Fitted for Coaling Of Ocean Vessels

Portland has every advantage over Seattle in the coaling of ocean carriers, and fuel merchants here are successfully competing with the Sound city in supplying vessels loading cargo at Astoria, according to John D. Grakke, former publisher of the Astoria Budget, who spoke at a meeting of the Portland Realty board at noon today on "The Relative Value of Our Sexports."

The board adopted resolutions favoring the proposed speaking tour of Frank Branch Riley in the East and pledged \$2500, in addition to amounts already contributed, to finance the tour. The board voted to get behind a movement for an international exposition to be held here in 1928.

SCHOOL ELECTION CHANGES ADVISED

School Director W. F. Woodward announced this morning that at the next legislative session he will introduce three measures:

To provide that at all school elections all registered voters may vote upon bond issues as well as for candidates for school director.

To provide that school elections shall be held at the same time as city elections.

To provide for state distribution of text books in all schools.

He also announced he does not concur in the modifications of the teacher tenure law as proposed by a majority of the school directors. "The teaching morale was never so high as now and the teachers were never so efficient and this has come about under the tenure law," he explained. "If any desires illustration of the harm resultant from lack of a tenure law let him examine the condition which obtain in the administration of our public library where a self-perpetuating board is supreme."

Woodward said he regards it absurd that non-taxpayers can vote upon a dock bond issue for many millions of dollars and not upon financial measures of the schools.

"Why," he asked, "should we divorce school and city affairs by holding elections at different times?"

"I do not mean to propose free textbooks. That is a misnomer. What I have in mind is something like the California system where textbooks are paid for from the general fund and loaned to the children."

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CHAMBER EXPECTS MANY IMMIGRANTS

That there will be an influx of people to Oregon next summer and fall, surpassing any former year, is the conviction expressed in the annual report of the State Chamber of Commerce. The report is intended to outline activities of the organization in preparation for the annual meeting which will be held December 28 and 29.

"Some of these people will come seeking land, some industries, some looking for homes and some traveling merely for pleasure," says the report. The state chamber is in favor of continuing the advertising campaign which has been carried on by the state this year.

The state chamber is in favor of establishing a tourist information bureau similar to the one conducted at Denver, and the opinion is expressed that the bureau should be conducted in conjunction with the state exhibit through an appointee of the governor.

While actual figures are unavailable the report expresses the opinion that farm development during the year has been healthy. Objection to the bringing to Oregon of the type of immigrants now being brought to New York is voiced in the report and a plan is outlined whereby immigrants would be brought from the more desirable farming sections of Northern Europe.

Plans for the settlement of cutover lands are now being evolved by the chamber. Irrigation, which has been encouraged by the organization during the last year, is pledged support during 1921.

Data is given to cover irrigation and reclamation work of the year. Activities of the land settlement commission, congressional conference and Northwest rivers and harbors congress are outlined. Work which has been supported is given full discussion.

The complete report is being printed and will be sent out soon to all members and affiliated organizations.

Strawberry Plant Growers to Fight Root Weevil Menace

Growers of strawberry plants for shipping purposes foregathered from Multnomah, Washington, Clackamas, Tillamook and Columbia counties in Portland this morning, with the state horticultural commission to discuss the eradication of the strawberry root weevil and meet objections raised by California officials to the shipment of Oregon plants into that state.

The situation was thoroughly discussed and it was determined that the root weevil is confined to a comparatively small area in the northern part of Oregon and that radical steps must be taken to eradicate it and prevent spread to other sections.

deputy plant quarantine officer for California, was present and took part in the discussions. He indicated that he would be willing to recommend the modification of the California quarantine so that strawberry plants from Oregon duly certified to be free from the weevil may be admitted as his state.

No plants will be shipped out of the infected districts and it was announced that the state board of horticulture will at once make plans for a survey to determine the extent of the spread of this disease. All growers interested are requested to get in touch with H. C. Atwell, Forest Grove, horticultural commissioner for the first district.

ILLINOIS SENATOR IN SOVIET RUSSIA

Moscow, by Wireless to Berlin, Dec. 17.—(I. N. S.)—A report from London today that U. S. Senator Medill McCormick, of Illinois, is conducting an unofficial investigation of European conditions for President-elect Harding and may undertake unofficial negotiations, aroused great interest among soviet officials. It led to the belief in some quarters that Senator McCormick may visit Moscow before his return home.

(An interview given at Geneva, Senator McCormick said that he had gone to Europe on his own initiative to secure information for the use of his colleagues in the senate. He is now investigating conditions in Austria and Hungary.)

Senator McCormick is well known in Russia through his father, who was formerly American ambassador to this country, and through the International Harvester company, whose farm machinery is known throughout Russia. The International Harvester company was started by the McCormick family. The plant of that company near Moscow is the only large foreign factory that has kept running during the blockade. It was consistently maintained friendly relations with the soviet.

The consensus of opinion here is that such a well known representative of the United States probably would be able to reach a satisfactory agreement with the soviet.

Relief Drive 'Beats' Campaign Signed
