## Trading of Players to Take Place

**NEW YORK, Dec. 21.—(I. N. S.)**—Several big player deals set in motion during the recent baseball meetings here promise to liven up the "hot stove season," according to indications today.  
Shortly after the holidays, it is believed, the owners of half a dozen or more clubs will settle down in earnest to make swaps or purchase players, and rumors have it that fandom is in for some surprises.  
From St. Louis comes word that the Cardinals have put Roger Hornsby on the market after two or more years of turning down fabulous offers for the player. Hornsby, it is said, can be had today for \$150,000 or the equivalent in players.  
Time was when the New York Giants would have jumped at this offer. Manager McGraw is said to have offered nearly \$250,000 for Hornsby at one time last summer. During the recent baseball conclaves here it was rumored that New York had purchased Hornsby, but McGraw denied it, and Secretary Joseph O'Brien reiterated the denial today when the rumor cropped up again.  
**GIANTS WANT GROH**
