

HAROLD T. PRINCE TO CONTEST WILL LEFT BY FATHER

Presiding Judge Tazewell signed an order this morning permitting Harold T. Prince, through his guardian, Dr. William Rees, to file a suit to contest the will of his father, the late Thomas Prince, who left an estate close to \$1,000,000.

Prince died in Santa Barbara, Cal., February 21 of this year, at the age of 70 years. The complaint states that for a considerable time previous to his death he was in an impaired mental condition and not able to dispose of his property, and that the will, which was dated August 30, 1918, cuts off the son, Harold T., who is the only heir at law, with but a small portion of the estate.

Under the provisions of the will the son is to have the use of the former home at Dundee, Or., with 85 acres of land there, also the home place at 901 Alameda drive, Portland, with two lots. All the rest of the estate is placed in the control of the Worcester Bank & Trust company of Worcester, Mass., for management.

It provides that \$100,000 is to be set aside for the son, with the income to be paid to him quarterly; \$20,000 is to be set aside for a nephew, Lucius T. Hayward, of Dundee, Ore., and \$25,000 quarterly; bequests are made of \$5000 to L. T. Hayward, \$5000 to William L. Ames, \$5000 each to the Home for Aged Men, Home for Aged Women, and the Home for Old Folks, and \$5000 to the Worcester Bank & Trust company of Worcester, Mass.; \$5000 goes to the "old burial ground" at Kingston and \$25,000 to the trustees of the cemetery association for the erection of a chapel, and \$25,000 is bequeathed to the city of Kingston for care of the poor. The residue is to be divided among all heirs.

A codicil, dated December 12, 1919, provides that Harold T. Prince is to receive \$10,000 in cash; Ruby Emory \$5000; Dr. H. F. Ong \$3750; George H. Ward \$500; and \$500 to the city of Kingston. The names Dr. H. F. Ong as executor, A. C. Shaw is attorney of record.

SUNNYSIDE M. E. CHURCH
BEQUEATHED \$500 BY WILL.
Sunnyside Methodist Episcopal church of Portland will benefit to the extent of \$500 through the will of Mrs. Jennie Tringle Nash, who died here December 20 at the age of 52 years.

A codicil, dated December 13, 1916, and D. L. Nash, the widow, is named as executor. Besides the bequest of \$500 to the church, a bequest of \$1000 is made to an uncle, Newton Hoover, whose address is unknown. In case he is not located within two years this bequest becomes void. The balance of the estate, which is estimated at \$12,500 in real property and \$5000 in personal property, goes to the widow.

RELATED PETITION FILED IN
MRS. KATE BULGER ESTATE
Although Mrs. Kate A. Bulger died in Multnomah county June 12, 1893, letters of administration on her estate have just been applied for. The petition, which was filed Thursday, asks that Mark O'Neill of Portland be appointed. Mrs. Bulger left a lot in the Tolman tract, and the widow and the children gave quitclaim deeds thereto when the property was sold a number of years ago. It transpires that the failure to have the estate probated affects the title to this property and it is primarily for the purpose of correcting the chain of title that the present application is made.

FORGER SENTENCED; THEN
PAROLED TO ATTORNEY
Frank Hardesty, 20, self-confessed forger and thief, was sentenced by Presiding Judge Tazewell Thursday to five years in the state penitentiary and then paroled to his attorney John B. Cleland. Hardesty broke into the home of Mrs. Dawn Illingsworth in the Piedmont district and stole her bank book and check book. He issued a series of checks under the name of Illingsworth, but was confused as to the spelling of the given name, and when he signed it "Darren" he was arrested and confessed. He will be given an opportunity to go to work and make restitution, but should he fail a second indictment hanging over him will be pressed.

MARY HAWKINS' WILL IS
FILED; ESTATE IS \$120,000
The will of Mary R. Hawkins, who died in Portland November 28, was filed for probate today. The estate consists of approximately \$80,000 in real property and \$40,000 in personal property. The will was dated November 27, 1920, and names Chester V. Dolph and Edward J. Felling as the executors.

The heirs are Emma Dorris, 75, Eugene; Julia E. Beckman, 73, Portland; Mary Vining, 80, Ashland; Florence Whipp, 70, Fallon, Nevada; Kate Hoffman, 68, Jacksonville; Corinne Linn, 59, Eugene; Margaret Linn, 57, Los Angeles, Cal.; Fletcher Linn, 54, Portland; George D. Linn, 52, Eugene; Mary Linn Fay, 47, Seattle.

THOMAS CULLEN WILL BE
SENTENCED ON JANUARY 3
Sentencing of Thomas Cullen, convicted of the larceny of a safe and approximately \$1700 in money from the home of Ding Wing, Chinese tailor, at Fourth and Salmon streets, December 10, was postponed by Circuit Judge Morrow Thursday until Monday, January 3. Robert Campbell, who was indicted by the Multnomah county grand jury on the same charge, elected to be tried separately, and his trial will take place early in January.

"Good Fellow" Fined
Cato Prince, colored, wanted to be a "good fellow" and bring some Christmas cheer to a Portland friend on his way back from the state of Washington. He obtained two quart bottles of real whiskey for this purpose, but the sheriff's deputies nabbed him with the bottles. He appeared before District Judge Hawkins today, pleaded guilty, and was fined \$25.

WILLIAM DUFOR, OREGON PIONEER, DIES AT HIS HOME

William Henry Harrison Dufur, an Oregon pioneer and for the past four years bailiff of Circuit Judge Tazewell's department of the Multnomah county circuit court, died at 5 o'clock Thursday evening at his home, 1075 Belmont street, from a complication of diseases. The funeral will be held Monday afternoon, but arrangements have not been completed.

Mr. Dufur was born in Vermont and came to Oregon when a small child. He was a member of a family prominent in affairs of this state and for whom the town of Dufur, in Wasco county, was named. He had served in the state legislature, was appointed by the federal government about two decades ago to adjudicate Indian land claims in Oregon, was first forest supervisor for this district, had served as master of the state senate, and held other positions of honor and responsibility.

He leaves the widow, Mrs. Lizzie M. Dufur; one son, Andrew B. Dufur of Dufur, Or., and one daughter, Mrs. Blanche G. Greer of Bakersfield, Cal., besides a brother and sister, E. B. Dufur and Mrs. Arabelle Staats, both of Maupin, Or.

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Silent, Mysterious Tong Puts Mark on May; He Is Outcast

"East is East and West is West, and never the twain shall meet"—and the ways and customs of the one are never the ways and customs of the other.

It was left to Jim Moy, aged Chinese outcast, a victim of the relentless judicial system of his silent people, to bring these two worlds together. Persecuted by the customs of his own race, Moy sought at last refuge in the institutions of another country.

Like any other homeless, hopeless vagrant, Moy appealed to the desk office at headquarters for a bed Thursday night. There was no other place to go. In Chinatown every door was closed to him.

"Hoy Mon" greeted him if he was so bold as to enter the store of some former friend, or perhaps even relative. Silent looks of scorn, unanswered greetings, contemptuous grunts of disapproval were all his fellow countrymen had for him.

Many years ago, in secret session, some mysterious tong passed judgment on Moy. Whatever his offense, no one outside of Chinatown will ever know. It was not serious enough to call into service the "hatchet men," and Moy was allowed to live.

But live an outcast, ignored and shunned by his one time friends, left to wander alone in a strange country. With head bowed Moy shuffled over to the elevator for his ride to the city jail on the fifth floor. Turning to an Americanized Chinaman in the lobby, someone inquired, "What did Moy do to make his life so down on him?"

"No good, much very bad," and a shrug was the answer.

Union Pacific Co.'s
Stock May Be Sold
To Road's Employees

Employees of the Union Pacific system, including the O-W. R. & N., may purchase common stock of the Union Pacific in the market upon a partial payment basis, according to a plan which has been approved by the board of directors. Advice of the plan was received this morning from Carl R. Gray, president of the system, by J. P. O'Brien, general manager of the O-W.

The plan provides that the railroad will purchase stock in the open market on receipt of order from the employee who may pay for the stock in 24 equal payments. All dividends will be credited to the employee, who will be charged 6 per cent on deferred payments.

Union Pacific stock has ranged in its market price since October 1 from \$129.50 and \$112 per share at a cost of \$125 per share. This would show a return equal to 8 per cent upon the amount invested. At a price of \$120 per share the return would be equivalent to 8.33 per cent.

The plan provides specific treatment of cases where employees become disabled, die or leave the service. The company says that no stock is for sale and that it will simply act as an agent in making stock purchases. No representation or guarantee is made as to future market prices or dividend policy.

Mayor Baker and

Mayor and Mrs. Baker will return from their visit to California on the Shasta today, it was announced in the mayor's office.

After a visit in Los Angeles, San Diego, Pasadena and other Southern California cities, the mayor and Mrs. Baker spent the last week in San Francisco, Oakland, Berkeley and other Northern California cities, where they were the recipients of many social honors.

Mayor Baker had many conferences with Chief of Police August Vollmer while in Berkeley, studying the work of that internationally recognized authority on crime prevention, and he will detail Portland police officers to the California city to study Vollmer's methods. The Berkeley system will be adopted in a large measure by the Portland police department.

Receiver Takes Over
Denver Tramway Co.

Denver, Colo., Dec. 24.—(I. N. S.)—The Denver Tramway company today went into the hands of a receiver. The company has been in financial straits for many months, but the recent strike is believed to have been the immediate cause of the receivership proceedings. Much of the company's stock and bond issues is held by eastern capital.

Man Asks Rental
From Phone Firm
For Air Over Land

Can a property owner collect rental for the use of the air over his realty? The district court of Multnomah county will have this question to decide in a suit just filed for \$71.

The complainant is Luigi Russo, owner of lot 4, block 37, in Vernon, and he is suing the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company. He says the company stretched wires over his property without permission and has maintained them from January 1, 1915, to December 1, 1920; that the reasonable rental for this accommodation is \$1 a month, and he prays for a judgment for \$71 on this basis.

Driver to Wise Up
On Traffic Measure

Eight minutes after he had bought a new automobile and started to take it home, M. Papas found himself under arrest on the Broadway bridge. Patrolman Shaylor testified in court that Papas was driving with glaring headlights. The dealers who sold the machine to Papas told Municipal Judge Roseman that they forgot to turn the new owner about bright lights. Papas was told to read over the book on traffic regulations.

Asks \$1,000,000 for
'False' Commitment

New York, Dec. 24.—(I. N. S.)—Ten years' confinement in an insane asylum is worth \$1,000,000 in the opinion of Misses Phoebe and Ada P. Bruch, who jointly have sued Drs. W. B. Gibson and Walter Lindsay of Huntington, L. I., for that amount. The sisters allege the doctors certified them insane without examining them.

FEDERAL AGENTS TAKE \$500,000 IN SPURIOUS NOTES

Detroit, Mich., Dec. 24.—(I. N. S.)—Smashing down doors and partitions late today, United States secret service operatives raided a building at Cass and Clearfield avenues, confiscated \$500,000 worth of counterfeit federal reserve notes and seized the complete plant.

More than 20,000 notes of \$20 denomination and thousands of \$1 counterfeit bills were included in the contraband. The raid followed receipt of information from Chicago. Two men, Joseph Choate and Casey B. Tyler, were arrested here earlier today with \$900 \$20 bills in their possession. They declared they manufactured the bills in Detroit. Chief Palma of the secret service declared the bills to be the most perfect counterfeits that have come to his attention in years.

The plant was modern in every detail and is the largest ever seized in the state. Choate and Tyler told authorities in Chicago they went there to pass hundreds of thousands of dollars' worth of the money among holiday shoppers.

Man Who Escaped
From Mare Island
Admits Holdup Plan

Vallejo, Cal., Dec. 24.—(U. P.)—Starting disclosures of an alleged plot to rob a bank in Red Bluff, Cal., were made at the courtmartial today of R. G. Scott, one of six men who escaped from the Mare Island naval prison barracks last September.

Scott, after pleading not guilty to the seven counts preferred against him, broke down, it was declared, and admitted he and his five companions had planned to go to Red Bluff after making good their escape and there hold up a bank.

Embezzling Major
Dismissed, Jailed

Washington, Dec. 24.—(I. N. S.)—Major H. S. Green, U. S. M. C., stationed at Marine Barracks at Quantico, who was courtmartialled on charges of embezzlement of \$12,000, has been convicted and sentenced to dismissal from the service and 10 years' imprisonment, the navy department announced today.

Christmas Tree Fire
Injures Fireman and
Does Great Damage

New York, Dec. 24.—(U. P.)—The first Christmas tree fire this year resulted in the injury of a fireman, narrow escape from death of four children and property damage of \$26,000.

The tree, which Mrs. Isabelle Descha was preparing for her four children, burst into flames. She ran to the street and summoned a policeman. Firemen carried out the children. Other occupants of the apartment house fled.

LOS ANGELES.—(U. P.)—Edna Harron, 14, is begging a burglar to be her Santa Claus. Christmas won't be complete unless a thief who ransacked the Harron Hollywood residence returns her gold wrist watch. It was a present last Christmas from her brother, Robert (Bobbie) Harron, motion picture star who accidentally killed himself with a revolver in New York several months ago.

GALVESTON.—(I. N. S.)—Spontaneous combustion is believed today to be the cause of the fourth spectacular waterfront fire here within the year, which resulted in the death of three persons, serious injury to two others and damage to property to the extent of \$400,000.

ATHENS.—(U. S.)—King Constantine is the busiest man in the kingdom of Greece. Since his spectacular assumption of the reins of power in the palace at Athens he has devoted every waking moment to the business of state, grudgingly allowing himself but six hours' sleep.
