

MAKERS OF CIDER PASS 'KICK' BUCK BACK TO DEALERS

Cider manufacturers were as generous in passing the buck to distributors and dealers at the conference with the city council Wednesday as the dealers at previous hearings have been, in insisting that all "honor" was due the distributors and manufacturers for violations of federal prohibition laws and city ordinances.

The conference, called by the council at the request of cider manufacturers with a view to enacting an ordinance to put a stop to the sale of soft drinks with an unlawful alcoholic content, was attended by many Portland and two or three out of town cider manufacturers, accompanied by their attorneys. Federal prohibition officers were also in attendance and offered suggestions.

SAFEGUARDS SUGGESTED

Prohibition Director Smith advised the council that, in his opinion, if the manufacturers were careful to remove the yeast from their product and properly treat it—making it a strictly sweet cider—and the manufacturers and distributors were only allowed to deliver small quantities to the dealers as their trade justified, he saw no reason why hard or intoxicating cider could not be kept off the market. "However," Smith added, "it is hard cider the public wants; that is the reason the city and federal officers have had so much trouble."

Both manufacturers and federal officers advised the council that grape juice, imported from California, and not cider, was responsible for a greater part of the drunkenness in Portland.

GRAPE JUICE BLAMED

Cider got its principal "kick" by being blended with grape juice. It was brought out at the conference.

Prohibition Director Smith, Attorney Charles Hindman and Elton Watkins were appointed by the council to cooperate with the city attorney's office in drawing up an ordinance to regulate soft drink manufacture and sale in Portland. The ordinance will be presented to the council next Wednesday at a continued conference of manufacturers with the council, and upon approval will be passed, to become effective immediately.

The council had better prepare for a 20 days' session in the hearing on the revocation of the American Soda Works, Watkins, as attorney for James Faturos, the manager, advised the councilmen Wednesday. The hearing was postponed until next Tuesday at 10 a. m.

MAYOR IS AROUSED

"What do you mean by that?" Mayor Baker demanded.

"I mean just what I say," Watkins replied. "When you start trying my client to revoke his license I intend to have over 40 witnesses and shall insist that they be allowed to testify. I shall have Assistant United States Attorney Flegel, Chief of Police Jenkins, other policemen and over 40 other witnesses, many of them soft drink dealers whom this council has put out of business. I purpose to show that these revoked license holders bought cider and grape juice from others as well as from my client." Mayor Baker and Commissioners Bigelow and Barbur hinted that the council possibly would dispatch the case in much less time.

Pendleton Man Is Urged for Highway Commission Post

Pendleton, Or., Dec. 30.—Wires are coming in to all community associations in Pendleton from points in Umatilla county asking that a combined move be made in the county for the appointment of David H. Nelson, Pendleton wheat farmer and good roads enthusiast, to the place made vacant by the death of State Highway Commissioner E. E. Kildie of Island City.

G. M. Rice, vice president of the First National bank of Pendleton, and E. P. Marshall of Pendleton, today refused to consider the position when approached by friends, and Senator Roy Ritter declared his desire to stay in the senate. All three men were enthusiastic in their endorsement of Nelson for the appointment.

Nelson was chairman of the committee which secured overwhelming support for the recent \$600,000 road bond issue, and is a successful wheat farmer and business man.

Portion of Wygant Street to Be Given To School District

Wygant street from Denver avenue to Concord was ordered vacated and deeded to the Portland school district, to be added to the Beach school's present tract, by action of the council Wednesday. The 60 by 600 feet tract will enable the school board to carry out its plan of replacing the present group of small portable buildings with a large modern school in the near future.

The school board agreed to deed to the city a 10-foot strip facing Blandena street, in order to widen that thoroughfare sufficiently to care for the additional traffic turned to it in closing

Wygant, and in addition will deed a right of way easement for the Wygant street sewer.

The grant was made by unanimous vote of the council over the protest of several property owners, who contended for damages to their property by closing the street.

Weather Ends Railroad Building
Willamina, Or., Dec. 29.—The Spaulding Logging company, which has charge of construction work of the Willamina & Grande Ronde railroad, plans to lay off many workmen, due to the inclement weather. A force, however, will be kept on duty to clear the highway whenever the sliding soil interferes with traffic.

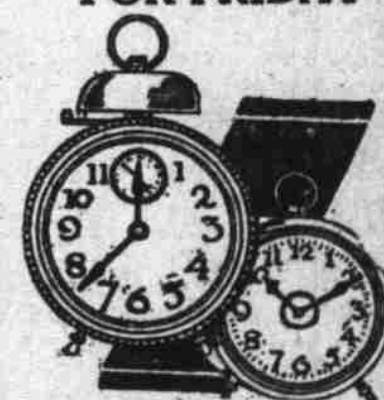
