BONAPARTE SCION SINGING FOR LIBEL

New York, Jan. 5.—(I. N. S.)—Charging that she had been held up as a social butterfly, guilty of snobbery and un-American conduct, Mrs. Blanche Bonaparte of New York, Washington, Newport and Palm Beach, has begun a \$100,000 libel suit against Town Topics, Inc.

The plaintiff is the wife of Jerome Napoleon Bonaparte, great grandson of Napoleon Bonaparte, king of Westphalia. She divorced her first husband, Harold Bonaparte, in 1918, and married Bonaparte shortly afterward. Mr. and Mrs. Bonaparte are at present living at the Biltmore hotel in this city.

Civilian Policeman Indicted for Killing City Official's Son

Atlanta, Ga., Jan. 6.—(I. N. S.)—Rolf Edmondson, Atlanta newspaperman and civilian policeman who was aiding a watchman in shooting two young men from the Journal Building, New Year's night, when C. E. Bowen, son of Building Inspector C. J. Bowen, was shot and killed, was indicted by the Fulton county grand jury for murder. Edmondson claims Bowen attacked him and the pistol was accidentally discharged.

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TARIFF BILL IS APPROVED BY SENATORS

Approval of Emergency Measure on Tariff by Chairman of Finance Committee Found Contradictory of His Recent Stand.

By J. Bart Campbell Washington, Jan. 6.—(I. N. S.)—Senator Boies Penrose of Pennsylvania, chairman of the senate finance committee, announced this afternoon that he would support the temporary omnibus tariff bill, passed by the house.

Penrose's announcement was regarded as a complete reversal of his declaration recently that he was opposed to the passage of the bill or of any temporary or "pop gun" tariff legislation at this time. He issued a formal statement at the conclusion of a hearing on the bill today after he had consulted with Senator Smoot, Republican, Utah, a supporter of the bill, and others of its Republican sponsors.

F. J. Hagenbarth, Salt Lake City, president of the National Wool Growers' association and executive officer of the National Livestock association, told the senate committee that falling prices and the loss of the market brought American wool men face to face with ruin. He explained why South American wool had fallen in price, cutting the feet from under American producers and how manufacturers faced sudden and heavy cancellations of orders for woolen goods and how it all contributed to destroy the wool business.

LOCAL MAN'S BOAT MISSING IN ALASKA

Washington, Jan. 6.—(I. N. S.)—Information reached Secretary of the Interior Payne today that fears are felt for the safety of the United States mail boat Pulitzer and her crew of seven men, missing since December 15 in the icy waters off the Alaskan coast.

FATHER RESCUES TOTS FROM FIRE

Aroused from sleep by the coughing of his children, Ralph Hahn, vice president of the Sterling Food Products company, saved his family from death when his home at Riverwood caught fire from a defective flue at 11:30 o'clock Wednesday night. The home was totally destroyed, the loss amounting to approximately \$10,000, partly covered by insurance.

Burglar, Discovered At Work by Woman, Flees From House

Atlanta Streetcar Men Get Advance

Atlanta, Ga., Jan. 6.—(I. N. S.)—Streetcar motormen and conductors receive a 3 cents an hour rise by a union contract covering the year 1921, signed by the Georgia Railway & Power company and representatives of the Streetcar Men's union. The scale now paid is 40 cents an hour for the first three months' service; 46 cents an hour next nine months and after one year, 48 cents an hour.



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
