WEATHER CONDITIONS
Low pressure prevails in Alaska and Canada over a belt reaching from the Lake region southward to Texas and New Mexico. The remainder of the country is covered by two high pressure areas, one central in the South Atlantic states and the other on the California coast. Precipitation has occurred in the middle and North Pacific slope, and in Utah, Colorado and Wyoming. The heaviest rainfall reported was 1.00 inch at Astoria, Ore. Snow is falling in Eastern Washington. The temperature is much lower in the plateau and north of the Rocky Mountain and northern plains states and on the North Atlantic coast, and is considerably higher in the extreme Northwest and over a belt extending from New Mexico to the western Lake region.
Relative humidity at Portland—Noon yesterday, 88 per cent; 5 p. m. yesterday, 80 per cent; 5 a. m. today, 90 per cent.
Precipitation since January 1—Total, 4.54 inches; normal, 1.07 inches, snow, 2.67 inches.

Geologist Describes Caves—Several caves in a recent number of "Natural History," official organ of the American Museum of Natural History of New York, were described. The caves, which are the caves of Josephine county, Oregon. The story was written by Ira A. Williams, geologist of the state bureau of mines and geology. The caves were discovered by Elijah Davidson in 1874 and have been visited by thousands of tourists during recent years. They are located at a distance of 35 miles from the nearest railroad and nearly 10 miles from a good highway. The territory surrounding the caves was made a part of the Siskiyou national forest reserve in 1909.

Postal Claim Payments—Damages for lost insured and C. O. D. parcels will henceforth be paid at the Portland post office for all claims made at the Portland land office and at third and fourth postoffices in the state, instead of at Washington, D. C., thus saving correspondence and time. The time of settlement about 60 days, according to a new postal regulation received by Postmaster John M. Jones. This additional responsibility of the Portland office will expedite the payment of claims by about two months, Jones said.

Charges Dismissed—Two federal grand jury indictments against Fred Peterson, alias Swede Whitey, charging alteration and possession of War Savings Stamps stolen from the Scio bank, were dismissed Thursday by Judge Wolverton at the request of Assistant United States Attorney Veatch. Peterson was recently convicted on a conspiracy indictment and sentenced to two years' imprisonment at McNeil's island. He is now serving a one year sentence in the county jail for possessing the altered stamps.

Swetland Is Named Deputy in Office Of U. S. Marshal

Howard P. Swetland, son of Louis E. Swetland and a member of the pioneer Swetland family, has been appointed a deputy United States marshal to succeed E. T. Mass, resigned, according to an announcement made by Marshal George Alexander. Mass, who was Clackamas county sheriff before accepting the federal post, left the service Thursday night to accept a private position in Oregon City. Marshal Alexander said Mass had been a faithful and efficient deputy. He entered the office on October 3, 1917, with Alexander.

Swetland is an overseas veteran. He enlisted as a volunteer on July 30, 1917, with the 116th Oregon engineers, and was later transferred to the 11th engineers, 42d division, familiarly known as the rainbow division. He saw 18 months overseas service and was in the engagements at Champagne-Marne, Alsace-Marne, St. Mihiel and Meuse-Argonne. He was discharged May 16, 1919. Swetland took the oath of office this morning.

Dean of Freshman at Yale University Is Here for Lectures
Roswell Parker Angier, dean of freshmen of Yale university and head of the psychological laboratory, arrived in Portland this morning, when he was almost immediately whisked out to the high schools to speak to the students during assembly period.

Angier spoke at Washington, Jefferson and Lincoln high schools this morning. At noon he was entertained at lunch at the University club by the committee on information of the Yale Alumni association. A dinner is to be given Angier tonight at the University club by the members of the Oregon Yale alumni, with plates for 150. On Saturday Angier will be entertained at a lunch given by the high school principals. He will leave Saturday night for Seattle.

Angier, during the war, administered the psychological tests to prospective aviators. He is staying at the University club.

Wolves Appear in Santiam Unusually Early; Deer Killed
Wolves have appeared in the Santiam national forest earlier than has ever been known in the history of the Oregon office of the U. S. biological survey, says Stanley G. Jewett. Word has just been received from Government Trapper Ames that he has found the carcasses of three deer killed within a month by wolves. Most of the reports tell of such deer being killed in late February and March, when they have come out of the mountains and have congregated in large bunches in canyons where the snow is deep. The snowfall has already been heavy on the Santiam, says Jewett. Ames also killed a horse for meat bait and is setting traps for the wolves.
