

WILSON PLANS TO GO AHEAD WITH HIS WORK OF MEDIATION BETWEEN ARMENIA AND THE TURKISH NATIONALISTS

Washington, Jan. 8.—President Wilson plans to go ahead with his work of mediation between Armenia and the Turkish nationalists. So far as the information in official quarters here is concerned, there is no basis for the report that the British and French governments are trying to discourage Wilson from proceeding with the task since he is to leave the presidency within the next six weeks.

The suggestion was made by Prime Minister Lloyd George that Wilson designate the American high commissioner at Constantinople to act for him, and this has given rise to the belief that the British government wanted to get the task of mediation into official channels since the American high commissioner is an officer of the department of state and as such would continue in office beyond March 4 and his acts would be those of the United States government.

ACCEPT MORGENTHAU

But it is now officially explained that the prime minister's suggestion was made on December 2 in a note to the council of the League of Nations before the council had reached the decision that Wilson had decided to appoint former Ambassador Henry Morgenthau.

The note reached here only a few days ago, having been forwarded through the council of the league and thus delayed. British officials here say the suggestion was made as a supplementary rather than an alternative proposal and that there was no intention on the part of the prime minister to change the spirit of the decision of the league council to accept Wilson as mediator.

It is pointed out that the suggestion that the league council formally acknowledged Wilson's message in which he said he could not act for the government of the United States but only as a private individual and could not, of course, furnish troops or any other power to back up the decisions he might make.

PAY OWN EXPENSES

Wilson, moreover, asked for the moral support of all the governments on the council of the league so that his decisions would be backed up. The league, in acknowledging Wilson's message, replied that it would be glad to have him serve.

From this exchange of messages, officials here are proceeding on the theory that all is smooth and that the governments of Europe fully understand the unique position in which President Wilson is placed by reason of his retirement from office on March 4, by which time, of course, hardly a beginning could be made in the task of mediation.

It is understood that for the time being it is left to the president to represent the president in the negotiations with the Armenians and Turkish nationalists, with pay, his own expenses, though it is not known whether the nations will subsequently reimburse him.

BOTH PARTIES AGREE

It is not improbable that Wilson may ask the next administration to continue the work of mediation in the matter of the Turkish nationalists, and that the Turkish nationalists will agree to continue the work of mediation in the matter of the Turkish nationalists.

The president's decision to become mediator was approved pretty generally by the American press, irrespective of whether the president was believed to be doing the right thing or whether it might be done to help the cause of the Armenian people who have suffered so much.

The "Irish committee" replied to Zimmermann's message by declining through Bernstorff the proposal to land arms, explaining that under no circumstances would the venture be successful.

ARMED WITHOUT MEN USELESS

The government report declares that early in 1918 the British authorities ascertained that munitions were being landed by Germany in West Ireland from time to time. It was also learned, the white paper states, that Sinn Fein leaders spread reports that the formation of a new rebellion a number of German officers would be landed by submarines.

The white paper also contains a report sent by Bernstorff to the German government in September, 1914, in which the German ambassador said there was no reason for worry about American opinion regarding Germany's side of the war. Bernstorff expressed the opinion that Germany would find many friends in America if she promised to give freedom to the oppressed peoples of the world.

COLLINS REACHES BERN

Bernstorff notified Wilhelmstrasse that Michael Collins had gone to Berlin. Dr. Zimmermann replied that Collins had arrived.

NEW YORK JUSTICE IS MENTIONED IN PLOTS

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Washington, Jan. 8.—(I. N. S.)—The reconstruction of Yale since the war was the subject discussed by Roswell P. Angier, dean of the freshman class of Yale university and director of the psychological laboratory, at a luncheon given him today at the University club by the principals of the secondary schools of Portland.

YALE'S EFFECT, SAYS LEADERS

Previously, the college grew independently of the scientific school, and during the war it lagged somewhat behind. This year the two are combined and freshmen entering the college and those entering the scientific school are working for the first year on the same basis. A differentiation will later be made of those who want to take up the scientific line of study.

At the dinner given for Angier at the University club Friday night by the Yale alumni, Angier told of the changes that are taking place in Yale, explained its reorganization and called upon alumni for still greater organized support.

The increasing excellence of state universities and smaller colleges puts Yale in danger of becoming provincial in America before and after the Eastern rebellion and maintained a bureau in Stockholm under the direction of St. John Gaffney (former United States consul in Germany), an accredited agent of the Sinn Fein. A similar bureau was also maintained in Berlin in 1917 and 1918, the report adds.

YALE'S EFFECT, SAYS LEADERS

Destruction of the Canadian Pacific railway was urged in a message sent by Wilhelmstrasse to Count von Bernstorff, which is reproduced in the white paper. One passage in this message, which also deals with sabotage all over the American continent, reads:

YALE'S EFFECT, SAYS LEADERS

"Captain Boehm (one of the German secret agents in New York) carries instructions for the military attaché. The latter can obtain particulars regarding these persons who are suitable for carrying out sabotage in the United States and Canada."

"Joseph M. Garrity, Philadelphia; John P. Keating, Michigan avenue, Chicago; Jeremiah O'Leary, 166 Park Row, New York."

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"Embassy must not, under any circumstances, be compromised." One of the documents shows that Count von Bernstorff attached to his message of February 18, 1918 (presumed cable error as to date), regarding the sinking of the Lusitania, the following "editorial":

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"Devo informs me rising will begin in Ireland Easter. Please send arms to Limerick."

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Without more subsequently notified Wilhelmstrasse the documents show, that travelers would land 20,000 rifles in Trades bay. Berlin requested Bernstorff to be cautious to keep the matter secret and to "arrange for pilots."

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A document signed by Devo says Bernstorff arranged a wireless signal system between Germany and Ireland and that the German government was to be notified of the date of arrival of the munitions carrying ships was to be announced by Devo. It is also stated that a German submarine could enter Dublin bay and go direct to Pigeon House, where there were no anti-submarine nets.

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U. S. ENTERS; LINES BROKEN The American press says that as a result of America's entrance into the war (February, 1917) the line of communication between the German government and Sinn Fein leaders was temporarily broken, though a messenger service devised by Devo between Irish revolutionaries in America and Ireland was maintained.

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Among the documents is a message sent by Dr. von Kuehlmann, the German foreign minister, to the German embassy in Madrid, regarding the assignment to a German agent in Buenos Aires to establish communications with Ireland and cooperate with Sinn Fein leaders in the matter of the subject of smuggling arms into Ireland from America and from Argentina, as well as direct from Germany, either by the raider Mowse or by submarine.

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MASTERS' PEACE URGED The government's report reprints messages from the German-Irish society of Berlin to Field Marshal von Hindenburg, wishing for a "masterful" German peace.

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The white paper concludes with additional messages from Wilhelmstrasse to the German government, dated July 31, 1918, signed "Jahneke," reports that an Irish secret lodge in New York had offered the services of its branch lodges in Argentina and Brazil, adding:

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R. A. BOOTH IS TO DONATE MEMORIAL TO CIRCUIT RIDER

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The memory of the pioneer ministers of Oregon is to be perpetuated through an equestrian statue representing "The Circuit Rider." The statue is to be presented to the state by Robert A. Booth, of the state highway commission, in recognition of the services of a body of men who had much to do in the building of Oregon and in the inculcation of American ideals on the Pacific coast and of which class his father, the Rev. Robert Booth, was a distinguished representative.

Some months ago Booth commissioned a sculptor, Proctor, to design a statue of a pioneer minister, and the work of the sculptor has advanced to the stage of concrete form and will be ready to unveil in a year or so.

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The offer of the memorial to the state is to be made through Governor Olcott, who will be asked to appoint a committee of citizens to designate the place where it is to be located. No sectarian significance is to be attached to the memorial, but it is to be a monument to the pioneer ministers of the gospel who as circuit riders became the friends, counselors and evangelists to the pioneers on every American frontier, and who so largely shaped the thought of our citizens and shaped the course of our civilization and who, in their last and possibly their best work, were instrumental in determining the boundaries of the Oregon country.

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"The sacrifices they so joyfully made for their fellow men, their unflinching loyalty to the principles of our republic and their ringing proclamation of a brotherhood defining the loftiest standard of human action have been an inspiration to all who have followed in their footsteps."
