

## COUNTY RECEIPTS TOTAL \$433,536 FOR LAST YEAR

Balance on Hand December 31  
Was \$161,694; Circuit Fees  
Are Chief Source of Income.

According to a statement compiled by the county clerk's office the total receipts of the county for 1920 were \$433,536. This added to a balance on hand January 1, 1920, gives a total of \$603,670. On December 31, 1920, the balance on hand was \$161,694.

The following turnovers had been made to the state: For anglers and hunter licenses and migratory game, \$2597; to the federal government for declarations of intention and petitions for citizenship, \$1197; to the county treasurer, \$106,075. The turnover to the law library was \$2734. Earned court fees amounted to \$40,532 and rebates on litigation \$285,828.

A comparative statement of fees earned by the county clerk's office for the past four years shows a total carrying for the period of \$406,461. By years the figures are as follows: 1917, \$88,505; 1918, \$89,529; 1919, \$119,829; 1920, \$114,607.

799. The average was \$101,816 per year. The principal source of fees is from circuit court litigation and the recording of deeds and other instruments. Comparing these items the amount of circuit court fees earned in 1920 was \$28,663 as against \$35,209 in 1919. For recording the fees in 1920 were \$44,018, as compared with \$38,172 in 1919. In 1917 the fees earned in the circuit court were \$22,340 as against \$29,999 in 1918. Recording in 1917 yielded only \$24,298 and in 1918 \$26,291. The statement for 1920 follows: Circuit court earned fees \$28,663; declarations of intentions, \$741; petitions for citizenship, \$854; interest on bank balances, \$2577; probate court earned fees, \$11,889; Torrens, \$440; recording, \$44,018; recording marginals, \$1515; miscellaneous earned fees, \$14,208; dog licenses, \$1248; migratory game, \$2597; circuit court library fees, \$4450; probate court, \$1806; hunters' licenses, \$795 combination licenses, \$399.

## \$50,000 IS ASKED FOR FOREST WORK

Recreational Value of Outdoors  
Would Be Exploited if Congress Should Pass Bill.

Effort is being made to secure a congressional appropriation of \$50,000 for the development of public recreational camp grounds along scenic highways in the national forests of the United States, according to a message received by W. J. Hoffmann, president of the Pacific Northwest Tourist association, from Senator Charles L. McNary, who said that Forester W. B. Greeley had made the request of the house committee having to do with funds for the maintenance and improvement of national forests.

McNary said that should the house committee fail to include the appropriation in its bill, he will offer it as an amendment to the bill in the senate agricultural committee, of which he is a member.

The Rev. John M. Skinner, D. D., of Stockton, Cal., has been invited to visit Spokane to look over the field with a view to the presidency of Whitworth college.

### Unitarian Secretary To Come to Coast

Following the apportionment of the \$2,300,000 subscribed by Unitarians for the expansion of the religious and educational programs of the church, Carl E. Wetherell, field secretary of the Unitarian Laymen's league, will visit the Pacific coast for four months. From headquarters in Berkeley he will carry on the work in California cities and in Portland, Salem, Eugene, Seattle, Spokane, Tacoma, Olympia and Bellingham.

### House Eliminates Air Mail Service

Washington, Jan. 8.—(U. P.)—After eliminating a \$1,125,000 appropriation for the air mail service, the house today passed the postoffice appropriation bill carrying a total of \$572,764,721.
