WEATHER CONDITIONS
Low pressure prevails from Western Canada southward over the Plains states and Eastern Rocky Mountain slopes. The remainder of the country is covered by two great areas of high pressure, one central on the North Atlantic coast and the other on the Northern coast of California. Precipitation has occurred on the middle and north Pacific slope, and in Oklahoma, Missouri, Pennsylvania, Maryland and the District of Columbia. It is falling in Michigan, Ohio, Indiana, weather prevails east of the Mississippi river and in Western Canada and the North Pacific coast. While in the Middle West there has been a decided rise in temperature.

Southeastern storm warnings were ordered at 7:40 a. m. at all stations on the North Pacific coast. A storm approaching the mouth of the Columbia river is expected to cause moderate to fresh south shifting to southwest gales on the coast this afternoon and tonight.
Relative humidity at Portland: Noon yesterday, 52 per cent; 5 p. m. yesterday, 73 per cent; 9 a. m. today, 89 per cent.
Precipitation since January 1: Total, 5.32 inches; normal, 2.91 inches.

Would Abolish Commission—The Housewives' council at its meeting Tuesday afternoon passed a resolution asking for the abolition of the Oregon public service commission, the resolution pointing out that, although established for the purpose of protecting the public from the unreasonable and unjust exactions of public utility corporations and costing the people of Oregon more than \$100,000 biennially, the benefits during the past several years have not equaled the disadvantages and burdens resulting from acts of the commission. Mrs. E. W. Elwell presented the resolution. Mr. J. C. Othman is president of the council.

Express Methods to Be Discussed—Officials and agents of the American Railway Express company gathered in the green room of the Oregon building Tuesday afternoon to discuss "The Right Way Plan" of handling express shipments. Officials of the company are planning an extensive program of education among the express workers as to the proper way of handling express shipments. At the same time an educational campaign will be put on for the public on "Start Shipments Right."

Solution of Timber Problem Is Seen in Hardwood Forests

Solution of the commercial timber problem lies in the tropical and hardwood forests, declared A. F. Fisher, director of the Philippine forest service, who spent Tuesday in Portland. These hardwoods, of several hundred varieties, are valuable not only as timber but because of their by-products, including rattans, copra and camphor. The trees reach commercial size much sooner than the conifers.

Fisher has been spending a year in the United States visiting the different forest service districts, forestry schools and scientific bodies. He is working on a system of exchange of Filipino and United States foresters for mutual broadening of knowledge.

Fisher left the forest service office this morning for Denver.
