Sutherland To Get Trial With Tigers

Illinois Pastors to Oppose Boxing and Racing Measures

Chicago, Jan. 13.—(U. N. S.)—On the ground that it would tend to further lower the moral standard, prominent pastors in attendance at the Methodist Episcopal church conference here Wednesday declared they will vigorously oppose efforts to revise horse racing and prize fighting in Illinois.

The state legislature, now in session, has been asked to consider two bills. One is the "red blood" bill calling for 20-round bouts with five ounce gloves; the other is the "pillow fight" bill which would allow five round fights and eight-ounce gloves.

"I am opposed to gloves of any kind," said Rev. C. A. Kelly of Chicago. "Boxing develops the fighting instinct and causes brutality."

"Horse racing must never again be tolerated in this state," said Rev. E. M. Antrim, district superintendent of the Methodist Episcopal church, located at Springfield, said he "deplored any tendency to lower moral standards which have been steadily falling since the war."

Coast Stars Are Barred From Minors

CHICAGO, Jan. 13.—(U. N. S.)—Inter-league views with baseball magnates promise to be as scarce in the future as the Kaiser's friends.

Besides signing the new national agreement under which Judge K. M. Landis will administer the affairs of organized baseball for seven years, the individual major league club owners likewise signed, at their meeting here, an agreement not to criticize each other publicly or to talk about one another and to accept any decision Judge Landis renders regardless of their personal opinion of it. Ban Johnson, president of the American league, and John Heydler, head of the National, signed this agreement.

EARLY TRIAL FOR SOX
With the national agreement drawn up and duly ratified, plans for an early trial of the ball players under indictment for conspiracy to "throw" the 1919 World Series to Cincinnati were being formulated today. George Gorman, assistant state's attorney, who will direct the prosecution, said he expected to bring the indicted players to trial by February 1. It is Gorman's desire and the desire of the heads of baseball to have the trials completed before the opening of the baseball season.

Most of the magnates had departed from Chicago today, as the business of the big meetings in session here since Monday has been virtually completed. The single business remaining is the promulgation of a new set of drafting rules and this is to be attended to by a committee of major and minor leaguers which will meet today. The new international league and the American association will not submit to the draft but under the new agreement they are not compelled to. They are barred, however, from drafting from any league of lower classification. The draft will prevail, it is understood, in other minor league matters.

DRAFT SET BACK
Formal signing of the new national agreement by the National association (the minor league body) is yet to take place but as the minors have voted concurrence in the agreement the signing is a matter of formality only. M. H. Sexton and J. H. Farrell will represent the minors on the advisory board.

While the general agreement is to be in effect for 25 years the minors subscribe to it only during the time that Judge Landis holds office. He has a current in the agreement in case of his removal or death before his term expires, however, they will be free from the pact's provisions.

The agreement provides that the majors will draft from October 15 to 20, while the minors will do business after October 22. Drafting was formerly done in September.

Baseball news was popping all day at the Congress hotel, where the ball clubs have gathered.

It was reported that the White Sox had offered \$30,000 to the Baltimore club for Pitcher Bailey, outfielder Jacobson and shortstop Bohling.

Next it was said that Fred Mitchell of the Braves had offered Maranville to New York for three players. Later Pittsburgh offered four players for Maranville and Mitchell.

MUST SHOW CAUSE
Joe Benz, former White Sox pitcher, who is after a big league coaching job, was given his unconditional release.

The National association of minor leaguers has passed a rule which permits teams to carry 40 men between August 1 and May 15, but only 25 men between May 15 and August 15.

An appropriation of \$10,000 was approved by the American league teams to hire a special prosecutor to assist the state's attorney in pressing criminal charges against the indicted White Sox players.

The major leagues voted to increase their player limit from 40 in the winter time, with a limit of 35 after May 15. This will enable the clubs to carry five more men on their rolls during the off-season. After August 1 no transfers of players will be allowed in the majors.

The minor leagues took action with regard to players Rummel, Maggert and Borton, members of Pacific Coast league clubs accused of dishonesty and gambling, by permanently barring them from playing with any minor league club. The board of arbitration of the minors will serve notice on all players who have participated in games in California with Fred McMullin, indicted White Sox player, that they must show cause why they should not be punished for playing with a discredited athlete. In the future any players in organized ball who play in games with a discredited player will be severely punished.

Jack Could Have Beaten Best Boxing Body Carpentier Has a Chance--But

NEW YORK, Jan. 13.—(U. N. S.)—"Jack Dempsey could have whipped the best of the old-time heavyweights. He is in a class by himself."

"George Carpentier has a chance with the champion, if he is what they claim. But Dempsey looks like a winner to me if they ever meet."

Here is the opinion of a veteran man who has seen most of the good ones. Meet up with William A. Tremblay of Miles City, Mont., delegate to the National Boxing convention.

SAW JIM BEAT JOHN
"Straightaway Bill," as Tremblay is known in his home town, is qualified to speak. He was at the ringside when Sullivan lost to Corbett in New Orleans. He saw Corbett and Fitzsimmons at Carson City; Jeffries and Johnson at Reno; LaBianche and "Nonpareil" Jack Dempsey; Lavigne and Walcott and many others. He is the man who discovered and brought out the late Stanley Ketchel. Born at Ogdensburg, N. Y., in 1885, he speaks with the wisdom of long experience. He went in for sport while in his teens. He was a welterweight boxer in the "skin-games" days. He played ball against the old Cincinnati Red Stockings at Ogdensburg in 1875 when A. G. Spaulding and Harry Wright were with those famous old-time teams. But boxing is his hobby. Let him tell you about Dempsey.

NONE COMPARE
"Dempsey could have beaten any of the old champions as I see it," says Tremblay. "His cyclonic style, his love of a fight and the power of his punches at short range put him in a class by himself. I've seen most of the good ones, but none can compare with him. Ketchel, whom I brought out in conjunction with

Tremblay was largely instrumental in securing legalized boxing for Montana, where they now have a law permitting 15-round bouts to decisions. He is the official appointee of Governor Stewart to the boxing convention. When at home he serves as a deputy collector of the internal revenue service.

Jimmy Wilde Will Box Herman Tonight

London, Jan. 13.—(U. N. S.)—The 20 round fight tonight between Battling Levinsky, an American heavyweight, and Bombardier Willie, an Englishman, has been postponed for three weeks on account of an injury sustained by Levinsky today. One of the American's arms was hurt in an accident. The Levinsky bout will take place on a semi-final to the Jimmy Wilde-Pete Herman fight.

London, Jan. 13.—(U. N. S.)—England was confident today Jimmy Wilde, king of the flyweights, and her own world's champion, will defeat Pete Herman tonight when they meet in Albert hall in a 20-round contest. Odds of 6 to 4 were being offered that the American will lose.

Wilde was resting today, but Herman had to do a little light work to keep down his weight. According to the agreement he must make 113 pounds. Wilde will scale about 112 pounds.

The announcement of the British board of boxing control that it could not proclaim the bantamweight title at stake until more details of the Lynch-Herman fight are procured from New York to the boxing convention, has not dampened the hopes of the British that Wilde would annex another title, but it did not detract from the interest in the fight.

Seventeen states approve all the articles and have affiliated themselves with the National Boxing association.

New York and Massachusetts, not liking the looks of "article III," have decided to stay without the league.

The league can function without them and the league is going to function, the leaders say.

New York feels that "article III" would deprive the great state of its independence by the provision that "acceptance of membership by this association shall bind such member to abide by all the conditions as set forth and accept and enforce all decisions of the board of directors. Any violation of the constitution shall render such member liable to suspension."

Joseph Johnson, chairman of the New York commission, pronounced that the great state cannot become subservient to any other state or state and that it prefers, in so many words, to run its own business.

New York didn't get a berth on the list of officers, which includes: Walter H. Liginer, Wisconsin, president; W. A. Tremblay, Montana; B. T. Burke, New Orleans; E. A. McCauley, Michigan, and William A. Rocap, Pennsylvania, vice-presidents; Tex O'Rourke, secretary-treasurer.
