

WOMAN WAITS PASTOR TO BREAK HER 46 DAY FAST

Eldorado, Ill., Jan. 13.—(U. P.)—Rev. G. S. Payne, minister of the Church of God, will go to Danville, Ill., immediately and plead with Mrs. Sadie Harrington, now in the forty-eighth day of her hunger fast to force her husband to join the church, to give up the fast and take food.

Arrangements for the trip to Danville were made by the United Press today after locating Rev. Mr. Payne when a nationwide search by friends and relatives of Mrs. Harrington failed.

Mrs. Harrington said indicated that she would give up the fast if the Rev. Mr. Payne advised her to do so, and has been pleading for him since she started the hunger strike.

"I will go to Danville immediately," Rev. Mr. Payne said today, when informed that Mrs. Harrington said she needed him. "I will pray with her and urge her to give up her fast. The Church of God does not sanction such fasts to obtain conversions."

HUBBY SLEEPS ON MEAT BLOOMS AS WIFE PRAYS

Danville, Ill., Jan. 13.—(U. P.)—Mrs. Sadie Harrington, now on the forty-sixth day of her hunger fast to force her husband, Ernle Harrington, to join the Church of God, pleaded for the Rev. G. S. Payne to come to her at once when informed today that the United Press had located the minister.

"For God's sake, send him," she said when the news was carried to her by her nurse.

Mrs. Harrington indicated she would break her fast if the Rev. Payne advised her to do so after the two had prayed together.

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Cops Have to Pay for Clocks Pass the Plate, But No Use

When a policeman looks up at one of the Western Union clocks in the Central station, he sees more than the time of day. He sees the four bits, or whatever his annual quota may be, to pay for its presence there.

Some growl about it, others are merely cynical and some jovially consider it a good joke with even odds as to whether it is on them or the city. The fact remains that the policemen pay \$40 a year for clocks which are as essentially part of the equipment of the station as the brass buttons on the uniforms. Lieutenant Harvey Thatcher, guardian of the doughnut squad, admitted that under pressure Tuesday night.

There are five Western Union clocks in the police station, only one of which is provided by the city. This one is in the telephone office at central headquarters. The other four are paid for by the men of the departments in which they are located.

"Ernie still holds out in his sinful way; O Lord, tell me what else I may do to make him see the light," was his fearful prayer, according to the nurse and worker in the Church of God.

HUSBAND LOOKS BAD

"I've fasted 46 days and Ernle is still as bad as ever," Mrs. Harrington told Sister Ada.

"The Lord has fed me on spiritual manna this far and I know he will continue to take care of me."

The fasting woman was never feeling better since her fast than today, according to Sister Ada and other Church of God members who visited her.

"It's a miracle how she stands it," they said. "But look at Ernle; he's the one that looks bad."

"They were right, too, for Ernle has a wan, worried and haunted look."

"NO REST FOR WICKED"

Ernie Harrington, who is now hailed as the new white hope of Danville since he laid a camera man and a reporter low with his trusty right, is "fed up" with the whole affair.

The burly and recalcitrant husband let forth a mighty squawk against things in general this morning as he was trimming fat from a leg of mutton in his butcher shop.

"Last night was the first time since I have been married that I did not go home to sleep," he said. "There's no rest for the wicked, I guess. They are always singing and praying around my house, so they won't let a hard-working man sleep. I got tired of it last night, and I had a good eight hours' sleep on two nice soft meat blocks I shoved together in the back of the store."

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SOMEbody IN THE DALLES GETS A GLAND

The Dalles, Jan. 13.—A "goat gland" operation was performed at The Dalles hospital Sunday on a prominent business man of this city by Dr. J. A. Reuter, who recently returned from the East, where he studied this work. He reported that the operation was apparently entirely successful. Only a local anesthetic was used by the surgeon and the patient was able to leave the hospital a short time after the operation was completed.
