

INAUGURAL TALK TO BE COMPLETED EARLY NEXT MONTH

Marion, Ohio, Jan. 13.—(I. N. S.)—President-elect Harding plans to complete the rough draft of his inaugural address the first week in February, it was announced today. He has given close study recently to the pronouncements made by each of the former presidents on taking office and has collected a mass of data bearing on the problems which will face his own administration.

It also became known today that he expects to announce the appointment and acceptance of at least two members of his cabinet within the next 10 days. Representation from New England in the cabinet, it is said, was a subject of discussion today between the president-elect and Governor Livingston Beekman of Rhode Island.

Governor Beekman's visit took on added significance when it became known that Senator Weeks of Massachusetts is expected to confer with Senator Harding before the end of this week. Senator Weeks has been regarded as one of the men most prominently in mind for secretary of war of the navy.

Mrs. Ogden Reid of New York, who was closely connected with the work of the Republican national committee during the campaign, and Governor Beekman breakfasted with Senator and Mrs. Harding this morning.

His bitterest fight occurred in the international labor conference held in Europe two years ago when he came into contact with the radical labor element more highly organized than it is on this side of the water.

Vanderlip Submits Report Regarding Deal With Russians

Washington, Jan. 13.—Washington D. Vanderlip, whose purported concessions in Eastern Siberia have attracted worldwide attention, has submitted to Acting Secretary of State Davis a memorandum setting forth the intentions of the so-called "Vanderlip syndicate." Vanderlip's presence in Washington had been little known. He registered under the name of "Van Ness" and 10 minutes before he was to depart for California Wednesday informed newspaper writers by telephone that he would have a statement for them. Someone had removed the numeral "7" from the room he occupied, "207," leaving the letters "20" to confuse visitors. Vanderlip's statement to Davis was in part a reply to criticisms.

MURDER LINKED WITH GAMBLING DEN IN HAVANA

Havana, Cuba, Jan. 13.—(U. P.)—The murder of Walter J. Shannon of St. Louis has focused attention on the orgy of gambling in this city, which has surpassed Monte Carlo as the gaming center of the world.

Friends of Shannon, who is believed to have been killed by a taxi driver for his roulette winnings at the Grand Casino, were planning today to ask American Minister Long to appeal to the Cuban government for a federal investigation.

The mutilated body of Shannon, who was a ticket agent for the Peninsular and Occidental Steamship company, was found on the beach near the Grand Casino.

The Grand Casino, which is operated under a concession and practically has a monopoly on the particular type of gaming it conducts, is frequented nightly by hundreds of men and women. The rich fittings of the place and the formal attire of the "guests" gives it an air of social distinction.

The roulette wheels, of which there are usually four to six in constant play, furnish the most popular form of gambling. It is estimated that the play averages \$50,000 nightly and on Saturday and Sunday evenings two or three times that amount. On one occasion the president of a Havana bank is reported to have lost \$87,000 at one sitting. One prominent sugar planter is understood to have dropped \$400,000 at the wheel, last spring.

A statement issued by the census bureau declares the trend of population from the country to the city is shown in the 1920 census figures and that of the total population of the United States 54,314,476 are living in urban territory and 51,394,295 in rural districts.
