

FOUR STEAMSHIPS SAIL WITH GRAIN, LUMBER CARGOES

Four offshore carriers finished loading in Portland today and cleared foreign. The four vessels loaded 15,744 net tons, Lloyds register, and carried wheat, flour and lumber. For Shanghai and Japanese ports the Japanese steamship Tenpansan Maru cleared early in the day with 1,709,654 feet of lumber valued at \$40,800. She is owned by the Mitsui company and was loaded by A. O. Anderson & Co.

Following the Japanese steamship the Mobile City of New York left for the United Kingdom. The Lilly line finished with 149,323 bushels of wheat, valued at \$25,866 for London and 1612 bales of hops, valued at \$94,755, also for London. The Mobile City had on a part cargo loaded on Pugsan sound for the United Kingdom. The steamship Osaquamsic, American steamship, under charter to the Pacific grain company, finished with 276,336 bushels of wheat valued at \$470,000 for the United Kingdom. The steamship Pomona carried a mixed cargo of wheat and flour and will proceed to two ports, London and Hamburg. The cargo consists of 66,600 bushels of wheat, valued at \$113,220, declared by the Pacific Grain company; 1200 barrels of flour, valued at \$146,725; both shipments of cereal for London. For Hamburg there is on board the Pomona 1210 barrels of flour with a valuation of \$9076 and consigned to the American Rice society at London. Total valuations of grain shipments for the day amount to \$1,086,842. The lumber shipments across the Pacific amount to \$40,800.

O. A. C. STUDENTS TO SEE PORT ENGINEERING WORKS

Clark Ellsworth, well known among steambot men of Portland and Seattle, died recently in Utica, N. Y., according to word received by Mr. and Mrs. Charles W. Zanker of 118 1/2 First street. Ellsworth came to Portland during the Klondike gold rush and was for a time steward on the T. J. Potter. He is survived by his wife and one sister, both living in New York state.

The regular monthly meeting of the dock commission has been called for tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock. The steamship Cape Henry is booked for the full cargo of sulphur at the terminal at the dock commission. She is taking the place of the steamship Dewey, which discharged sulphur at San Francisco and was sent to the bonafire at Vallejo. The McCormick line steamer Multnomah sailed from San Francisco for Portland yesterday and will arrive Saturday morning. She has passengers and general cargo. The steamer Wapama, Portland for San Pedro, was reported in at the Callahan pier yesterday afternoon. The steamer Egeria, homeward bound from her maiden trip to Australia, has sailed from Honolulu and will arrive at the mouth of the river about February 5.

SHIP CREW DRIFTS ON SEA 3 MONTHS

(By Universal Service)
 San Francisco, Jan. 26.—A drift on the high seas for three months with scant food supplies and battered about by severe storms in a derelict dismantled craft, is the harrowing experience of a crew of sailors aboard the schooner Diana, according to advices received here.
 Given up for lost several months ago, the battered craft and her crew of 17 starving sailors have in sight of the Island of Guam in the Mid Pacific last week, where they finally found a haven and are now being nourished to health. The Diana sailed from Vladivostok for Seattle last June. Off the Bering sea she was hit by a storm which cleared her decks of masts and rigging. Drifting aimlessly on the high seas, the little craft was swept out of the regular steamer and sailing lanes of commerce. Her provisions quickly became exhausted and several of her crew died from lack of food.
 For the past month the dismantled craft was washed along by ocean currents until she reached Guam.
 Those aboard the vessel were mere skeletons, and displayed every evidence of their suffering.

BILL WOULD HALT UNFAIRNESS IN WHEAT DISCOUNT

Pendleton, Or., Jan. 26.—Elimination of unfairness in wheat grading, whereby the farmer in wheat state is discounted heavily if his wheat does not weigh up to a certain standard set by wheat buyers, is the object of a bill drawn in Pendleton in the interests of wheat farmers, which will be presented to the state legislature within the next few days.
 Amendment of the terminal warehouse bill of 1917, to provide that no discount be made on account of the test weight per bushel of grain as delivered by the farmer, providing that it weighs 58 pounds or more, is the main feature, for under the present law, wheat that weighs as much as 59.8 pounds per bushel is graded as No. 2 and discounted 3 cents. The present grading system stipulates that wheat must weigh 60 pounds per bushel before it can be graded as No. 1, and most wheat raised in Oregon is of the soft variety and does not weigh up to the present standard.
 Absolving of discounts is not the purpose of the bill, according to the authors, but only a more accurate and fairer basis for the fixing of discount figures by law is desired, instead of the present method of discounting set by the wheat buyers. Schedule on wheat grades as provided in the bill drawn is as follows:
