

CHANGE OF VENUE IN JACKSONVILLE CASES INTIMATED

Motion Filed by Indicted Vice President of Defunct Bank Before Court; Prejudice Urged

Medford, Or., Jan. 29.—On a motion filed in circuit court at Jacksonville Saturday by attorneys for R. D. Hines, asking a change of venue, it develops there is a strong probability of all the many indictments growing out of the Bank of Jacksonville failure, may be tried either in Josephine, Douglas or Klamath county.

When Judge Calkins intimated that he would grant the change of venue and that if he did he would transfer the trial to Douglas or Klamath county, because of the bank failure, and County Prosecutor Rawles Moore all declared their preference for Josephine county. Judge Calkins said that if Josephine county was selected the case would go over until the April term and that he would appoint Judge Hamilton to try it.

The change of venue was asked on the ground of prejudice existing in the Jacksonville county community and that each taxpayer of the county was directly interested in the case through the county funds on deposit having been lost in the bank failure and therefore was disqualified from serving as a juror.

Prosecutor Moore entered a perfunctory objection to the motion and asked to be given until Tuesday to determine whether he would enter further objection.

If a change of venue is granted in the case of Hines, who was vice president of the bank, it means that all the other bank failure indictments will also be tried elsewhere than Jackson county.

Yakima, Wash., Jan. 29.—Yakima continued its policy of creating work for the unemployed by letting a contract for paving 32,000 square yards of streets to the Yakima Paving company on a bid of \$112,827. Work is to begin in 10 days.

CLUB YOUNGSTERS MAKE BIG PROFITS

Total Production of 612 Organizations Is \$111,584.60, and Expenses Only Half.

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Jan. 29.—A total production amounting to \$111,584.60 was reported by the 612 Boys' and Girls' clubs in Oregon last year. That the boys and girls themselves realized a profit of \$55,942 of this amount is included in an announcement by H. C. Seymour, state leader of boys' and girls' club work, at Oregon Agricultural college.

Of the 612 clubs organized last year, 256 finished as standard clubs, were granted charters and will be awarded gold seals by the United States department of agriculture.

Selling calves seemed to be the most profitable business selected. Profits amounted to \$15,883.21, while the pig growers realized \$10,125.69. Divided by projects, the profits of the other clubs were as follows:

Garden, \$6834.80; poultry, \$5617.73; potato, \$4243.09; corn, \$2486.37; cooking, \$2255.02; sewing, \$2255.13; rabbit, \$2219.29; sheep, \$657.50; home-making, \$453.49; canning, \$284.93. One group, which sold goat milk, earned \$192.86.

The city of Portland and five counties of Oregon employ full-time, salaried county leaders. These counties are Clackamas, Multnomah, Douglas, Malheur and Klamath.

In Multnomah county, not including Portland, 75 per cent of the clubs were finished, in Malheur county 84 per cent, in Clackamas 73 per cent, in Douglas 74 per cent, in Klamath 74 per cent, showing a marked increase over last year.

Railroad Line Has Been Extended to Near Grand Ronde

Williamina, Jan. 29.—Despite the fact that few men are at present employed by the Spaulding Lumber company in construction work on the Williamina & Grand Ronde railroad, the line has been extended to within three miles of Grand Ronde. Unfavorable weather has also

been a big handicap.

The Williamina water mains, paralleling the railroad, which were threatened by a big slide, a mile from town, are leaking. The highway has been kept in good shape in spite of the slides and mail service is going ahead without recent interruptions.

Sisters-in-Law in Custody Charged With Beating Bill

Dallas, Jan. 29.—Sheriff John W. Orr left Friday night for Grants Pass to bring back Mrs. Gladys Lucas and Mrs. Amy Lucas, sisters-in-law, who were taken off a Southern Pacific train by officers there at Orr's request. The women arrived in this country about three months ago from England and Australia, respectively, and went to the home of their father-in-law, J. E. Lucas, near Buena Vista, to await the arrival of their husbands, who were expected to reach San Francisco soon from a trip around the world.

Shortly after their arrival here Lucas' home burned and since then the women have been boarding at the home of E. M. Lichty, a neighbor. Thursday they left for San Francisco to meet their husbands, leaving it is alleged by Lichty, an unpaid board bill of more than \$200. He filed a complaint against the women in justice court here Friday.

Mrs. Clara Edwards of Williamina, who alleges that she was injured and that her automobile was wrecked when she drove the car off a bridge in the northern part of the county, has brought suit in the circuit court here against Polk county for \$186.26 damages. She alleges that the accident was due to a defective railing on the bridge.

Mrs. Mary Hughes, aged nearly 70 years, died at her home in this city Monday. She had been a resident of Dallas for many years, and is survived by her husband, Isaac Hughes, and the following children: John Hughes, Mrs. George Loftus and Mrs. Roy McMurphy of Falls City; Morris, Wilbur and Pearl Hughes of Dallas.

Court Again to Hear Trial of Elk Slayer

Yakima, Wash., Jan. 29.—The question of whether or not a farmer is justified in killing an elk for breaking into his corn field will be tried for the third time in the case against J. S. Burke, a Poma farmer, who killed a bull and a cow elk, and was convicted and fined for violation of the state game laws. The supreme court reversed the court as to admission of Burke's evidence of justification. The elk meat was confiscated and served at a banquet held for the State Sportsmen's association.

Contract Let for One of Connecting Links of Highway

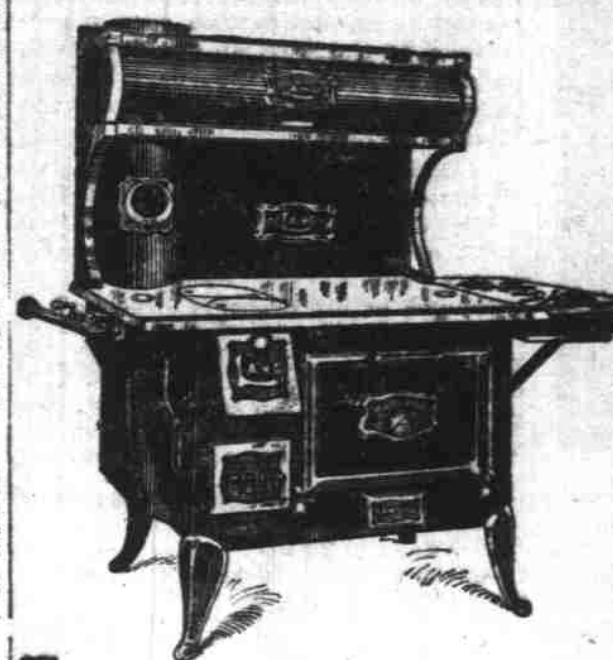
Marshfield, Jan. 29.—One of the connecting links in what will be an important coast highway was started when the county court let the contract for the grading of a stretch of road extending from Glasgow, opposite North Bend, north to connect with a road which leads to Houser. From the latter place the forestry department plans to build a road to Reedsport. The county this year will put in a ferry from North Bend to Glasgow, which will give a highway from this section to Reedsport on the Umpqua river. The contract was let to Kiechler, Padrick & Weber.

Christ Lovas and Cyrus Steckel are new members of the council and W. L. Walker was appointed councilman to fill a vacancy.
