Engineers to Get Pay—Members of Company A, engineers, Oregon National Guard, will assemble at the Armory Wednesday night for the first pay-day. Pay vouchers totaling over \$1000 will be issued for the drill and school duty. The command of the company will temporarily be taken by First Lieutenant Myron L. Sharp during the three-point training course. Captain George E. Sandy is to attend at Camp Humphreys, Va. A feature of the Wednesday drill will be the instructions by Sergeant Instructor James Eubanks of the Fourth engineers, regular, from Camp Lewis.

Held to Grand Jury—Pete Richen, proprietor of the soft-drink establishment in the St. Charles hotel, and F. J. Cassidy, bartender, were held to answer to the federal grand jury Monday afternoon by United States Commissioner Fraser. Government revenue officers testified to taking samples of hard cider and fermented grape juice out of the place on January 18, which tested 8 and 8 per cent alcohol respectively. Each man was released on bond.

To Perfect Appeal—Fred Peterson, alias Swede Whitey, convicted in the recent War Savings Stamp trial in the federal court, was allowed 60 days more Monday afternoon in which to perfect his bill of exceptions and file his appeal. Peterson was sentenced to two years at McNeil Island by Judge Wollerton. He is alleged to have handled altered War Savings Stamps which were stolen from the bank at Seilo.

Leave for Europe—William B. Follett, former state commander of the American Legion, accompanied by Mrs. Follett, left Portland Saturday for a tour through the East and Southern Europe. After visiting Mrs. Follett's father in Florida and her sister in Washington, the itinerary will include tours through Southern France, Italy and Switzerland.

M. E. CHURCH WILL RAISE FUND FOR COMMUNITY HOUSE

By unanimous vote of the official board of Centenary-Wilbur Methodist church Monday night a motion was passed to proceed at once with plans for raising \$75,000 to assure the building of a modern Sunday school and community house on land adjoining the church, and also for the remodeling of the present house of worship at East Ninth and Pine streets.

The official board recently purchased a lot adjoining the church. The recent union of the two churches has resulted in a crowded condition in both the Sunday school and preaching services, so that the departure at this time was considered imperative. The plans for remodeling the church auditorium include the redecoration of the interior, installation of electric lights and rebuilding of the pipe organ. Actual building operations will be deferred for a short time.

Dr. Frank L. Wemett, pastor, was jubilant over prospects this morning. "When I came here from Idaho Falls a short time ago," he said, "I at once saw the opportunity for a larger program. The recent happy amalgamation of the two Methodist Episcopal societies providentially makes this plan for a larger work possible."
