\$474,870,714 Paid Railroads in 1920

 Washington, March 11.—Total payments to railroads under the transportation act of 1920 now total \$474,870,714, the treasury department announced Thursday. Of this amount \$185,516,317 is loans, under the \$300,000,000 revolving fund. The remainder is for deficits incurred while the federal guarantee was in operation.

French Fighter Proves to Be An Actor

FOLLOWERS of the film drama, as well as devotees of the prize ring were pleased and entertained at the Heilig theatre Thursday with the opening exhibition of "The Wonder Man," in which Georges Carpentier, noted French soldier and pugilist, is the star character. Carpentier, seen as a typical man-about-town, equally at ease in full dress regalia or fighting togs, is an actor who might have to be reckoned with if he chose the screen as his special vocation. And, although "The Wonder Man" is an American society drama, it is the conveyor of the information the fight fans of the country have been waiting for. It is a picture which, besides furnishing entertainment, gives a perfect "close-up" of Carpentier, the man, and Carpentier, who became heavyweight champion of Europe by his defeat of Joe Beckett in London, lives up to the very favorable reports that have been circulated concerning him. In the anticlimax of the picture he appears in a four round fight with the villain, Robert Barra, an actor with boxing ability, and showed a physique and ring generalship which explains why noted fight fans are willing to bet on his chances of besting Dempsey.

Presidents' Council Urges Retention of Postmaster Jones

A resolution indirectly condemning the effort to oust Postmaster John M. Jones, who is a civil service appointee, in order to give the job to some politician, has been adopted by the presidents' council of Portland's business and civic clubs and is being forwarded today to the various clubs for their ratification. The resolution reads as follows: "We, the presidents' council of Portland's business and civic clubs, believing thoroughly in the principle of rewarding merit and careful efficiency in public service by advance in public service, do hereby go on record as in favor of the preservation and extension of civil service, and express our especial satisfaction in the working of that principle as demonstrated in the Portland postoffice, and declare it to be our fervent wish that the present high efficiency of that office be in no way disturbed, and that its present organization and personnel be maintained."
 An informal vote on the part of the heads of the clubs disclosed greater favor for a school building tax of, say, 5 mills, than a bond issue.
