

CHINESE TALENT WILL CONTRIBUTE SERVICES FRIDAY

Comedy Act and Special Vocal and Instrumental Numbers to Be Given at Benefit for China.

The entertainment for the benefit of the starving Chinese, to be given at the Auditorium under the auspices of the Portland Chinese North China Relief society next Friday night, will feature local Chinese talent almost exclusively.

Miss Grace Y. Lee, graduate of Whitman college, will take a leading part in the comedy "Where But in America." Harold Fong, tenor, a student of Mrs. Fred L. Olson, will appear as a soloist and also in the male quartet. Clara and Edna Low, 8 and 10 years of age, daughters of Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Low, will play the piano. Frank Jue, a student at the University of Oregon and formerly of Washington high school, will sing.

SINGS IN CHOIR

Two new soloists for the university orchestra will sing at the First Baptist church at Eugene. Miss Ella Goon, daughter of Consul Goon Dip, a student at Lincoln high, will appear in an Oriental act. Both she and Harry Lee, another student of Lincoln high, will also be in "Where But in America."

Mrs. Olson and Miss Helen Harper, violinist, will assist. Tickets dated for Lincoln high school February 23, will be honored.

The statewide China-Near East relief workers are raising money through the sale of China life-saving stamps, printed in black and yellow and picturing an aged Chinese woman holding in her hands an empty bowl, beneath which is the inscription "Three cents saves a life for a day" and the motto "please help."

These stamps are being sold through Sunday schools, church organizations, juvenile societies, women's clubs and other agencies.

Near East leave-a-life stickers are also being sold in booklets, 49 one-dollar stickers to the book.

"The visualizing of contributions in terms of human life makes the appeal much stronger, especially to the children," said State Manager J. J. Handaker yesterday, "and we are already getting substantial returns from our stamp and sticker sales. Three cents a day will feed one starving Chinese and 45 will keep one of these alive until harvest. There are 10,000,000 children among the 45,000,000 starving people in the famine district of North China and every time a 'leave a life' stamp is sold it means that one of these will be assured of food for a day. With this realization keen in their consciousness, the children of the state are working hard through Sunday schools, church organizations and we hope for a splendid swelling of our fund from our stamp and sticker returns."

Purchasers of the stamps are asked to stick them on the backs of outgoing letters, additional publicity for the campaign being thus secured.

Man Wanted on Bad Check Charge Taken At Lost River Dam

Klamath Falls, Or., March 12.—Frank Rodriguez, wanted in this city on a charge of Lake county to face bad-check charges, was arrested Friday by Sheriff Low near Lost river dam. Rodriguez was previously captured by one of the Indian police, but escaped. He is said to have been staying with the Indians at night and hiding on Mount Stukol during the day. Although armed when captured, Rodriguez made no resistance, according to the sheriff.

Walla Walla Faces School Fund Vote

Walla Walla, Wash., March 12.—The Walla Walla board is facing the necessity of a special election to raise funds to make needed improvements on the school buildings of the city, due to the defeat of the school bond by the legislature. The present budget, made up as a result of a special election last year authorizing the district to levy a tax of 4.8 mills in excess of the legal 10-mill limit, has proven inadequate.

The Pelican Bay Lumber company will resume operations in the near future with a double shift of men. H. D. Morrison, president of the company, announced the capacity of the mill is 150,000 feet for eight hours.

HOME ECONOMICS BUILDING UNIT IS OPENED AT O. A. C.

Fashion Show and Many Interesting Exhibits Are Shown by Students Before Big Throngs.

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, March 12.—The practical and beautiful were combined with rare harmony in the big formal opening of the second unit of the home economics building at O. A. C. in the opinion of the thousands of students and townspeople who thronged the building on Friday and Saturday.

The show, which filled every room of both the new and the old units of the building, was declared to be the best of its kind ever attempted on the campus. Scores of graduates in the course returned for the opening.

"Fashion's Flower Garden" was the title of a fashion show given to five capacity audiences in the large new tea room on the third floor of the new unit. Coeds displayed marvelous sways of their own creation. The six acts, each featuring a different type of gown, were: "Roses," representing spring and summer frocks; "Carnations," tailored costumes; "Violets," simple house dresses; "Black-eyed Susans," suits; "Tulips," afternoon dress, and "Orchids," evening gowns.

A native Armenian rug weaver with a large exhibit of rugs, formed an interesting exhibit. "Ye Oide Curiosity Shop" was a room of antiques. Exhibits of coeds dispensing bits of their own handiwork, and model homes were shown. An exhibit of meat cutting, provided by the animal husbandry department of the college, a light and water system under charge of the farm mechanics department, and an exhibit room devoted to boys' and girls' club work, in charge of the extension department, were contributed by other departments.

A meeting of the home economics branch of the State Teachers' association, was held in connection with the show. Miss Marilla Dunning, a graduate of the department, is acting president of the association branch.

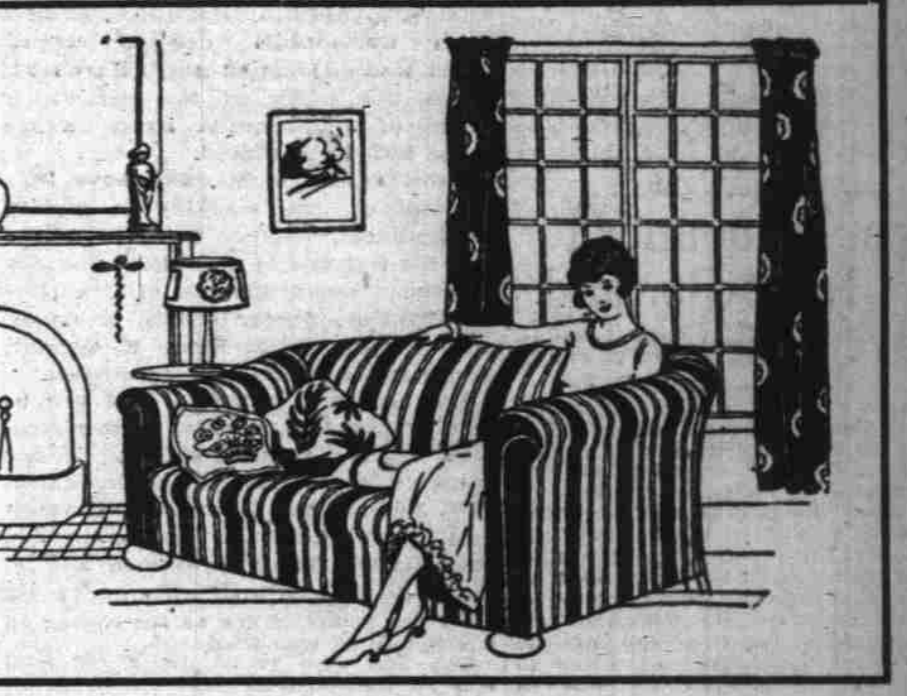
