

COMMITTEE OF 15 FILES FINANCIAL REPORT WITH CITY

The committee of fifteen filed with City Auditor Funk this morning its financial statement, referred to in its general report as exhibit 4.

"From this it will appear," says the statement attached, "that the total net expense, after transfer of personal property to the Port of Portland in accordance with the agreement between the undersigned and the city property custodian, was \$17,818.88. Therefore, the share of each of the contributing bodies, in accordance with the understanding, is \$5,939.63."

A summary of the report shows: Cash received: Commission of public docks, \$7500; Port of Portland commission, \$5460; City of Portland, \$1000; interest, \$750. Total expenses, \$18,228.25, of which the largest item is for personal services amounting to \$6223.51. Special expenses included initiative petitions, \$5558.01, and appraisal amounting to \$2111.95.

FIRE MARSHAL SEEKING CAUSE OF PECULIAR BLAZE

Fire Marshal Grenfell's office today is investigating a peculiar fire Thursday night at 544 Fourth street, a few minutes after the proprietor of this soft drink place, Edward P. Napoleon, closed the store for the night.

The fire started under a shelf back of the counter, among a lot of matches and empty boxes. The loss was about \$200. The place was insured for \$500, and the report at the fire marshal's office states that there was over-insurance on the contents of the place.

City Hall Briefs

The Portland Municipal Civil Service association will hold its monthly meeting in the council chamber Monday, April 11. Following the business session there will be an entertaining program.

The total cost of constructing the sewer in East Sixty-fifth street, from Hassalo to Willow streets, is \$1525.80. The assessment has been entered on the books of city liens and is now due and payable at the city treasurer's office.

A similar situation exists on the assessment of \$5742.35 for the sewer in East Eighteenth street, from Prescott to Emerson streets, the assessment of \$656 for the sewer in Willis boulevard, from Interstate avenue to Fenwick street, one of \$12,380 for the sewer in East Twenty-eighth street, from Woodstock avenue to Steel avenue, and one of \$139.35 for the sewer for the Klart street and Terwilliger boulevard sewer district.

Two Die of Sleeping Sickness

The city health bureau today received reports of two deaths from sleeping sickness within the last two days. This brings the total of such deaths since the first of 1921 to seven. After an illness of 18 days, Anell E. Staples, aged 48, died at 615 East Thirteenth street north Wednesday. The death on Thursday of Robert William Stubbs Jr., 562 Elm street, followed several days of illness.

Urgo Razing Building

Eleven signatures are attached to a petition filed at the city hall this morning, asking that the city council order the demolition of the old building at the corner of Fourteenth and Burnside streets. The petitioners say that the building, erected many years ago, is not fit for human habitation, is a fire menace, a breeding place for rats, and is generally detrimental to the neighborhood.

He unrolled the oiled paper from one stick. The core was made from an old broomstick, sawed into convenient lengths. Today is April 1.

Mayor Baker this morning appointed as a special committee to welcome to Portland the officers and crew of the training ship, U. S. N. Eagle boat No. 38; Commissioner A. L. Barbur, chairman; Lieutenant Harold C. Jones, H. L. Hudson, Frank J. White, G. B. Hegardt, Lionel C. Mackay, J. H. Rankin and Byron C. Hostie.

The vessel, which is to be located permanently in this harbor, is to be used as a training ship for the Oregon district of the naval reserve force, and is in charge of Lieutenant Commander John A. Beckwith. It has a displacement of 615 tons and is 290 feet in length. It is expected to arrive Saturday on its trip from Mare Island.

Man Set Free on Murder Charge Is Accused as 'Drunk'

John Tevis, who was recently acquitted in the circuit court on murder charges growing out of the death of his wife several months ago, was arrested again Thursday night on a charge of being drunk. Tevis was first arrested on a charge of murder, after his wife had been found in her room apparently choked to death. Later the charges were changed to manslaughter. Testimony introduced at the trial tended to show that Tevis was drunk at the time of the encounter with his wife.

KING FUNERAL TO BE HELD SATURDAY AT HOLMAN CHAPEL

Masonic rites will be performed for Frank P. King, well known traveling man of Portland, under the auspices of the Scottish Rite Masons Saturday morning at 10 o'clock, at the Holman parlors. Concluding services will be held at the Portland Mausoleum.

King, who was related to Ralph Waldo Emerson on both the side of his father and mother, was born in Uniontown, Pa., in 1864. Coming to Oregon 33 years ago he was the founder of the Commercial Mining association at Baker. Until two years ago he acted as general manager for the association. At that time he retired from the mining business and bought controlling interest in the Luckel, King & Calk Soap company, in which he had been a partner for several years.

Traveling for the firm, he became interested in the Travelers' Protective association and was instrumental in having the first convention of the Oregon-Washington division held in Portland. King died at his home, Nortonia hotel, March 30. He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Sarah King; two daughters, Queenie and Frances King, and one son, Loren King, all of Portland.

August Donenberg

Requiem mass was sung for August Donenberg, who was killed March 28 in an automobile accident near Svenson, Ore., this morning at the church of the Holy Redeemer. The interment was

made in Mount Calvary cemetery. Donenberg, who had been a resident of Portland for 10 years, was born in California in 1863. Until his retirement two years ago he had been employed as a bookkeeper at the Fox & Co. plumbing supply house. He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Margaret Donenberg, who lives at the family home, 1174 Haight street; one daughter, Mrs. R. J. Clary of Salem; two sons, Fred Donenberg of Hood River and Joseph Donenberg of Portland; three brothers and five sisters.

Amelia Ann Fetterman

Mrs. Amelia Ann Fetterman, 8016 Ruth avenue, died at her home this morning at the age of 77. She was a well known pioneer of Aberdeen, Wash., and Portland. Surviving her are her husband and one son, J. E. Chesbrough, and one step-son, G. R. Fetterman of Bremerton, Wash. Funeral arrangements have not been made.

Special Tillamook Rate Is Announced

Week-enders at the Tillamook county beaches will be granted special round-trip rates during the coming season, according to an announcement from the general passenger agent of the Southern Pacific railroad Friday. Season tickets will cost \$6, and tickets for single round trips will be placed on sale on Friday and Saturday and Sunday of each week, which will be good for the return trip on Monday. The special rates will go into effect on May 27, and will continue during the summer months.

WOMAN WHO BEAT BABY WARD WILL SERVE 10 MONTHS

On her plea of guilty to the charge of beating Baby Edna Romanski, Mrs. Reta Mathus was sentenced by Circuit Judge Kavanaugh this morning to serve four months in the county jail.

The case attracted much attention last year when officers of the Oregon Humane society rescued the baby from the home where its mother had placed it in Mrs. Mathus' care. After Municipal Judge Roseman had passed sentence of six months and Mrs. Mathus had appealed, the defendant fled from the state, her appeal bond being forfeited.

The charge to which she pleaded guilty this morning, however, is not the one under which Judge Roseman sentenced her to six months in jail. A supplementary state charge had been filed and a grand jury indictment had been returned on which extradition papers were sworn out and Mrs. Mathus was brought back from Washington, where she was living in hiding.

The city charge, therefore, will be supplementary to the state charge. Judge Kavanaugh ruled, making the total period one of 10 months.
