

PAUPERS SHOULD BE GIVEN DECENT BURIAL, S. EDICT

Even paupers should have decent burial when they die, the county commissioners believe, and as a result they rejected this morning all the bids submitted by Portland undertakers for the handling of the county dead. Most of the bids averaged about one cent a body, and one concern offered to pay the commissioners \$200 a year for the privilege.

Commissioner Rudeen made an investigation of these startling bids after they were submitted and he reported today that the undertakers frequently got fat payment from the estates of persons who were believed to have been paupers.

One woman who died some time ago in county charges turned out to have \$3000. The undertaker was appointed administrator and naturally he took out of this amount a good sized sum for burial expenses. To this he added his fee for payment from the estates of persons who were believed to have been paupers.

RIDEEN REPORTED

The commissioners, in rejecting the bids, said they probably would rotate the handling of the county dead among the undertakers, letting one do the work for six months and then handing it on to another. Rudeen will insist that a report be submitted every 30 days by those doing the work.
