Edgar E. Piper Is
Back From Cruise
Of Oriental Ports

When the steamer West Keats moored at Terminal No. 1 at midnight Tuesday, Edgar E. Piper of the Columbia-Pacific Shipping company, who went out on her as purser, completed his first cruise of the Orient. Piper made the trip in order to study trade and shipping conditions in the east, leaving Portland February 7. After making calls at Kobe, Yokohama, Shanghai, Tsing Tau and Taku Bar, the steamer cleared for Portland from Hainan March 24.

According to Piper, the return trip was one of the quickest made by a shipping board ship. The 5500 mile trip was made at an average speed of 12.7 knots. Telling of the famine suffering in China, Piper said:

"It is always so poverty stricken that it takes an expert to say how bad it really is. Residents of the country told me the Chinese are accustomed to famine, and are meeting their fate with an admirable resignation."
