

PORTLAND CHAMBER IS ENTERTAINED ROYALLY AT O. A. C.

Corvallis, April 13.—The Oregon Agricultural college and the Corvallis Commercial club joined Tuesday in extending hospitality to 55 members of the Portland Chamber of Commerce. The visitors arrived in a special car at 11:30 o'clock and were met by a number of Corvallis business men in automobiles and driven to the college, where luncheon was served in the new building of the home economics section. After luncheon the Portland visitors were shown over the college grounds and through the principal buildings, witnessing military drills in the armory by the cadets.

A visit was also made to the country club grounds just before taking the homeward bound train at 4:10 o'clock. The purpose of the college was to give the Portland people a better idea of the work being done by the college. In the mind of the commercial club was the thought of calling attention to the city's lack of adequate hotel accommodation and eliciting sympathy for a hotel project which is being floated by the club. Expressions of the visitors indicated that the visit was of mutual benefit.

The luncheon was a formal affair. O. C. Lauritzen, executive secretary of the Commercial club, was toastmaster. Speaking was interspersed with vocal harmonies by a college quartet and topical verses by the visitors expressing their admiration of O. A. C. H. H. Haynes and J. R. Ellison acted as composers and yell leaders.

The Portland visitors were welcomed to the college by President Kerr, who emphasized that the chief purpose of the school was to build character. Adolphe Wolfe of Portland acknowledged that although he had been a resident of Oregon for 40 years, this was the first time he had ever visited the college. "I am ashamed of it," he said, "for I could not find time to visit the school and its results under the direction of President Kerr and gave assurance of his interest in the future."

"I have been in all the leading hotels of the United States and in Europe, but never have I sat down to a meal like this," Wolfe continued. "Never have I been served by such intelligent and sweet looking waitresses." Other speakers were R. S. Howard, Edward Elmerman, H. H. Haynes, F. A. Andrews and W. D. B. Dodson of the Portland Chamber of Commerce. The latter called attention to the fact that the beauties and advantages of life in Oregon were but little known by the outside world and that the time was near when an organized attempt would be made to be made. He lauded the cooperative effort of the business men of Corvallis as well as those of other cities in the state in this movement.

Coquille Plans to Celebrate Opening Of Paved Highway

Marshfield, April 13.—Residents of Coquille have planned for a big celebration on April 30 to observe the completion of the paved highway from Marshfield to the county seat. There will be a race against time over the new road as one of the early morning features, following which the road will be open to autos. Governor Olson has been invited to make an airship trip to Coquille and deliver the chief address of the day. People are expected from all over the country.

Rev. G. H. Parkinson Receives a Call to Manhattan Church

Corvallis, April 12.—Rev. George H. Parkinson, pastor of the First Methodist church here, has received a call to the pulpit of the Methodist church in Manhattan, Kan., at a substantial increase in salary with opportunity to head a \$200,000 building plan. The matter has been placed in the hands of Bishop W. O. Shepard of Portland, superintendent of the district, and it is thought he will not disapprove of the change if the local church is adequately cared for during the next year, when the \$100,000 campaign for a new church building is being launched. Rev. Mr. Parkinson is state chaplain of the American Legion and came here 18 months ago after service in the army.

One thousand volumes from the war library have been given to the Benton county library by the American Library association, according to word from Miss Corneille Marvian, state librarian. The First Methodist church has offered its passage free of charge for a library building, and books from the old library will be moved and catalogued as soon as possible. New light fixtures will be

Unemployment Peak In Coos County Is Reported as Passed

Marshfield, April 13.—Unemployment in Coos county has passed the worst point, and soon there will be need for men. The C. A. Smith company has started one of the two mills in Marshfield and may start the larger mill soon. The Smith-Powers Logging company has resumed operation of the camps around Powers, giving employment to a large number of men. The Buchner Lumber company of North Bend has opened the mill in that city again and will employ 180 men and the same company has resumed work at the Big Lake logging camp, where about 125 men will be employed. The Buchner company is also working a smaller force at the Allegany camp, which will later be opened.

There is a good deal of road work to be done in Coos county this summer which will give work to many. Work on the forest road between Hauser and Lakeside is expected to start soon.

Local officers are going after the men who sell vanilla extract as a beverage. It is claimed by the officers that quite a number are drinking the extract in large quantities and that the effects are serious. Otto Richter, who conducts a

small grocery, was arrested on a charge of selling extract. Samples of the extract showed 42 per cent alcoholic content.

Marshfield is to have a big May day celebration. The movement was started by the Business Women's club and a committee appointed to take charge and solicit the aid of all of the churches and schools and fraternal organizations of the city. It will be a municipal affair and the profits are to go toward the fund which will be used in the city beautiful campaign. There will be a queen of May chosen from among the high school girls, a maypole dance and all of the other old fashioned May day festivities.

Wilson Peace Fund Like Nobel's Urged

Chicago, April 13.—Sponsors of Woodrow Wilson and the League of Nations are raising in this country a "Woodrow Wilson World Peace Fund" of \$500,000. The fund will correspond to Europe's Nobel peace award. The Woodrow Wilson club of the University of Chicago is one of 52 being formed throughout the country. Organizations of such clubs is in the hands of the original club at Harvard.

Preliminary Survey Of Lakeview Narrow Gauge Road Finished

Lakeview, April 13.—The reconnaissance survey for the proposed extension of the N. C. O. narrow gauge railroad north of Lakeview has been completed by William F. Gould, chief engineer of the N. C. O. The purpose of the extension is to tap the pine timber belt bordering the Goose Lake valley.

A tentative route has been selected by Gould, who reports that a surveying crew will soon be put into the field. It is reported from Alturas, headquarters of the N. C. O., that a petition has been presented to the California railway commission to take up the road between Hackstaff and Wendal and it is expected that this material will be used in making the extension north of Lakeview.

Wallowa Library Donation Day Tea Adds Many Books

Wallowa, Or., April 14.—Books to the number of 100 and \$12.50 in cash were contributed to the public library here Saturday at a tea, which will be made an annual event. The money will be used for books. The library is a purely local affair, founded in 1912 by the Ladies' Progressive club and supported without outside funds.

Members of the club solicited funds and books and cleaned out the tiny quarters in which the library was opened November 20, 1912. The city council has gradually taken over the financial end until the city now pays the rent, librarian's salary and \$150 toward books and periodicals each year.

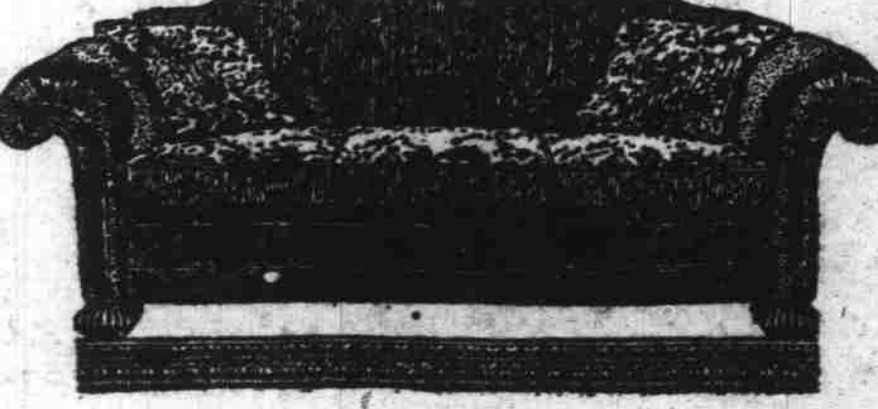
