

## SALEM MEETING MOVES AGAINST FARM LOAN BODY

Salem, Or., April 13.—Declaring that the federal farm loan board is unfriendly toward the provisions of the farm loan act, the immediate removal of the members of the board is demanded in resolutions adopted at a meeting here Tuesday of a committee representing the state grange, the Farmers' union and the State Farm Bureau association.

The resolutions were adopted after the committee had completed an investigation of the records of A. C. Bohrnstedt, secretary of the Oregon Agricultural and Horticultural Farm Loan associations, local organizations, the former with headquarters in Salem and the latter at Corvallis. The committee expressed its confidence in the ability and integrity of Bohrnstedt, and declared that the charges made against him by the federal farm loan board are without foundation, that no irregularities have been found in his accounts, and that the law has not been violated.

The resolutions adopted by the committee declare that "we believe the records show that the farm loan board plainly manifests an animus against Mr. Bohrnstedt, and has done its best to secure his removal on various charges which we think are not sustained by evidence and which are apparently trumped up because of certain criticisms of the board's policies, and because of his activities in effecting state and national organization of the farm loan organizations."

The committee further pledged "the efforts of the organizations which we represent to get the order rescinded which withholds further funds to the association that have entered the state and national organizations."

Todd, resigned. W. C. Hoppes was reelected as assistant superintendent. The selection of other teachers was postponed until the next meeting of the board.

Salem, Or., April 13.—Henry C. Fletcher, 72, a resident of the Salem vicinity since 1864, died at his home in this city Tuesday night after an illness of six years. Fletcher was a retired farmer. He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Della Fletcher, prominent state grange worker; a daughter, Miss Ethel Fletcher, president of the State Grange assembly, and a son, Lewis H. Fletcher, a Salem business man.

## Emergency Tariff, With Anti-Dumping Feature, Reported

Washington, April 13.—(I. N. S.)—The emergency tariff bill, with the anti-dumping and American valuations provisions, was reported to the house today, under an argument of the Republican members of the house ways and means committee.

The bill introduced today differs from the emergency tariff measure of last

session in the anti-dumping and American valuation provisions. It carries a clause which makes the valuation of foreign money the basis for collection of duty, which is expected to decidedly increase the duties from Italy, Germany, Austria and several Balkan states (and does not materially affect Canada, Great Britain, France, Holland, Scandinavian countries, Cuba or South American states).

## Watchman Frightens Robbers Away From Bank at Gold Hill

Gold Hill, Or., April 13.—Burglars, who broke into the Gold Hill bank at 1 o'clock this morning were surprised and frightened away by William Wise, who fired two shots at them.

Wise, after the cashier, L. W. Smith, had received warning, was employed to guard the vault and was sleeping in a little office in the front of the building. He was awakened by the smashing of

the glass in the rear door and watched two men enter. One man stood guard with two revolvers, while the other started working on the combination of the vault.

Wise opened fire on the man guarding, shooting at his abdomen, then turned his gun on the other, shooting in the dark. Both shots went wild.

County officials had a picture of one of the men, who was recently thought to have attempted the raid on the bank at Talent and Wise positively identified the photograph as the man on guard at whom he shot first. This man is an ex-convict and pronounced by the deputy sheriff, who examined the bank this morning, as a bad actor.

## Southern Pine Men Are Granted Lower Rates on Lumber

Reductions in freight rates on lumber from Southern producing territory to points in Kansas, Nebraska and Iowa will be granted Southern pine manufacturers, according to advices received Tuesday from H. E. Lounsbury, general freight agent of the O-W. R. & N. company, who is now in Chicago. The proposed reduction was asked by Southern lumbermen following a reduction of 2

cents per 100 on shipments of Douglas fir into Middle Western territory. Representatives of Southern roads met at St. Louis Friday with traffic officials of the Southern pine manufacturers to examine requests for reduced rates. According to Lounsbury the carriers refused to grant rate concessions from the South to Chicago, Omaha, St. Paul, Kansas City, St. Louis and Cairo, Ill., holding that these are basic rates. Northwest lumbermen will object to the proposed reduction on Southern pine into Iowa and other Middle Western territory, according to officials of the West Coast Lumbermen's association.

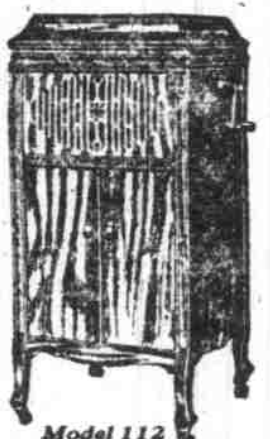
