

PRESIDENT PLANS ORGANIZATION OF NEW PAN-AMERICA

Advocates Closer Relationship to Promote Trade Between Nations of Western Hemisphere.

Washington, April 16.—The development of a great Pan-America with all nations on the western hemisphere bound together by mutual ties of trade will be urged by President Harding in a speech at New York Tuesday.

This utterance is to be delivered at the unveiling of a statue to Simon Bolivar, South American liberator, in Central park, will be the new president's first official pronouncement on Pan-American relations.

URGES BETTER TRADE
The speech, part of which he wrote in his study today, is understood to be a positive rather than negative application of the Monroe doctrine.

In addition to serving the usual veiled warning that Europe must keep hands off of the American continent, Harding is expected to declare for immediate and aggressive development of reciprocal trade relations.

Something also will be said, it is understood, that will smooth the ruffled feelings of Argentina and other South American countries over the proposed tariff legislation which they fear will operate adversely toward them.

President Harding will expand on the declarations made by his secretary of state, Charles E. Hughes, lately to a group of South American diplomats when he said the policy of the new administration will rest first upon justice.

FAVORS FULL RETURN
Trade relations, President Harding believes, must be mutually advantageous and he intends to make it clear that the United States does not expect to profit without giving full value in return.

Aside from working on his speech, President Harding devoted considerable time today to the vexing situation that has arisen over the appointment of an internal revenue commissioner.

Backers of candidates have been unusually busy, but the chief result tonight seemed to be that they had killed each other off and had forced Harding to look elsewhere for a man. He expected to make a decision today, but after a long talk with Secretary of the Treasury Mellon, it became known that a choice would not be made until Monday at the earliest.

The property settlement which was agreed upon out of court was confirmed by Judge Bueh.

Mother Snatches Her Child Away, Rushes to Court

Seattle, Wash., April 16.—(I. N. S.)—After attempting for a year to gain possession of her 3-year-old child, Mrs. Catherine Cline, 21, snatched the infant from those who held him in an office here today and rushed to the justice court. Mrs. John A. Wangness, sister of the man from whom the mother took her child, was sent to the county jail in default of \$1000 fine, charged with kidnapping. For four months Mrs. Wangness is said to have held the baby from its mother, declaring she is not a fit woman to have charge of the infant.

Wealthy Chinese Accused of Selling Morphine Package

Chuey Sim, said to be a former leader of the Sney Sing tong, who already has \$500,000 laid out for narcotic cases pending trial, was arrested at Fourth and Flinders streets Saturday night just as he was received \$4 in exchange for a package of morphine delivered into the hand of M. Tachil, according to the police.

Sim is charged with selling morphine and Tachil with possessing morphine. Bail in each case was set at \$2000.

Sim was recently released on bail after a stay of execution had been issued stopping his commitment to McNeil's island to serve a two-year sentence. He was released pending his hearing before the United States court of appeals in San Francisco. He is known as one of the wealthiest Chinese in Portland.

Prince of Monaco Visits America for Medal Presentation

New York, April 16.—His serene highness, the prince of Monaco, who draws his revenues from the world's greatest gambling table and spends them in deep seadredging for the sake of science, arrived today on the liner LaFrance.

He has come to America to receive the Alexander Agassiz medal awarded him for oceanic research by the National Academy of Sciences in 1919. The presentation will be made by the academy in Washington, April 25.

20,000 Signatures Claimed for Recall Of Fred Williams

Twenty thousand signatures to the Fred Williams recall petition, 12,000 from Multnomah county and 8000 from the state at large, are reported to be in the possession of the public service recall committee by Robert G. Duncan, the chairman.

These signatures have all been secured by volunteer circulators who have come to the office of the committee, secured petitions and circled them in the vicinities of their places of business or their homes.

Arrangements are going forward for the mass meeting to be held at The Auditorium Wednesday next. At that time it is now planned to have Peter H. D'Arcy of Salem and W. S. U'Ryan, father of the recall amendment, discuss the recall movement, and it is expected that the bulk of the 50,000 names necessary to insure the filing of the petitions will have been secured by that time.

STOLEN MONEY IS FOUND ON LAWYER

Ruel H. Grunewald, Prominent Chicago Attorney, Is Linked With Big Mail Robbery.

Chicago, April 16.—(U. P.)—Postal authorities arrested Ruel H. Grunewald, prominent attorney, and Envald Stevenson tonight on charges of having money stolen in the Dearborn station mail robbery in their possession.

The men were rushed to the jail at Joliet and held incommunicado while they were put through the third degree by government authorities.

Report of Sinking Of Gasoline Launch Is Not Confirmed

Astoria, April 16.—Searching the coast from North Head as far south as Cape Blanco and northward to Grays Harbor was fruitless in bringing information to verify the report of the sinking of the gasoline launch Bear, which was reported to have gone down off the Columbia river.

No distress signals had been reported or seen at North Head nor at the lookout stations at Point Adams and Cape Disappointment.

The steamer Rose City, which left the river late last night, was communicated with and reported that she had passed the Bear with a small trawler in tow south of the Columbia river. This is the only definite information picked up by the government radio stations.

Skippers and pilots who had passed in and out of the river last night and today report the sea smooth.

According to local mariners the launch was owned by Aberdeen people and was engaged in tow work at Tillamook along the Nehalem river.

Retailing Whiskey Charged

Fred Arndt, 221 Sixth street, was jailed late Saturday night on a charge of retailing whiskey. The policemen who raided his place found three quarts of liquor. Two customers were in the place when they arrived, they said, and five others drifted in to ask for drinks.

\$12,000 in Liquor Found in Launch Which Was Wrecked

Aberdeen, Wash., April 16.—About \$12,000 worth of liquor was found on the launch 470L of Seattle, which was wrecked at the entrance to Grays Harbor Friday evening and towed in to Hoquiam this evening by the lifeboat of the Westport life saving station.

Robert Braid, one of the three men on the boat when it started from Seattle for Portland, came in on the lifeboat. The other survivor, a Mexican named John Pantechev, is at Aberdeen. They are being held for the coroner's inquest over the body of Jack Wallace of Seattle, supposed to be the owner of the launch, who jumped overboard and was drowned when the launch went on the rocks near the north jetty.

Wallace is supposed to be well known in Seattle and to have a sister living there.

Braid said Wallace put on a life preserver and jumped overboard when he thought the boat was certain to sink. Braid said he and the Mexican got ashore in a small lifeboat towed behind the launch.

Ole Berg drove up from Tillamook for a week-end in the city. Berg came prepared for a good time—but unfortunately started his celebration a little too early.

Saturday afternoon Patrolman R. E. Burks noticed Berg weaving in and out of the traffic, apparently a little uncertain about which was the right side of the street. So well did Burks' lesson work that in no time they found themselves at Second and Oak streets.

Here the city will entertain Berg until he produces bail. He is charged with driving while intoxicated and having defective brakes.
